This example is written on an iMac (running Sierra) using the Apple Chancery font. The version of Open Office used is 4.0.1 and demonstrates how this older version properly renders the font properly vis-a-vis letters at endof-word vs. the same letters at end-of-line. The margins have been brought in so the lines will be shorter and, therefore, more of them.

In above paragraph. líne 6 "the" appears •twíce one each way. In líne 4 "properly" vs. líne 2 "Chancery."

The Apple Chancery font is a very beautiful font' Which among_other things, displays, for some letters, "that letter differently depending upon whether it is thefinal letter on a line or the final letter of a word within." a line. At the end of a line some letters such as 'n' 't'' 'h' f' 'd' and 'u' have an ext ension, or "tail," Which. extend to the right adding to the elegance of the font. These have disappeared in the last two versions of Open. Office, with end-of-line appearance same as end-of -Word.

In above paragraph, line 1 "font" vs. line 3 "that." Line 4 "within" vs Line 4 "on."

I agree with mroe that this is a completely different' issue than. <u>issue 124496</u>. This issue is concerned with a. specific font rendering differently between different versions of AOO on macOS. <u>Issue 124496</u> deals with different' Variants of fonts (bold,etc.) not being available in the AOO fonts dropdown. I believe that this issue should stand aloneto allow a Mac user to confirm.
