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South Africa, Republic of Poultry and Products Annual 2004

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Report Highlights:

Broiler production reached 808,000 tons in 2003 but a small decrease in production is foreseen for 2004. This is mainly due to increased import competition brought about by the strong SA rand. The exchange rate, currently about R6.68 to the Dollar after a 2002 average of R10.52 was recorded, is putting pressure on domestic prices, which is influencing expansion plans.

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Summary

South Africa's broiler production in 2003 is estimated at 808,000 tons, 6.3% more than in 2002. A small decrease in production is expected for 2004 as imports increase due to the strong SA Rand. Total broiler meat imports reached about 50,000 tons in 2003. MRM (Mechanically Removed Meat) and offal imports amounted to about 75,000 tons for a total of 125,000 tons. In contrast total imports amounted to about 80,000 tons in 2002 and 64,000 tons in 2001. The following table contains the type of product imported over the past three years:

Imports are currently still increasing but the anti-dumping duty on US bone in cuts is only due to be lifted in July 2005 when the US will again be able to compete. Brazil, China and Canada are currently the main suppliers.

Production

Broiler meat production in 2003 is estimated at 808,000 tons. This amounts to 612 million birds, or 11.8 million per week. Unit weight is taken at 1.32 kg. (without giblets). This is still 6.3% more than the estimated 760,000 tons, or 11.1 million per week produced in 2002. A small decrease in production is expected for 2004 as the strong SA Rand allows more competitive imports but this should turn around again in 2005.

Annual slaughter for 2003 is taken as 612 million birds at 1.91 kg. live and 1.32 kg. carcass weight. That means,

Total live weight production was 1,169,000 tons, Chicken meat production amounted to 808,000 tons, Offal production amounted to 117,000 tons, And feathers, entrails and blood amounted to 245,000 tons.

Offal production included:

Gizzards 29,400 tons, Livers and hearts 17,750 tons, Necks 34,900 tons, Feet 34,900 tons, Total offal 116,950 tons.

While offal is obviously consumed in some way or another, we are more interested in the chicken meat production and consumption.

The imports controversy then surfaces; the following table compares the type of product imported over the past three years:

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Obviously whole birds and discernable cuts are the result of a conscious effort to produce young chicken meat, although some of the cuts could be from depleted breeders and layers. The total meat shown in the table above, 50,137 tons for 2003, should thus be taken as chicken meat imports.

Mechanically Removed Meat (MRM) is protein and fat extracted from chicken carcasses by a pressure process and the end result is a frozen paste. It is a by- and not a primary product. It is not sold in the retail market, cannot be consumed in its original form and is only used in the production of processed and canned meat products. It should thus be excluded from the chicken meat trade data in the PS&D.

Offal consists of feet, skins, liver, necks, hearts and stomach (heads not allowed). Liver and skins are used in processed meats, while some of the products are available in the retail market, but apparently the bulk of the imports consist of chicken feet. Again it is not a primary but a by-product and should be excluded from chicken meat imports.

Consumption

If only the poultry meat imports are added to production, and the small exports subtracted, domestic consumption amounted to about 853,000 tons in 2003 and is likely to reach about 855,000 in 2004.

To put the industry in perspective we can compare per capita consumption of the different meats as supplied by the Department of Agriculture.

Per capita poultry consumption first passed red meat consumption in 1998/99 and has since increased the gap. Lamb and pork per capita consumption is small, pork consumption is limited by religious custom while mutton production has decreased as a result of excessive stock theft.

The main reason for chicken meat's success is price, with whole broiler retail prices little more than half the price charged for beef as shown in the following table.

The annual local price increase in Rand terms amounted to 1.3% between May 2003 and 2004, showing that food price inflation is under control.

Trade

Poultry meat trade has been a controversial subject in South Africa with an anti dumping levy on some US chicken imports in force. Total imports of poultry meat and products reached 153,000 tons in 2003 compared to 94,000 tons in 2002, probably due to the strong SA Rand. The total imports include turkey and other poultry meat and products, with chicken meat and products at 125,427 tons. Forty percent of the 2003 chicken product imports, or about 50,000 tons, was chicken meat and 60%, about 75,000 tons, was products such as mechanically removed meat (MRM) and offal, aimed at the lower end of the market. From January to May 2004 imports shows another 15% increase compared to the same period in 2003. The following table shows total poultry meat and offal imports over the past three years.

The first category of imports is whole birds, which only constituted 6.5% of total chicken and product imports in 2003. From January to May 2004 imports increased by 72% compared to the same period the previous year but is still not a major factor. Average Customs reported landed price in 2003 was R4.83/kg. compared to R5.71 in 2002, the decrease probably mainly due to the exchange rate variation.

The second category is mechanically recovered meat (MRM) used in the processing and canning industry. This is not a direct consumption product but a cheap meat substitute, which constituted 37.5% of chicken and chicken product imports in 2003. The average landed price was R2.44/kg. in 2004 compared to R2.36/kg. in 2002.

Boneless cuts (mainly chicken breasts) are a high quality product also used in the food service industry. It formed about 9% of chicken imports in 2003 with a higher landed price, R8.18/kg. in 2003 compared to R12.47/kg. in 2002.

Chicken offal is a bigger category, about 22.5% of the total chicken and products imports, coming in at R2.41/kg. in 2003 and R2.47/kg. in 2002. It consists of feet, skins, liver, necks, hearts and stomach (heads not allowed). Apparently the bulk of the imports consist of chicken feet.

The following category, bone in cuts, include the chicken leg quarters which had the anti dumping duty against the US product instituted in 2000. It formed 24.4% of the 2003 imports, the US being replaced as a supplier by Brazil and Canada. The quoted 2003 landed price was R4.45/kg. compared to R4.88 in 2002.

The anti dumping duty is due to be lifted in July 2005 if no further application to extend the duty is lodged.

Health

The South African veterinary services are currently busy containing an outbreak of bird flu under ostriches in the Eastern Cape. The area has been put under quarantine and all the birds in the affected area are being culled. The South African government has in the meantime curtailed all South African exports of poultry meat until the situation is resolved. Fortunately the outbreak is in an isolated area, 300 kms. from the closest big commercial poultry producers.

Production

Domestic turkey production is still very small although a major producer has surfaced promising year round supplies. The market is, however, mainly based on the duty free imports. Whole bird imports nearly doubled to more than 2,000 tons in 2003, mainly as a result of the strong SA Rand. The US supplied 429 tons as shown in the following table.

Turkey cuts and edible offal imports also doubled to about 25,400 tons, with the US supplying 4,956 tons. Unfortunately the Customs data does not differentiate between the various products, and the assumption is that the bulk of the imports consist of MRM and offal. This is borne out by the fact that the average 2003 reported landed price for whole birds is about R12.65 while the average price for cuts and offal is R3.31/kg.
