LITERARY ARTS RESOURCES

Suggestions for Creating a Literary Arts Access Checklist

Literary arts programs support the creation, publication, promotion, distribution, and presentation of literature. In addition, they may involve graphic arts production, printing, readings, workshops, exhibits, and book fairs, as well as writing, translation, and editing. These activities may take place in a variety of locations ranging from printing shops to classrooms to shopping malls.

All programs should be accessible to speakers, participants, audience members, and staff. While many organizations may claim accessibility, each facility and activity should be carefully evaluated in conjunction with a checklist and knowledgeable individuals **prior** to being opened to the public.

A Literary Arts Access Checklist may combine the following sections of the *Arts and Humanities Accessibility Checklist* (Step 6):

- Print Materials includes ways to make print available in alternate formats for individuals who cannot use traditional print.
- Assembly Areas includes how to set up integrated and dispersed seating for
 poetry readings and other programs that is required for wheelchair users so they
 may sit within the regular seating area and have a choice of seating.
- **Presentations and Programs** includes communication techniques such as sign language to make readings and other programs accessible.

If you have a gallery or exhibition space, see the "Exhibition and Labeling" sections of the checklist.

In addition, all organizations are strongly encouraged to complete the following sections:

- Policies and Practices;
- Employment;
- Checklist for Existing Facilities;
- Interior Signage;
- Emergency Evacuation; and
- Marketing and Publicity.

Description: Nationally, Poets & Writers Inc. outreaches to older Americans and people in institutions. They offer on-line workshops for people who are not able to leave their homes. Community readings programs currently exist in New York, Chicago, Detroit and California. P&W pays fees to writers giving readings or conducting workshops in New York State, Chicago, and Detroit. The programs encourage community-based groups, including libraries, youth centers, colleges, bookstores, correctional facilities and senior centers to apply for funding; nonprofit status is not required.

The Senior Collaborative Project places writers into senior day care Centers in Marin The California Readings/Workshops Program provides direct support to writers by helping to sponsor organizations match writers' fees. P&W will match between \$50 and \$300 in fee money; applications are accepted on a rolling basis, and must be received eight weeks in advance of an event. In the past year, over 400 writers were funded by the program, 3/4 of them from California.

Poets & Writers Magazine is a bi-monthly, nationally circulated magazine for amateur and professional writers, which includes profiles, interviews, how-to articles, and an extensive list of grants and awards. For more information please see the Web site or call the New York office.
