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POLITICAL - Governance & Legislation



New Iraqi National Flag:

 The Council of Representatives passed a measure to adopt a new design for the Iraqi national flag January 22. The vote was 110 in favor out of 165 in the chamber. The new design removes the three stars from the Saddam-era flag and -- while leaving the words "Allah Akhbar" in green along the center white stripe -- it changes the script from that of Saddam's handwriting to the standard Kufic Arabic script. The design came as an unexpected proposal from Second Deputy Speaker Aref Tayfour. It was one of four designs before the CoR for a vote, and was the first to be voted on. If ratified by the Presidency Council it will be published in the gazette and then be used for a year across Iraq and at Iraqi diplomatic missions overseas.

Iraqi Parliament's First Reading of Draft Amnesty Bill:

 The Amnesty Law, which offers a general amnesty to thousands of detainees held in U.S. and Iraqi prisons, had its first reading in Iraq's parliament January 21. The Prime Minister has publicly supported the law and pressed for urgent passage. Those affected by the law, mostly Sunni Arabs, have been held on suspicion of supporting the Iraqi insurgency. U.S. forces advocate the amnesty bill as an important step toward national reconciliation. The bill will not affect prisoners convicted of, or formally charged with, terrorism or other violent crimes.

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POLITICAL - Governance & Legislation

Asylum Program for Iraqi Translators:

• The Washington Post reports that the U.S. program for granting Special Immigrant Visas (SIVs) to Iraqi translators has fallen short of demand. The program initially covered 50 individuals in 2006, 500 annually for 2007 and 2008, and is scheduled to drop back to 50 in FY 2009. As of September 2007, 429 Iraqi translators (and their families) have been admitted to the U.S. under the SIV program. About 7,000 Iraqi interpreters have worked for U.S. forces since 2003. An amendment proposed by Senator Kennedy to the 2008 defense authorization bill would raise the SIV cap to 5,000 over the next five years.

Iraq's 2008 Budget Stalled:


 Iraqi lawmakers failed to ratify the GOI's 2008 budget during its January 22 session. Parliamentary speaker Mahmud Mashhadani called the heads of Iraq's main political blocs to a meeting after they failed to approve the \$48 billion budget and urged them to pass it when parliament meets again January 25. Leaders of several political parties have voiced complaints with the proposed budget, especially the 17% allocated to the KRG.

USG Contributes \$20 Million for Refugee Health Needs:

 The State Department announced January 17 its contribution of \$20 million to the UN's \$84.8 million health appeal for Iraqi refugees. The USG is the first contributor to this appeal, which was launched in September 2007







Babil Political and Military Leaders Converge on Jurf al-Sakhr:

 PRT Babil and Coalition forces traveled January 23 with the Babil Deputy Governor Hassun Ali Hassun, Deputy Provincial Council Chair Dr. Na'ama Jasim, Iraqi Army Commander Brigadier General Abdul-Amir, Iraqi Police Chief BG Fadhil Raddad, and Hillah Swat Commander BG Abbas Al-Jaburi to Jurf al-Sakhr, a community in north Babil Province, to meet with local leaders. Shaykh Sabah, Local Council Leader and head of the local "awakening council," has led the campaign there to drive out the insurgent groups and restore security to the area; he is now turning his focus to providing essential services. The event underscored the importance of interaction between provincial leaders and local council members.

SECURITY - Situation Update

LTG Raymond Odierno Briefs Progress:

- Lieutenant General Raymond Odierno, MNC-I Commander, gave a situational security update January 17.
 - He reported that since June 2007, attacks across the country have declined by 60%. The attack levels are about the same as early 2005 and periods of 2004.
 - In June 2007, there were almost 1,700 IED incidents; this declined to fewer than 700 in December.
 - From January to December of 2007, ethno-sectarian attacks and deaths decreased over 90% in the Baghdad security districts.
 - LTG Odierno stated, "Although AQI remains a dangerous threat, its capabilities have been diminished. AQI has been pushed out of urban centers like Baghdad, Ramadi, Fallujah and Baqubah and forced into isolated rural areas."

Iraq's Security Forces Playing an Integral Role in Operation Phantom Phoenix:

- Based on Iraqi intelligence collection capabilities, the Iraqi Army located a large weapons cache northeast of Fallujah January 14. The cache consisted of over 90 mortar rounds, blasting caps, and small arms ammunition. The capturing unit estimates that cache contained enough ordnance to construct over 20 IEDs.
- Iraqi Special Operations Forces in Mosul detained a terrorist cell leader whose cell was involved in storing and placing IEDs and car bombs for attacks throughout Mosul.

Iraqi Air Force Graduates New Warrant Officers:

- The Iraqi Air Force Training School graduated 116 new warrant officers from its basic military training course held in Taji January 8.
- The course lasted 60 days and focused on basic military training and professional military education. Other areas of training included military leadership, profession of arms, standards of conduct, self aid and buddy care, security programs, and others. The graduates will receive follow-on technical training on aircraft maintenance.

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ECONOMIC – Economic & Government Capacity Update

IMF Estimates Iraq GDP to Grow 7% in 2008:

The International Monetary Fund estimates that Iragi GDP will grow by 7% in 2008 if Iraq successfully completes the new Stand-By Arrangement (SBA) program and increases oil production. The IMF emphasized in the new SBA report that the GOI's fiscal health depends on increased investment and production in the oil sector. GOI initiatives to meet the growth goal for 2008 include economic reforms and oil re-pricing. The IMF released a statement saying the GOI's 2007 "fiscal stance was successful in containing current spending, but fell short in the implementation of the ambitious investment program, which combined with the difficult security situation prevented the envisaged expansion of oil output. Rising oil prices, however, more than offset the production shortfall, thus helping to preserve fiscal sustainability. High inflation was sharply reduced by appreciating the exchange rate, tightening monetary policy, and controlling government spending." The SBA program also calls for public bank restructuring, which will strengthen public financial management.

Inflation Rates for 2007 Significant Reduction from 2006:

According to the GOI's December Consumer Price Index, headline inflation rose 0.8%, bringing the full-year 2007 inflation to 4.7%, an impressive drop from a rate of 64.8% just a year ago. Core inflation (excluding fuel/transport) decreased from 15.4% in November to 12.3% in December. The Central Bank's monetary tightening policy is largely responsible for the reduction in the inflation rate.

Oil Minister Reinforces Stance Against KRG Signed Contracts:


Iraqi Oil Minister Hussein al-Shahristani has maintained that contracts signed with the KRG are illegal and that any company that signs such contracts will not be allowed to purchase Iraqi oil or bid on future hydrocarbon projects. SK Energy, a South Korean refiner, has had Iraqi crude shipments cut recently as it was a member of a consortium which signed a deal with the KRG. SK Energy is expected to increase imports from Iraq's neighboring countries. Other companies are trying to find ways around the Minister of Oil's declaration. India's Reliant Oil signed an oil deal with the KRG in 2006; since Shahristani previously set February 2007 as the date after which any oil contracts signed with the KRG would be invalid, Reliant does not expect to be affected. Reliant intends to pre-register with the Ministry of Oil by the January 31st pre-registration deadline announced by the Oil Ministry for its upcoming tendering of upstream licensing production-sharing agreements and possibly technical service agreements, to begin later this year.


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
ECONOMIC – Crude Oil Export



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ECONOMIC – Total Critical Refined Product Supplies





GOI Ministries Review Plan to Increase Power Grid Security:

The GOI Ministries of Defense and Interior are currently reviewing a plan to increase security for Iraq's power grid. The Ministry of Electricity, which blames sabotage as the main cause for current power shortages, has endorsed the plan, The plan calls for additional security forces to protect the national grid. Additionally, the pylon pathways used to distribute power would be diverted to regions with fewer incidents of violence. Electric stations would be relocated to these regions.


Daily Electricity Supplied and Estimated Demand in Irag Since January 2004

UN Envoy to Iraq Touts Progress:

The top UN envoy in Iraq, Staffan de Mistura, told the UN Security Council January 22 that significant progress has been made in Iraq in the areas of security, the economy, on the political front, and by the UN. The GOI, he said, "is signaling that it recognizes 2008 as the year to demonstrate its ability to administer a state that enjoys the broadest support and can deliver basic services and security guarantees." De Mistura also said that future progress requires rapidly enacting key legislation and providing economic benefits and essential services for Iraqis.
 "[Progress] needs to be sustained by political activities and dialogue among the Iraqis" he said. De Mistura's brief echoed UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon's recent report on Iraq.

Iranian President Expected to Visit Iraq:

 Iraq's Deputy Foreign Minister, Labeed Abawi, told Reuters January 23 that President Mahmud Ahmadinejad had accepted an invitation from President Talabani to visit Baghdad. Reuters reports this would be "a landmark trip that would make him [Ahmadinejad] the first leader of Iran to visit its former foe." An unidentified Iranian aide to Ahmadinejad said he had heard about the visit, but that no date had been set.
