"Six months of planning at Group 3 went into the operation," said Black. "We had to meet regularly and often to accomplish the job." Black said that the reason that CAP was so successful this year was the training of its members and the organizational plan. ### **Basic Cadet School at MARB**

The first step in California Wing's Integrated Leadership Program (ILP) is Basic Cadet School (BCS). Students learn the basics of what CAP has to offer and what is required of each cadet. Classes cover every aspect of CAP's three missions, Cadet Programs, Aerospace Education, and Emergency Services.

On the 27<sup>th</sup> of June 2008, 30 students and 21 cadets staff gathered at March Air Reserve Base for a weekend long learning experience. C/2Lt Conor Doyle was the cadet commander, organizing all areas of the teaching and training environment.

Instruction was given in each area needed to promote to Airman, and the efforts paid off as 28 of the 29 students testing passed their leadership test and over half passed PT. These results will be sent back to each squad-

ron to allow them to promote on completion of the rest of their requirements.

The weekend was a success, in part, because of all the hard work put in by the flight of logistics staff. They pitched in to help out in everything from food preparation and clean-up to cleaning the rest rooms. The work project of pulling weeds that we had in return for the use of the facility was done with the same eagerness and energy they applied to all tasks.

A special "Thank you" to all the senior members—both seasoned warriors and new recruits. Your working together to advance the cadet program for these cadets will follow them through their CAP experience. The weekend on all levels was a great success.
