Welcome to the Oregon Caves Chateau Photo Tour

The Chateau is classified as one of approximately 3,000 National Historic Landmarks in the National Park Service because of its distinctive design. Construction began in 1932 and was completed in 1934.








1987 NATIONAL PARK SERVICE <u>UNITED S</u>TATES DEPARTMENT OF TH Gust Lium, an architect and local carpenter, was hired to construct the Chateau. The design of the building was based on the idea of fluidness with nature. The builders used local materials and also tried to mimic the randomness of nature.





One of the most striking features about the Chateau is the original Port Orford cedar bark siding.
