- Evolved into an Environmental Justice Organization




Pacoima Demographics

- Pacoima is located in the northeast San Fernando Valley in the City of Los Angeles
- Of the 101,000 residents, 85% are Latino and 8% are African American
- Approximately 33% of the population is children
- 19% percent of the population lived below the federal poverty level. (Source: US Census 2000)
- Of 22,000 housing units, 80% are single- family homes
- Approximately 21% of the population lives in garages or rental rooms in single-family homes

Community Health Issues

- In several areas, residents live next to industrial facilities
- Diesel trucks drive through residential areas
- There are more than 300 industrial uses/sites in the community
- Pacoima is home to five US EPA Cerclis/Superfund (toxic release) sites
- The community contains a small plane airport, with over 150 flights per day, and is bisected by railroad tracks
- Encircled by three major freeways: Interstate 5, Highway 118 and the 405 freeway

Addressing the Issues by Collaborating



A survey conducted in 21 communities in 2000 determined that families in Pacoima knew very little about lead poisoning and other environmental in home health hazards

A collaborative group formed to develop a plan on how to address the lack of information on environmental in-homehealth hazards. The group formed the Safer Homes Program

The group is called the Environmental Health Committee
