The EducationUSA Advising Center of the US-UK Fulbright Commission is the UK's only official source of information on educational exchange opportunities in the US. The Center offers a wide range of advising services, seminars and outreach events for prospective students and parents, in collaboration with 12 regional information centers at UK universities.

Recent Trends: US-UK Exchange

- Increasing Transatlantic Exchange: The number of UK students choosing to study in the US continues to grow. In 2006/2007, 8,438 UK students pursued university study in the US, an increase of 2% from the previous year (Open Doors, 2007).
- Likewise, the UK remains the leading destination for US students with more than 46,000 Americans studying in the UK in 2005/06 (Open Doors, UKCISA, 2007).
- Level of Study: Approximately half of UK students in the US study at the undergraduate level, while one third study at the graduate level (Open Doors, 2007).
- Areas of Interest: An increasing number of students are interested in short-term study, non-degree seeking or work-related programs.
- > The most popular states for UK students include: California, New York, Massachusetts, Florida, Texas, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Illinois, Georgia and Indiana.

Secondary Education:

Secondary education includes Years 7 - 11 (US grades 6 - 10), and students may attend a state or public school (private school in the US). Students at state schools follow a national curriculum, and school is mandatory to age 16.

At the end of Year 11, students take national standardized exams, the GCSE exams (General Certificate of Secondary Education). Students may choose the number and subject of their exams (from the 48 GCSE exams available). However, English, Math and Science are required subjects, and UK universities typically expect students to take at least five GCSE exams.

Students continuing on an academic track after GCSEs attend sixth form colleges during Years 12-13. Students on a work-based training scheme after GCSEs may earn vocational qualifications, such as the NVQ or BTEC.

At sixth form colleges, students sit AS-Level (Advanced Subsidiary) at the end of Year 12 and A2-Level exams at the end of Year 13. Teacher assessment of coursework and AS/A2-Level scores, ranging from A - E, are used to calculate the final A-Level results, awarded in the summer after Year 13. Students may choose the number and subjects of their A-Level exams (from the 80+ subjects available). However, UK universities typically expect students to complete at least two A-Level exams, and some courses (degree programs) may specify A-Level subjects and results required for admission.

Note: UK schools may not have the ability to print a student transcript on demand; rather, students often have to work with teachers and counselors to "create" a transcript for US university applications. At the time of application, US universities can assess students based on SAT/ACT, GSCE and AS-Level scores, as well as predicted A-Level results determined by the student's teacher. Keep in mind that that students do not receive US-style GPAs or class ranks.

Higher Education:

Undergraduate Study:

Most courses for undergraduate study last three years. Some vocational and language study courses are longer. (Note that medicine and law are studied at the undergraduate level, unlike in the US.)

UK students apply to a maximum of five universities through a centralized application portal, UCAS. Students apply to the academic department, rather than to the university at large. Admissions decisions center upon the student's academic record and potential and are based on the assessment of: a 47-line personal statement; one letter of recommendation from a school representative; GCSE, AS-level and predicted A-level results; and an application fee of £5-15 (\$10-30). Students are given an offer of admission, conditional upon earning specified A-Level results.

UK undergraduate courses do not follow a liberal arts philosophy. Rather, students choose their field of study at the time of application and take the majority if not all of their modules (classes) in that field. Students are often assessed by a major exam or paper completed at the end of each module. Final degree results (grades) are expressed in terms of: 1:1 - First Class Honours, 2:1 - Upper-Second Class Honours, 2:2 - Lower-Second Class Honours, 2:3 - Third, Pass and/or Fail.

As of 1997-98, UK students pay fees to attend university. Fees are set by individual institutions or departments, but are limited by a cap set by the UK government which will be reviewed in 2010. The maximum fees for 2008/09 is £3,145.

Postgraduate Study:

Master's Degrees may be either taught or research-based and last one to two years. PhD programs last three years and primarily focus on self-directed research. Results for Master's courses are classified as: Distinction, Merit (for some but not all courses), Pass and Fail. Results for doctoral courses are classified as: Pass or Fail.

At the postgraduate level, UK students apply to each university individually, and admission decisions are made by the department. Generally, applicants must have at least a 2:2 at the undergraduate level.

At the postgraduate level, funding is often available through field-specific research councils. Some research and teaching assistantships are also available from the university, but not on the same scale as the US.
