Livestock Slaughter 02/20/09

Record Low for January Lamb and Mutton Production

Commercial red meat production for the United States totaled 4.17 billion pounds in Jan., down 6% from the 4.42 billion pounds produced in Jan. 2008.



Beef production, at 2.12 billion pounds, was

5% below the previous year. Cattle slaughter totaled 2.72 million head, down 6% from January 2008. The average live weight was up 15 pounds from the previous year, at 1,306 pounds.

Veal production totaled 12.0 million pounds, 6% above January a year ago. Calf slaughter totaled 84,700 head, 19% above January 2008. The average live weight was down 24 pounds from last year, at 245 pounds.

Pork production totaled 2.03 billion pounds, 6% below the previous year. Hog kill totaled 9.92 million head, 6% below January 2008. The average live weight was down 1 pound from the previous year, at 272 pounds.

Lamb and mutton production, at 13.3 million pounds, was 10% below January 2008. Sheep slaughter totaled 189,400 head, 11% below last year. BUTTER- WEST 02/19/09 - Cash butter prices at the CME Group have held steady for eight trading sessions at \$1.1025. The butter support price is \$1.05 and butter continues to clear to the price support program. Last week 455,000 pounds cleared to CCC to bring the total up to 4.1 million pounds. Contacts state that sales activity is good with more bulk sales occurring than they anticipated. Print sales are good for this time of year with some feature activity noted at retail stores. Food service orders continue to lag expectations. Cream offerings are not quite as heavy as they have been so some contacts report a little less churning. Butter continues to enter various storage programs at various levels of the market. According to FAS, imports of butter under the quota system for January total 147,100 pounds, only 37% of the total for January 2008. The two primary sources for this butter were Ireland and New Zealand, accounting for 66% of the total. Imports of High-Tier butter (above quota and with a penalty) were about one load and trail 2008. Butter stocks in CME approved warehouses were 66.0 million pounds for last week, up 220,000 pounds from the previous week. The weekly level compares to 120.8 million pounds in 2008 and 105.3 million pounds in 2007. In the last five weeks stocks have grown 19.1 million pounds. FLUID MILK & CREAM REVIEW - WEST 02/19/09 -

CALIFORNIA milk output is generally steady with the growth rate slow to materialize. Processors are noting that intake levels are lower than a year ago. Plants remain on the full side to handle the available milk and components. Dairy product prices have not been good and shifting of milk around has not been an issue. This could change some as the cheese prices have increased around 30 cents since January. Class 1 sales are along expected levels with little gains noted due to lower class price. NEW MEXICO milk production levels are flat with recent weeks. Weather conditions are non issues the milk picture. The biggest concern is over the milk prices and what producers are doing to manage their costs. Culling cows and changing feed rations are common starting points for short term events. CREAM prices and the market tone remain weak. Offerings are in excess of needs for higher class items, although production of those products is increasing ahead of seasonal rollouts and upcoming holidays. Butter output remains heavy. Basing points, multiples and overages are holding steady. At the CME, Grade AA butter price closed at \$1.1025 on Wednesday, February 18. Cream multiples in the West range from 95-115 FOB and vary depending on class usage and basing points. Milk production continues to grow slowly in the PACIFIC NORTHWEST along seasonal patterns. It is probably a little slower than anticipated due to heavier culling practices and a change in rations. Weather has had little impact on production for quite a few weeks. More hay offerings are noted and prices continue to soften on a light test. Very little milk or cream is moving around the region. Plants are basically running with their own milk. More snow is hitting the dairy areas in UTAH and IDAHO. Problems are minor, but it is a reminder that winter is still in the region and the moisture continues to be welcomed. Some cheese operations are willing to look at taking some additional milk in because of the excellent sales they have noted in the past few weeks. The rising prices for cheese are stimulating some extra interest in the short run as buyers try to anticipate further price increases. Heifer prices at a weekly sale in the region backed off again after rebounding for one week. The top of the market was \$1600 and the average was \$1370. NONFAT DRY MILK - WEST 02/19/09 - Pricing for Western low/medium heat nonfat dry milk is mostly steady. The market tone remains weak, although pricing levels are likely at or near the lowest levels they should attain under current market conditions. The trade sentiment is that offerings will continue to the support program at 80 cents with the possible inclusion of a couple more producers in the future. Producers not offering to the support program say that they are better off selling around 2 cents below the support price to offset the associated costs of the CCC sales. Current export shipments are slowing and new deals are not materializing for U.S. NDM/SMP; reflecting the competitive world market position and world pricing below U.S. pricing. There is not an incentive for U.S. producers to sell powder into export channels below current pricing levels. During the week of February 9-13, Western NDM sales to the CCC support program totaled 7.7 million pounds, bring the cumulative total since October to nearly 170 million pounds. Western high heat NDM pricing levels are unchanged. The market tone is steady. Supplies are in good relation with demand. Seasonal interest is developing for bakery and confectionary accounts. Current production schedules are light as producers assess plant throughputs to maximize capacity.

WEST CHEESE 02/18/09 - Block cheese prices at the CME Group have gained 29 cents since the low for the year that occurred on January 15. The price at midweek is \$1.33. As the price has increased over the last few weeks, it has stimulated additional buying interest. Buyers are now aggressively looking for more cheese for immediate needs and for future use. They assume prices will continue to increase in the short run and they want to beat those daily and weekly average increases. Cheese is well cleaned up at the plant level. This also applies to under grade cheese. In the last week, anyone that has tried to clean out inventories of old or off condition cheese has been very successful. Contacts indicate that end user demand for cheese is very good. A lot of features are noted at the retail level and more specials are being run by various restaurant chains. Production of cheese does remain heavy outside of some Italian varieties. According to FAS, total imports of quota cheese in January are 15.0 million pounds, 86% of the total for last January. Imports of High-Tier cheese (above quota and with a penalty) are 1.27 million pounds in January, only 29% of the total for January 2008. Swiss quota imports in January are 3.1 million pounds, 89% of the year ago total. The two leading countries for sourcing this cheese are Norway and Finland and they accounted for 68% of the imports for January.

ILLINOIS HAY - 02/06/09 This report is issued the first Friday of the month. All hav prices guoted dollars per ton FOB the farm, small square bales unless otherwise noted. Straw quoted in dollars per bale and by the ton. This report was based on the sale of 6150 tons. The demand for hay was light to moderate, as sales activity was slow to moderate and prices were steady to weak for good quality hay, with some of the lower quality hay 10 to 30 dollars lower. Lower prices for milk are making dairy producers look for the products that will fit their budget. Plus, the abundance of lower quality hay has started to weigh on prices. The months of Dec. and Jan. gave Illinois livestock producers a good share of winter like conditions. This has been supportive of both hav and straw values. Illinois hay producers had a good year in 2008. According to the USDA's Annual Crop Production report, released on January 12, Illinois produced 1.87 million tons of hay, compared to 1.96 million tons in 2007. The average yield in 2008 was 3.03 tons per acre, compared to 2.82 in 2007. In 2008, Illinois producers planted 620,000 acres to hay, compared to 680,000 in 2007. Many farmers would probably like to see less rain in 2009, so they could put up better quality dry hay. Demand for straw was moderate to good, with most of the interest coming from the livestock interests for bedding and feed.
