

BNL Honors Five Employees With Brookhaven Awards

At the Fiscal Year 2007 BNL Employee Recognition Award Ceremony held on January 10, Lab Director Sam Aronson and others congratulated 15 BNL employees for their talent and dedication, which won each awardee \$5,000.

The five Science & Technology and five Engineering Awards winners were featured in the Bulletins of January 26 and February 9, respectively. Aronson presented the five Brookhaven Awards to: Peter Eterno, Plant Engineering Division; John Hynan, Facilities & Operations Directorate; Stephanie LaMontagne-McKeon, Collider-Accelerator Department; Diane Rocco, Environmental Services & Waste Management Division; and Lisa Toler, Nonproliferation & National Security Department. The award recognizes key contributors in support functions whose performance and achievements represent outstanding service to the Lab. Employees with a history of contributions in all support functions are considered; however, outstanding achievements in areas such as environment, safety, affirmative action, training, community involvement, and quality are favored. The five Brookhaven Award honorees are featured below.

Peter Eterno

Peter Eterno, an employee in the Plant Engineering Division (PE) for 31 years, is cited for outstanding service to BNL as Superintendent of PE's Maintenance Management Center and, for the past year, concurrent exceptional work in serving in the role of Electrical General Supervisor (EGS). Eterno started at BNL as an electrician and learned how to keep BNL's complex electrical systems

well maintained and operating safely. He continued to expand his abilities, obtaining both bachelor's and master's degrees in management and becoming a computer system expert. He used his computer skills by implementing several generations of maintenance management software, most recently "Maximo," to create a system that forms the core of PE service business, tracking and recovering costs for 25,000

Yangang Liu Talks About Aerosols, Clouds, Climate

What might happen in the air when a rain-laden cloud passes over a factory chimney pouring out black smoke? Do tiny particles from burning of fossil fuel somehow alter the climate by playing tricks on clouds high above?

As scientists who study aerosols, clouds, and precipitation know, particles in the atmosphere interact with one another and affect the Earth's climate through a myriad of complex processes. These processes act over a wide range of scales — from the sub-micrometer to the global scale of over 10,000 kilometers.

To learn more about these phenomena, join Atmospheric Scientist Yangang Liu, Environmental Sciences Department

(ES), when he gives the 422nd Brookhaven Lecture, titled "Aerosols, Clouds, and Climate — From Micro to Macro," at 4 p.m. on Wednesday, February 21. The lecture will be held in Berkner Hall, and Liu will be introduced by Peter Daum, ES's Atmospheric Sciences Division Head. All are welcome to attend Brookhaven Lectures, which are free and open to the public. Visitors to the Lab or 16 and over must carry a photo ID.

In his talk, Liu will discuss his and colleagues' studies of aerosols-clouds-climate interactions from microscopic through macroscopic points of view. He will address the way that man-made aerosol particles can alter the properties of clouds and precipitation, and how such

State Senator LaValle Visits BNL

On Friday, February 9, New York State Senator Ken LaValle visited BNL to meet with Lab Director Sam Aronson and address the Lab community. During an hour-long address and question-and-answer session in a packed Berkner Auditorium, LaValle repeatedly praised the Lab and its staff for the work that is done here and also talked about the need for strong state support for that work.

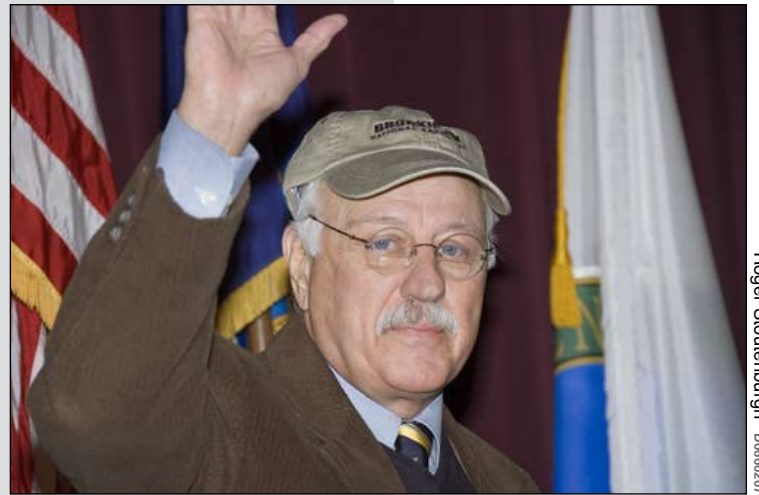
"I understand the importance of the science, the importance to our economy, and the importance of the jobs here," LaValle said. "Supporting the Lab is a no-brainer."

LaValle took questions from staff on a variety of issues, including future support for Brookhaven projects, opportunities for educational collaborations and efforts to make Long Island more economically appealing to prospective employees.

In his introduction, Director Aronson thanked LaValle for his support in negotiating low-cost power rates for the Lab, as well as his work to obtain \$30 million for the construction of the Joint Photon Sciences Institute, which will complement NSLS-II.

"It's terrific to have him here again, and celebrate his important role for the Lab on a number of fronts," said Aronson.

Eterno is recognized for his substantial contributions to BNL, including learning new skills, taking on new challenges, improving approaches, adopting new technologies, and striving to serve customers better.

John Hynan, a technical associate I in the Facilities & Operations Directorate, is the Site Hoisting and Rigging Inspector for BNL's mobile cranes, boom trucks, and overhead cranes, as well as all contractors' material handling and heavy equipment. His calmness and professionalism, often under difficult circumstances, has earned him widespread respect. BNL planners and engineers seek his

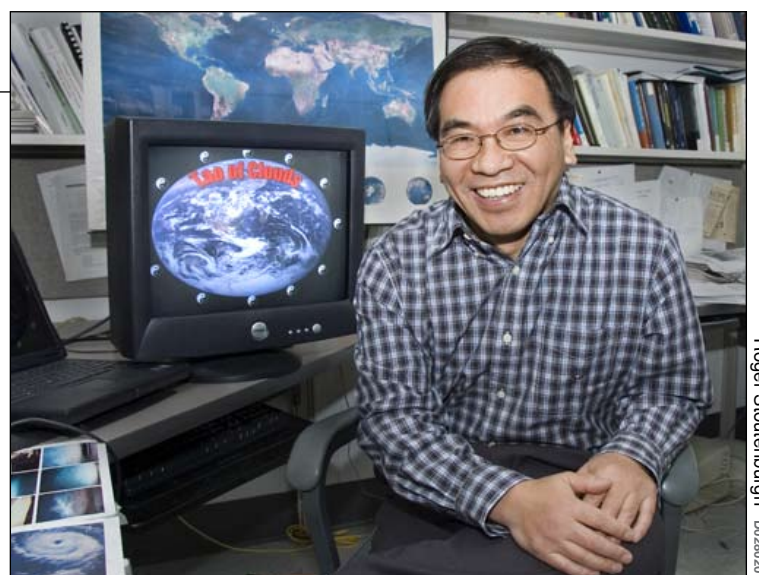
advice in the early stages of projects because he helps reduce costs, solve problems, and get the job done safely, on schedule, and within budget. His attention to detail, such as in spotting inaccurate charges, has saved the Lab many thousands of dollars. Hynan has demonstrated outstanding abilities in major Lab projects such as the End-cap Electromagnetic Calorimeter installation in the STAR detector, the Brookhaven Graphite Research Reactor Decommissioning Project, the Research Support Building and Center for Functional Nanomaterials construction. He assists in developing and implementing corrective actions in response to Occupational Safety & Health Administration and ISM material handling findings, and helps others to develop rigging and hoisting plans. Hynan is a significant contributor to the BNL Lifting Safety Committee, a primary architect of BNL's standards for hoisting and rigging, and a BNL representative

on DOE's Hoisting & Rigging Technical Advisory Committee.

Stephanie LaMontagne-McKeon

Stephanie LaMontagne-McKeon, the Assistant Chair for Administration in the Collider-Accelerator Department (C-A), is recognized for her accomplishments in administration, business operations, and personnel supervision. Her contributions have included taking a large responsibility for the business operations of C-A and the Superconducting Magnet Division, and she was a key player in Lab-wide business system improvement. LaMontagne-McKeon has participated as a committee member in the development of numerous BNL systems. Her willingness to jump in, discuss, improve, and hammer out positive changes has consistently been beyond the norm. Then & Now

In 1947, BNL's first "then" building for the Chemistry Department was Army Bldg. 136, located fairly near the present Chemistry Bldg. 555. Space, labs, and equipment were inadequate, however, and by 1948, work was under way to adapt six former Army classroom buildings on Bell Avenue and Rochester Street to be the new Chemistry domain (see photo below). A long corridor would join the buildings, which were each to contain office and lab facilities, with one "hot" lab for studies involving intense radioactivity.

The Chairman of Chemistry was Richard W. Dodson, who came to BNL from the Manhattan Project and led the department for 21 years. In addition to making considerable scientific contributions, Dodson most especially became known as a catalyst for new research directions. He and several department members, including R.C. Anderson, Jacob Bigel-eisen, Ray Davis, Norman Elliott, Gerhart Friedlander, Lewis Friedman, Julius Hastings, and Oliver Schaeffer, were already at work on various investigations well before the new "now" buildings were ready.

Friedlander, for example, recalls that he and Anderson occupied the top floor of Bldg. 136. "I know we were up there together," he says, "because of the time I was doing an experiment that required seeing a change in color. I am color-blind, so I called Anderson to check it for me. He was amazed. 'You're a chemist and you're color-blind!' But it never bothered me." As Friedlander's long and distinguished career proved, some research challenges are not a problem.

Ion Collider Project, and C-A grew beyond business system responsibilities into more general administration, including personnel administration. In all areas she brought professionalism, compassion, and enthusiasm.

As a charter member of Brookhaven Women in Science, she has participated in various leadership roles and committees, such as the Status of Women Working Group and Women in Science Career Day for high-school-age women. Her dedication and outstanding commitment have touched many and greatly improved the quality of life at BNL.

Diane Rocco

Project Engineer Diane Rocco of the Environmental Services & Waste Management Division is cited most particularly for her outstanding efforts over the last few years to reduce BNL's inventory of nuclear materials

and radioactive sources. In the post-9/11 world, these materials have become extremely difficult to transport and discard, and present significant risks and costs to the Lab. Rocco, who is Operations Manager and Nuclear Safety Officer for BNL's Waste Management Program, is known as relentless in her efforts to remove those nuclear materials and sources that BNL no longer needs, shipping them safely off site for proper disposal or for use by others. She has developed a reputation, both at BNL and throughout the DOE complex, as an expert in this area who faces and overcomes extremely difficult challenges and can be counted upon to do so safely, ahead of schedule, and cost effectively. A typical example of her achievements was the successful removal of plutonium beryllium sources from a whole body irradiation device. Rocco worked closely with a team of BNL staff

and initiated and obtained assistance from DOE's Off-Site Source Recovery Program in getting approvals, reviewing processes, and tracking equipment for the job. Her efforts over the last few years have reduced the amount of on-site nuclear material by thousands of curies.

Lisa Toler

Lisa Toler is a Project Planning Administrator in the Nonproliferation & National Security Department. She is cited for her extraordinary contributions in providing project management for an exceptionally large number of complex projects and exercising direct oversight, administration, and management of the Material Protection, Control & Accountability (MPC&A) Program funding in several areas totaling over \$63 million. The MPC&A Program, of which she is recognized as a key member, is sponsored by

DOE and has been designated as important to DOE's national security mission. In addition, Toler serves as a Team Leader for one project, managing resources and integrating multi-lab efforts. She also serves as the BNL financial leader and point of contact for the Global Initiatives for Proliferation Prevention, Nonproliferation & International Security, and the Global Threat Reduction Programs. Finally, she provides contract administration support as a Technical Representative for the Technical Survey Team Project. To add to Toler's professional commitment, she has successfully pursued higher education and advanced training directly relevant to her job responsibilities. These attainments include a master's degree in organizational management and project management professional certification from the Project Management Institute. — Liz Seubert

Notice: Controlled Area Postings During RHIC Operations

The Collider-Accelerator Department will soon be restarting the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC), which is expected to operate until the end of June. During this operating period, the entire RHIC site, including the inner road, will be posted as a Controlled Area with the exception of the Collider Center, Bldg. 1005, the adjacent parking lot and the approach road to Bldg. 1005. The postings will be in place over the weekend of February 17-18. In addition, the northern portion of Thompson Road is posted as a Controlled Area and closed to routine traffic.

Requirements For Entering Controlled Areas

The following requirements must be satisfied before entering the posted Controlled Areas. Failure to comply with these requirements could lead to a Reportable Occurrence and a Price Anderson Amendment Act (PAAA) violation:

1. Unescorted Access requires up-to-date General Employee Radiation Training (GERT) and facility specific training.
 - Experimenters: contact the RHIC & AGS Users' Center, Ext. 3333, for assistance.
 - BNL Employees: contact Ann-Marie Luhrs, Ext. 7007, for assistance.
2. Escorted Access may be granted by contacting Ann-Marie Luhrs, Ext. 7007. Escorts must complete a Training Waiver Form and the escorted entry must be approved by the Collider-Accelerator Department. Call at least one day prior to the escorted access.

As always, all personnel are expected to adhere to the posted requirement.
