CITIZENSHIP WORKSHOP

Congresswoman Solis hosted a Citizenship Forum, in which legal residents had an opportunity to file for naturalization before the scheduled fee increases. The filing fees for citizenship applications are scheduled to increase from \$400 to \$675 as early as June 1, 2007. More than 400 people took advantage of this workshop where they received free assistance with completing forms in Cantonese, English, Mandarin Chinese, Korean, Spanish, and Taiwanese.
