A Tiger in the Lab?

The Refuge's fishing and touring programs are widely known as outstanding recreational opportunities. But the Visitor Center's Wildlife Learning Lab offers "up close and personal" animal experiences. The Lab features an active honeybee hive, several native fishes, and numerous displays about the Refuge's natural history. The Lab also hosts one of Colorado's most common amphibians — the tiger salamander (Ambystoma tigrinum).



Tiger salamanders are the largest land-dwelling salamanders (reaching up to 14 inches in length) and have a widely varied diet which includes the larvae of such insects as caddis flies, midges, and mayflies. Tiger salamanders are both hunters and hunted, as larger animals such as raccoons, white pelicans and largemouth bass all consume salamanders.

With such a long list of predators, the tiger salamander's survival might seem in doubt. Fortunately, the Refuge's lakes and wetlands provide excellent habitat for tiger salamanders throughout their life cycle. That cycle begins each spring when females lay their eggs in shallow water. Salamander eggs hatch into larvae which look much like adults, except for six feathery-looking gills along the neck. Larvae normally shed their gills as they transform into air-breathing adults during the summer of their first year. But if environmental conditions outside the water they are born into appear unfavorable, as in drought years,

they will retain their gills into adulthood. This condition is called *neoteny*, and is just one of the survival mechanisms which allow this amphibian to adapt and thrive on the Refuge.

Be sure to check out the Wildlife Learning Lab, see all it has to offer and spend a moment with the Refuge's resident *tiger*.


