"The Connection" deals with an unusual theme in a non-conventional and exceptionally frank manner. Its subject is drug addiction and its locale is a Manhattan loft apartment where eight addicts are gathered, waiting for their "connection" to make a heroin delivery. To make payment for the delivery, they have allowed a would-be documentary filmmaker to photograph them while they play jazz and relate anecdotes about themselves and their backgrounds.

The actors perform with brutal clarity, and the camera of Arthur Ornitz sucsphere of the squalid room. The dialog is not without its humorous moments, containing considerable wry wit.

Since its release, "The Connection" has been the center of a censorship battle because of the repeated use of a four-letter word, a term used by addicts in referring to heroin. However, as the New York Supreme Court expressed it, "In most instances, the word is not used in its usual connotation but as o definitive expression of the language of the narcotic. At most, the word may be classified as vulgar, but it is not obscene."
"I found it fascinating as an exhibit of bravura film-making . . . it does not compromise or sensationalize. The fourletter words are there when they have to be there, when the characters would use them naturally. . . (Director) Clarke has done an extraordinary job of cinematizing the original material. Holding to the single setting of the play, her picture becomes a documentary-life investigation of the flat and its inhabitants. As in Antonioni's films, the camera insists that we look...

## FORTY-FOURTH BROOKHAVEN LECTURE

Large-scale digital computers have in the last few years become an ever more important adjunct to scientific research. However, the effective use of such complex and expensive equipment would have been seriously impeded without the development of machine-independent programming languages such as Fortran and Algol. Such languages make it possible to write complicated programs without special study of the design idiosyncracies of the machine to be used.

As a member of the original SHARE Fortran Committee, John Denes has made important contributions to the development of Fortran, and, in his work in the Applied Mathematics Department, he has been vitally concerned with the growing computer complex at Brookhaven. His lecture will outline the considerations that enter into the creation of relatively efficient languages for talking to computers, and should provide the non-specialist with an interesting insight into the inner problems of computer use.
