

Recipe

CRISPY CHICKEN SALAD

- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds
- 3 tablespoons sugar, divided
- ½ cup olive oil
- 2 tablespoons cider vinegar
- ½ teaspoon salt

Dash hot pepper sauce

- 4 cups chopped lettuce
- 2 cups cubed cooked chicken
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups chow mien noodles
- 1 can (20 oz) unsweetened pineapple tidbits, drained and patted dry
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 green onion, chopped

In a small skillet, melt butter over medium heat. Add almonds; cook and stir for 3-4 minutes or until toasted. Sprinkle with 1 tablespoon sugar; cook and stir 2-3 minutes longer or until sugar is melted. Spread on foil to cool.

For dressing, in a jar with a tight-fitting lid, combine the oil, vinegar, salt, hot pepper sauce and remaining sugar; shake until sugar is dissolved.

In a large bowl, combine the lettuce, chicken, noodles, pineapple, celery and onion. Shake dressing and drizzle over salad; toss to coat. Break apart sugared almonds, sprinkle over salad. Serve at once.

Yield: 8 servings







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
