### Privacy Features in Firefox



#### DO NOT TRACK

With this feature enabled, Firefox will tell advertising networks, websites and applications that you want to opt-out of tracking for purposes like behavioral advertising.



### FORGET BUTTON

Clear your browsing history for a selected time frame in a single click - without affecting the rest of your information.



### **DUCKDUCKGO**

Want a search engine that doesn't track you? Make DuckDuckGo the default in your Firefox search bar.

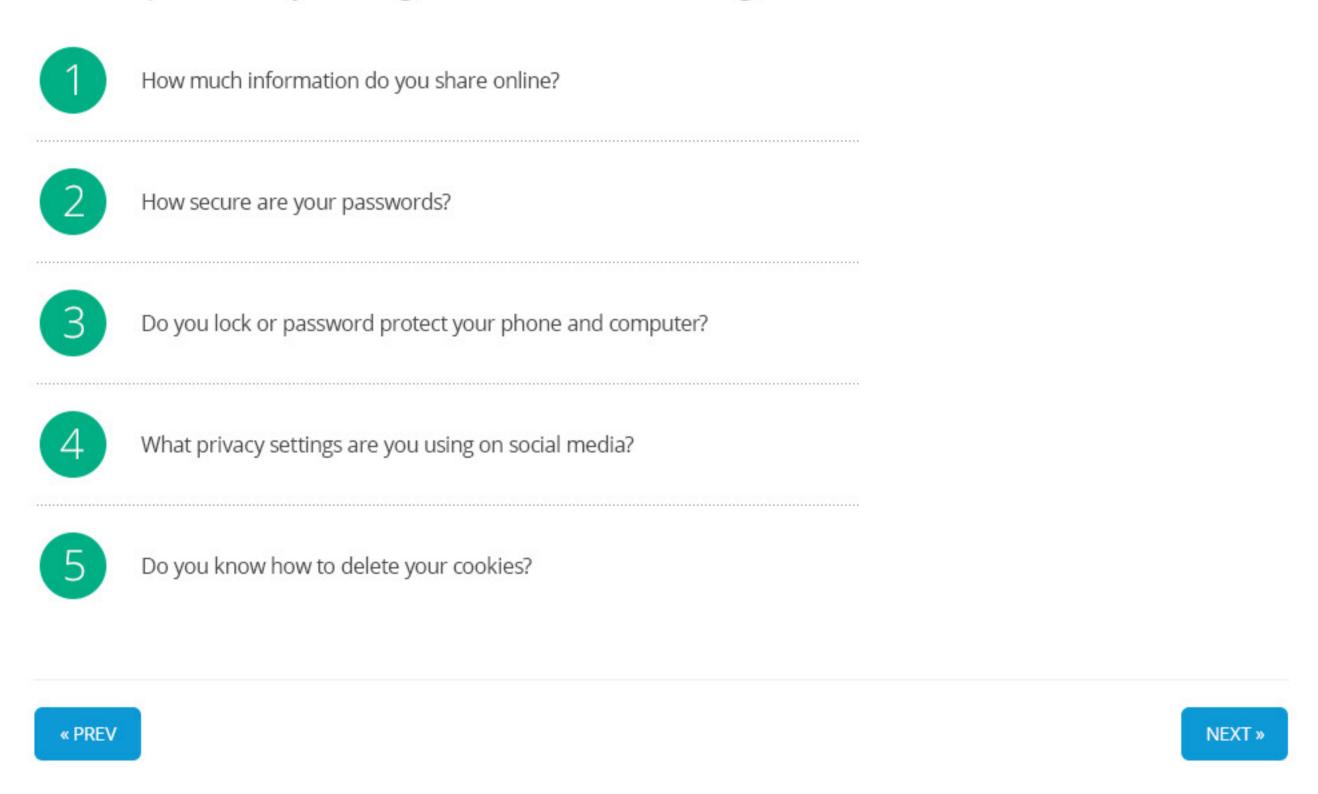

#### 2. USER CONTROL

#### 3. LIMITED DATA

Collect what we need, de-identify where we can and delete when no longer necessary.

### 4. SENSIBLE SETTINGS

Design for a thoughtful balance of safety and user experience.

### 5. DEFENSE IN DEPTH

Maintain multi-layered security controls and practices, many of which are publicly verifiable.
