OpenOffice.org extensions provide additional features which can be installed or removed by end users. A well engineered extension has all the features of the core application – menu and help system integration, etc.

Extensions can be developed in a variety of languages such as Java, C++ and Python. Developers need to understand the OpenOffice.org API and its UNO architecture, but do not need the knowledge of the codebase required to be a core developer.
