ANOTHER WINTER STORM WILL IMPACT THE SIERRA NEVADA AND TEHACHAPI MOUNTAINS ON WEDNESDAY AND WEDNESDAY NIGHT WITH MODERATE SNOWFALL ACCUMULATIONS POSSIBLE. AT THIS TIME SNOWFALL OF 5 TO 10 INCHES APPEARS LIKELY FOR ELEVATIONS ABOVE 4000 FEET. THE HIGHEST SNOWFALL AMOUNTS WILL BE IN THE YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK AREA...WITH LESSER AMOUNTS FURTHER SOUTH. A FEW INCHES OF SNOW WILL ALSO BE POSSIBLE DOWN TO ABOUT 2000 FEET WITH THIS STORM...WHICH WOULD IMPACT THE FOOTHILL COMMUNITIES OF MARIPOSA... COARSEGOLD AND AUBERRY.

# Amgen Bicycle Tour of California Coming to Yosemite Area

The largest cycling event in America, the 2009 Amgen Tour of California is a Tour de France-style cycling road race that challenges the world's top professional cycling teams to compete along a demanding, recently expanded, 750-mile course from Sacramento to Escondido from February 14-22, 2009. For the first time, the Tour will be passing through the Yosemite National Park area with the course going through the gateway communities of Mariposa and Oakhurst. The Yosemite portion, Stage 4, will occur midday on Wednesday, February 18.

Visitors entering and exiting the park via Highways 41 (from the south) and 140 (from the west) can expect short traffic delays as the race travels through this region. The delays are expected to last no more than 45 minutes and will occur between noon and 2:00 pm. Park visitors should expect these short delays and can utilize the time watching over 100 world-class cyclists biking through the region for the first time. Viewing of the event is encouraged in downtown Mariposa and Oakhurst, as well as pull-outs along the highway. All traffic delays will be conducted by the California Highway Patrol.

At the conclusion of the Stage, there will be a Lifestyle Festival in Old Town Clovis. In addition to awards presented to the riders, tables with vendors and personnel from local area attractions will be in attendance. National Park Service representatives will attend the Festival to interact with the media and answer questions about Yosemite National Park.

# The Month of Hearts and Love, Balanced Health sponsored by Balanced Rock Foundation

February 6, 2009 was National Wear Red Day, a national awareness initiative to spread the message that heart disease is the primary killer of women. Cardiovascular death is responsible for 40% of all women's death in America, more than breast cancer! Heart Attacks and early warning signs of heart disease differ in presentation between women and men. This has not been recognized by individual women or by the physicians who take care of them.

Women may have vague symptoms of profound weakness, shortness of breath, unusual fatigue, and dizziness. They may sweat for no apparent reason or describe having flu like symptoms for a month at a time. One third of women experience no chest pain at all when having a heart attack!

Risk factors for heart attacks are the same as for men with the addition of menopause. To remind you, those risks are high blood pressure, high cholesterol, being overweight, especially around the middle, smoking, and physical inactivity. We cannot control or family history nor our age or race. We can make conscious choices to take action against life styles that promote cardiovascular disease and heart attacks. No matter how young you are you can stop smoking. Become physically active and establish a healthy weight. Eat fresh vegetables and fruits. Limit processed grains, sweets, and sodas. Limits fats and choose your proteins wisely.

If you are a woman who has even one risk factor, your chance of developing heart disease doubles. Listen to your body's messages and seek medical attention for even vague symptoms. I ask that you take the opportunity to love yourself this Valentines Day. It is never too early to begin improving heart health.

# Rehabilitate Curry Village Lounge and Registration Buildings

Registration Building – getting ready to place concrete slab Tuesday and Thursday.

Lounge Building - forming for porch foundations with concrete placement on Tue/Thurs.

Amphitheatre – roof framing.

Site utilities – buildings are now getting power from Curry Pavilion.

**Integrated Utilities Phase 2a** (multiple utilities from Ice Rink to Boys Town to North end of Lower Pines CG)

Complete manhole testing.

Remove manhole bypasses once they pass testing.

Flush and disinfect water lines.

Installation of dry utilities through Boys Town and Curry Parking.

Begin work on modifications to the Housekeeping lift station next week.

# **IUMP 2A/3A**

Beginning Monday, February 9 Erick Ammon Inc. will be continuing with the power and communication line installation through Curry Village, and therefore will require another series of road closures. As the crew works their way along Curry Village Drive, the road closure will move west.

The plan is to close the section between the Registration Exit Road and the Curry Village parking lot on the first day. By the second day the crew should be at the section between the Registration Entrance and Exit Roads. On the third day the crew is planning to be in the area in front of the Ice Rink. This final section will not be a full road closure, just one lane at a time.

With the current unpredictable weather there is the potential for delays. It would be greatly appreciated if there was a bit of flexibility involved in the implementation of this plan. For example, the most recent weather update is predicting rain for Monday. If this is accurate, and the weather is too wet to safely trench, the plans will start on Tuesday.

**West Village Utility Corridor** (sewer line from Yosemite School to Oak Lane to Ranger Y) Complete work on the sewer lines near the school.

Begin work on sewer line from the Ranger Club to Northside Drive.

# **Sanitary Sewer Capital Improvements** (CIP 2)

Replace a deteriorated sewer line in Housekeeping Camp.

Slurry seal several abandoned lines.

Begin work on a sewer clean out and lateral at the Visitor Center.

# **Hodgdon Meadow Generator**

The switch from PG&E overhead lines to new underground lines is scheduled for Wed, February 4 from 10:00 am until 2:00 pm. This will result in a temporary power outage.

# Valley Loop Road

Southside Drive between Pohono Bridge and Sentinel Bridge is now open to traffic with intermittent traffic delays associated with remaining curb and culvert work, as well as revegetation work. Southside Drive Traffic will remain 2-way between El Capitan Crossover to Sentinel Bridge thru May 2009.

Northside Drive is now closed between the west end of Yosemite Lodge and El Capitan Picnic Area. Crews are working on drainage repairs this winter and next spring/summer they will be paving this area. This segment Northside Drive will remain closed thru May 2009. Two way access to El Capitan Picnic Area is available from El Capitan Crossover until February 27th.

Design of the ventilation system is ongoing.

Fan shafts, bearings and louvers are being installed.

Electrical duck back is being built.

# Yosemite National Park Announces Public Scoping for the Scenic Vista Management Plan Environmental Assessment

Yosemite National Park is announcing the public scoping period for the Scenic Vista Management Plan Environmental Assessment (EA). Public scoping comments will be used to assist the park in developing a range of reasonable and feasible project alternatives that meet the purpose and need, including a no action alternative, and then analyzing the environmental effects of each alternative. A 30-day public scoping period for this EA will open on February 12, 2009 and will extend through March 13, 2009. Written comments should be postmarked no later than March 13, 2009

Yosemite National Park was originally set aside for preservation due to its outstanding scenery. In 1851, Dr. Lafayette Bunnell, one of the first Europeans to gaze on Yosemite's beauty, described the supreme grandeur of Yosemite Valley: "... the clouds...partially dimmed the higher cliffs and mountains. This obscurity of vision but increased the awe with which I beheld it, and as I looked, a peculiar exalted sensation seemed to fill my whole being."

Millions of modern-day explorers have experienced this same view. Today, we call it Tunnel View. It's just one of many iconic views and vistas for which Yosemite is famous.

The purpose of the Scenic Vista Management Plan is to:

- •Protect Yosemite's historic viewsheds and the natural processes that created them.
- •Preserve the historic & cultural contexts in which the viewpoints were created.
- •Restore visitor use opportunities associated with lost vistas.
- •Where historic viewpoints cannot be rehabilitated, identify potentially new views or vistas.
  - •Restore or maintain vistas by restoring natural species composition, structure, and function to systems or by using traditional American Indian management practices.

A public open house will take place on February 25, 2009 from 1pm to 4pm in the Valley Visitor Center Auditorium in Yosemite Valley. Park Admission fees will be waived for those attending the open house.

# Yosemite National Park Announces Public Scoping for the Rehabilitation of the Badger Pass Ski Lodge Environmental Assessment

Yosemite National Park is announcing the public scoping period for the Badger Pass Ski Lodge Rehabilitation Environmental Assessment (EA). Public scoping comments will be used to assist the park in developing a range of reasonable and feasible project alternatives that meet the purpose and need, including a no action alternative, and then analyzing the environmental effects of each alternative. A 30-day public scoping period for this EA will open on January 14, 2009 and will extend through February 13, 2009. Written comments should be postmarked no later than February 13, 2009

The Badger Pass Ski Lodge, constructed in 1935, is historically significant as the first alpine ski resort in California and as an example of NPS Rustic architecture with Swiss chalet influences. The project area is located at an elevation of 7200 feet at the Badger Pass Ski Area, midway between Wawona and Yosemite Valley in Yosemite National Park. The lodge is situated in Monroe Meadow on the south side of Glacier Point Road, approximately 5.1 miles east of Chinquapin. The lodge is accessible year round via Glacier Point Road and has served as a family ski area and winter recreation center in Yosemite since 1935.

The purpose of the rehabilitation project is to provide a phased program for rehabilitation of the Badger Pass Ski Lodge that will:

- Maintain and protect the integrity of the historic Badger Pass Day Lodge and character-defining features of the Badger Pass cultural landscape;
- Treat critical deck, structural, and drainage deficiencies contributing to past and ongoing water-intrusion damage;
- Replace temporary structures with permanent buildings of compatible construction to maintain continued ski

area operations; and

• Maintain ski area service and support functions while protecting the winter recreation visitor experience at Badger Pass Ski Area.

The rehabilitation would protect areas of primary historical significance, while allowing flexibility to accommodate the needs associated with current and future Ski Area use in non-character-defining areas.

Repair and rehabilitation of the ski lodge are necessary to protect its historic integrity, assure visitor safety, and maintain ski-area visitor services while preserving the natural and cultural resources at the ski area. Therefore, an environmental assessment will evaluate potential environmental impacts associated with the rehabilitation project.

A public open house will take place on January 28, 2009 from 1pm to 4pm in the Valley Visitor Center Auditorium in Yosemite Valley. Park Admission fees will be waived for those attending the open house.

An additional public scoping meeting is scheduled for the afternoon of Friday, February 6, 2009 from 2:00 pm to 4:00 pm in the Snow Flake Room at Badger Pass Ski Area.

**Subject:** African American History Month Observance 2009

The month of February is African American History Month. This year's theme is: "The Quest for Black Citizenship in the Americas." This theme provides numerous opportunities for dialogue and promoting a better understanding and appreciation of the struggles, significant accomplishments and contributions of African Americans to this Nation and the world.

This year marks several events that are important to African American history. On January 20, 2009, the world witnessed the inauguration of the first American president of African descent, Barack H. Obama. February 10 is the centennial of the *National Association for the Advancement of Colored People*. There will be celebrations and observances honoring the NAACP throughout the year. February 12 is the bicentennial of the birth of Abraham Lincoln whose Emancipation Proclamation was a watershed event in our history.

Throughout the year, the National Park Service tells the stories of African Americans at park sites including Boston African American National Historical Site, MA; George Washington Carver National Monument, MO; Mary McLeod Bethune Council House National Historic Site, DC; and Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historic Site, GA. Numerous other parks, such as New Bedford Whaling National Historical Park, MA, and Natchez National Historical Park, MS, reflect important African American themes in addition to the primary historical reasons for which those parks were recognized.

I invite you to learn more about African American History in our parks by visiting the National Park Service "Our Shared History – African American History" website (<a href="http://www.nps.gov/history/aahistory/">http://www.nps.gov/history/aahistory/</a>). Additionally, the African American Experience Fund (<a href="http://www.aaexperience.org/">http://www.aaexperience.org/</a>), an arm of the National Park Foundation, has launched an interactive map (<a href="http://www.aaexperience.org/park\_site\_map.htm">http://www.aaexperience.org/park\_site\_map.htm</a>) that allows the public to locate parks that celebrate African American history and contributions.

Observances for African American History Month provide reaffirmation of our determination to heighten understanding of the African American experience. **READ Training:** Yosemite National Park will be offering a Resource Advisor course May 12th- 14th, 2009, in Yosemite Valley, California. This course is intended to provide employees with the background to serve as a Resource Advisor (READ) during fire management actions. Resource Advisors generally work with fire managers to convey concerns about natural, cultural and wilderness resources. The course will focus on issues and challenges of the Central Sierra region, but will provide participants with strategies and tools that can be applied anywhere. Information will be presented in sufficient detail to serve as a refresher for present resource advisors and general enough to be useful for those who have never served in this capacity.

**PARTICIPANTS:** Employees that frequently serve as resource advisors include fire managers, botanists, ecologists, biologists, hydrologists, geologists, foresters, GIS specialists and cultural resource specialists. The local Fire Management Officer (FMO) will determine qualifications for the resource advisor position. A fireline-qualified Resource Advisor however, will hold a valid Red Card and pass the physical test at the arduous level. The local FMO will authorize the inclusion of "READ" as a qualification on the Red Card. Completion of these tasks is <u>not</u> required prior to participating in this course. The course is also valuable for those managing resources on public lands, but with no interest in serving as resource advisors, to become familiar with fire management organization and the types and formats of resources data that benefit the resource advisor during the course of his or her duties.

While the course has no tuition fee, the participant's home unit(s) must cover travel expenses.

**COURSE DATES AND LOCATION:** The course will be held from May 12th - 14th, 2009, in Yosemite Valley, California, Yosemite National Park. Tuesday and Wednesday will consist of classroom presentation. Thursday the 14th will be an optional field trip to visit several prescribed burns and wildland fires in Yosemite.
