



CAUSE OF EQUINE DEATHS, INDIANA 2001 DYSTOCIA AND OTHER REPRODUCTIVE PROBLEMS

Dystocia- Dystocia is a term that describes any type of foaling problem that prevents the foal from being delivered without assistance. Dystocial can either be fetal (foal) in nature, or maternal (mare). Maternal dsytocia can include failure of the uterus to contract, torsion (twisting) of the uteris, or pelvic problems that prevent the foal from passing through the birth canal. Fetal dystocias include the foal being improperly positioned (e.g. head or leg back, breech) and malformation of the foal. Although dystocia is not a common problem in mares, it can be very serious, and frequently the mare and/or the foal are lost. It is imperative to call a veterinarian as soon as you suspect a dystocia.
