IAF President Begins



areer diplomat Larry Palmer became the IAF's seventh president on Aug. 1 and the first African-American to hold the position. The son of a minister, he grew up in the South, where he excelled in school; among the colleges offering him full scholarships, he chose Emory. After graduating with honors, he earned a master's degree and then served as a Peace Corps volunteer in Liberia. In 1982 he accepted a Foreign Service appointment. His posts include the Dominican Republic, Uruguay, Paraguay, Sierra Leone, Korea, Ecuador and Honduras where he served as U.S. Ambassador from 2002 to 2005. Summit of the Americas Activities

he IAF is working with the U.S. Department of State to include grantee representatives in the preparations for the Summit of the Americas to be held Nov. 4-5 in Mar del Plata, Argentina. In June, the IAF sponsored the participation of 10 representatives of civil society organizations in the Organization of

American States' General Assembly (OASGA) in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. Their concerns, related to Afro Latinos, indigenous movements and local development, were heard by cabinet-level officials, included U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice. 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Grantee News

Bolivia

A booth manned by five representatives from El Ceibo, an organic chocolate farmers' cooperative in Bolivia's Alto Beni, was as part of the Smithsonian Folklife Festival's food and culture exhibit on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., June 23-July 4. Kevin Healy, IAF representative for Bolivia, coordinated their participation. The cooperative's delicious new dark chocolate bar sold out by the second day of the Festival. El Ceibo was world's first small farmers' cooperative to manufacture-and, since 1986, to export-cocoa products (powder, butter, chocolate) under its members' management. El Ceibo's representatives joined the Mshikamano Farmers Association from Tanzania, an African Development Foundation grantee that grows and processes Sweet Unity Coffee, in a tandem restaurant debut at Georgetown's contemporary David Greggory. Guatemala

Joaquín Cajbón Uscap, administrator of the Asociación Museo Comunitario Rabinal Achi, was elected to the board of directors of the International Network of Community Museums at the Fourth Meeting of Community Museums in June. Participants from 10 countries in the Americas shared experiences and visited organizations and archeological sites in Nueva Guinea, Nicaragua, where the meeting was held.

Paraguay

Casa de la Juventud organized a forum where 500 Paraguayan youths discussed their concerns and approved an agenda forwarded to local government officials Asunción for comments. Casa's "Presupuesto Joven Ya" campaign involves young people in public decisions by encouraging participation in local town hall meetings.

Honduras

Representatives from Proyecto Aldea Global in Honduras participated in the Sixth Latin American Symposium for Research and Extension of Agro-ecological Projects, held July 20-22 in Manizales, Colombia. The IAF funded PAG in 1999 to help revive agricultural production and install irrigation, sewer and potable water systems in nine communities around the Cerro Azul Meambar National Park that had been damaged by Hurricane Mitch.

Grantee Awards

El Salvador

The World Bank's Consultive Group selected grantee Asociación Salvadoreña de Extensionistas Empresariales del INCAE (ASEI) for its microcredit transparency prize from a field of more than 150 credit programs from around the world. Peru

On June 23, grantee Programa Integral para el Desarrollo del Café (PIDECAFE) received the 2005 "Alvaro Quijandría Salmón" award for its production of natural brown sugar in the Amazon. PIDECAFE produces more 4,000 kilos per month of sugar for domestic and foreign markets. The award was presented by Peru's vice minister of agriculture, Julio Escudero Meza, on National Campasino day in Lima.

Public Events

Salvadoran President at Grantee Conference

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At the Second Inter-American Summit on Decentralization and Local/Regional Governance, Salvadoran president Elias Antonio Saca recognized the IAF and the Diputación de Barcelona for their long-term support for development efforts in El Salvador. Held in San Salvador July 20–22, the event was co-sponsored by both honorees and was organized by Salvadorian grantee Fundación Nacional para el Desarrollo (FUNDE) and a committee comprised of representatives of current and former grantees from throughout Latin America. El Salvador's entire National Congress and Supreme Court witnessed the presentation of awards, along with the approximately 500 legislators, municipal officials, researchers and NGO representatives participating in conference. Community Development Conference

At an international conference on community development in Baltimore June 24-26, representatives from El Ciebo, a recycling cooperative in Argentina, CEDERENA, a community-based association addressing water services in Ecuador, and ACCEDDE, a Mexican NGO working to build democratic practices, spoke on a panel examining how their community organizations identified problems, established priorities and partnered with other institutions to propose policy initiatives.

African-Descendants at La Raza

Ecuadorians Carolina Lara and Diógenes Hurtado Segura of IAF grantee Movimiento Mi Cometa along with Miguel Pereira and Carlos Medina of Mundo Afro in Paraguay and Uruguay, respectively, shared their experiences at the National Council of La Raza's July 16-19 conference in Philadelphia. Approximately 80 individuals attended their panel "Afro-Latino Youth Leaders: Ethnicity and Culture as Catalysts for Community Organizing." Later, the panelists met in Washington, D.C., with representatives of the Latin American Youth Center and Senator Barack Obama's staff.

RedEAmérica Meeting

RedEAmérica's council of 12 directors held its annual meeting in the IAF's Arlington headquarters June 13-14. The council agreed to develop a global fund as well as a Web-based system to track projects and results, and discussed other initiatives including RedEAmérica's regional training programs. According to Walter Price, IAF's corporate programs director, the fund will be incorporated in Delaware and Santiago, Chile, and will channel significant resources from international donors to community groups. RedEAmérica was founded in 2001 to encourage corporate support for grassroots development. It currently counts 53 members in 12 countries.


