How Has the Recent Flood of MPC Imports Hurt New York's Farmers?

Foreign dairy producers are currently avoiding US tariffs on nonfat dry milk by instead selling Milk Protein Concentrates (MPCs) to be used in products such as cheese spreads, snack foods and coffee creamers. Over the last decade, some MPC imports have undermined the market for nonfat dry milk, costing New York dairy farmers millions of dollars every year. As MPCs have replaced nonfat dry milk in the market, they have driven the price down of milk for New York's farmers and resulted in significant losses in revenue.

Following is a county-by-county breakdown of the number of dairy farms in the state along with the impact to each county of the proliferation of MPCs.
