# The Bald Eagle - Front Range Migrant and Resident

The bald eagle (Haliaeetus leucocephalus) is found only in North America. It is one of our continent's largest raptors. They measure about 30 inches in length and the wingspan is 72-84 inches. Adult males weigh about 8 to 9 pounds. The females are slightly larger, about 10 to 14 pounds. Bald eagles were placed on the U.S. Endangered Species List in 1967. They were downlisted to threatened in 1995 in all states except Alaska.

The Arsenal's relationship with this species began in 1986 when a communal roost of bald eagles was discovered on First Creek. This discovery prompted involvement from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

In the winter, bald eagles are regular visitors to the Refuge. Most birds arrive around the third week in January when their numbers are the highest at the communal nightly roost. In the last few years, the count

during peak viewing time has been as many as 22 birds. The number peaks as birds migrate from southern Canada and states north of Colorado. Eagles migrate south when their preferred food, fish and waterfowl, becomes unavailable (i.e. the lakes freeze up). There are local Front Range birds as well. At least ten eagle nests exist along the Northern Front Range.

Towards the end of winter, adult breeding pairs will leave the roosts and fly back to their nesting sites. Sub-adult non-breeders will remain longer. The breeding pair at the Refuge will stay at the communal roost through January before roosting in their nesting territory. The female should lay eggs around mid-February. Service biologists hope the pair will continue to be successful with


#### Wild Treks Drop-in Program
