Smoking Cessation: Degrees of Influence

Our influence over many behaviors may be farreaching. The recent mega study published in *The New England Journal of Medicine*, "The Collective Dynamics of Smoking in a Large Social Network," (http://content.nejm.org/cgi/content/short/358/21/224 9) finds that over the course of 30 years social and personal relationships are found to strongly influence the collective dynamics of smoking. Here are some findings:

Since 1971 the prevalence of smoking in the U.S. has declined from 45% to 21% of the population. The risk of being a smoker was 61% higher if a person had a first degree relationship with the smoker (e.g. a spouse). Conversely the chances of quitting smoking were 67% if a person's spouse quit; 36% if a friend quit; 34% if a co-worker (from a small firm) quit; 25% if a sibling quit. "People are connected and so too is their health connected." Chris Gage, MS ARNP, FSHP stated this in his health unit article: "Become aware of how the opinions and behaviors of others affect you and influence your behaviors for better or worse. The flip side is to be aware that your opinions and behaviors can impact others in your social network." Lead by example.

IMPORTANT TO NOTE: The risks for smokingrelated diseases for former smokers eventually fall to the levels of never-smokers. The sooner one quits the better, as it may take the lungs decades to recover from the ravages of smoking.

The Advisor is also responsible for conceptualizing country program health activities and developing appropriate results expected, milestones and action plans to effectively implement those activities related to malaria. The Advisor shall exercise independent judgment in planning and carrying out tasks, will represent the USG in technical and policy forums, and will take initiative in resolving problems and conflicts. The Advisor will also perform inherently governmental functions such as officially representing USAID at functions, approving policy documents, managing contracts and grants, budgeting, and developing and preparing planning documents and work plans. Specifically, the Advisor will ensure that financial and technical reports (e.g., the annual Malaria Operational Plan) are prepared and submitted as required including contributing to the Annual Operational Plans.

The Advisor will have regular contact and collaborate with various counterparts such as the Ministry of Health (MOH)/ National Malaria Control Center (NMCC), the Global Fund (GF), WHO, UNICEF, World Bank (WB), Malaria Control & Evaluation Partnership in Africa (MACEPA), Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), NGOs and Faith-Based Organizations (FBOs) to design, plan and implement malaria prevention and control activities consistent with the strategy plans of the MOH/NMCC and PMI. The incumbent shall also liaise with PMI backstops in USAID/Washington, counterparts in CDC/Atlanta, and USAID/Zambia personnel working within and overseeing the Mission's activities related to malaria control.

The incumbent must also have an understanding of the social, economic and cultural determinants and implications of the epidemic in Zambia and neighboring countries, as well as have the experience and skills required to help formulate the USG position on malaria and provide advice for important policy decisions as a key representative of the USAID/Zambia Mission. The incumbent will report directly to the PHN Deputy Director.

DESIRED QUALIFICATIONS:

Education: A graduate degree in social science or public health and/or a medical degree with experience implementing malaria programs is required.
