## Harolyn Blackwell

Recognized for her expressive and exuberant performances, soprano Harolyn Blackwell's career has spanned opera, concert and recital stages. She has performed with opera companies and festivals around the world including Lyric Opera of Chicago, Glyndebourne Festival, Teatro Colon de Buenos Aires, Seattle Opera, Opera de Nice, Miami Opera, Canadian Opera Company, Aix-en-Provence Festival, Opera Orchestra of New York and the Metropolitan Opera. She starred in the Broadway revival of *Candide*. An accomplished recitalist, she has performed in several acclaimed concert series, including London's Wigmore Hall, Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall, and the San Francisco Performances Series at Herbst Hall. She also has appeared in a number of nationally televised concerts, and is the recipient of numerous awards and honors, one of which provided her the opportunity to study with Renata Tebaldi and Carlo Bergonzi.

## Washington National Opera Domingo-Cafritz Young Artist Program

Overseen by Plácido Domingo, the Young Artists Program provides training and performance opportunities for emerging young singers, coach/accompanists, conductors, and stage directors. Training includes intensive study with voice and drama coaches, voice lessons, language classes, and classes in yoga and nutrition. The Young Artists also have the opportunity to understudy and perform roles on the main stage of Washington National Opera. They have performed on the Kennedy Center Millennium Stage, at the White House, the Kennedy Center Honors, the Senate Caucus Room, the Renwick Gallery of the Smithsonian American Art Museum, and at numerous embassies and schools. Last season the Program commissioned and premiered *Democracy: An American Comedy* by composer Scott Wheeler and librettist Romulus Linney. Performed by current and former Young Artists, the work was the first commission by the Washington National Opera in a decade. Each season, the Young Artists sing a fully staged performance on the stage of the Kennedy Center Opera House. This spring, the Young Artists will present Donizetti's L'Elisir d'Amore.
