One of Maestro Levine's favorite operatic ensembles, this finely-crafted scene represents the culmination of composer Giuseppe Verdi's prolific career. *Falstaff*, Verdi's final operatic work, which is based on Shakespeare's *Henry IV* and *The Merry Wives of Windsor*, is a piece rampant with trickery and mayhem. In this scene, the opera's finale, Sir John Falstaff proclaims that "*Tutto nel mondo è burla*" — all the world is folly and all are figures of fun.

"Ain't it a pretty night" from Susannah by Carlisle Floyd

Susannah, which received its premiere in 1955 at Florida State University, is one of the most-performed American operas in history. Sung today by a talented alumna of Washington National Opera's Domingo-Cafritz Young Artist Program, "Ain't it a pretty night?" is arguably the most recognized piece of Mr. Floyd's body of work. The aria, which has been added to the repertoires of such distinguished artists as Phyllis Curtin, Renée Fleming and Dawn Upshaw, distills all of Susannah's small town frustrations and farreaching dreams into a lush gem of an aria.

In this, Mr. Gaddes' most beloved scene from Mozart's treasured opera, Count Almaviva and company are embroiled in a comic mess of deception and mistaken identity. The jealous Count suspects the page boy Cherubino might be lurking around his wife, and when the gardener Antonio rushes in to tell him a man has just jumped into the geraniums, Figaro, Susanna and the Countess are forced to invent fantastic stories to cover Cherubino's tracks — a task that gets more complicated by the moment. This musically and dramatically delightful scene brings the second act of *Le nozze di Figaro* to a close.

"Song to the Moon" from Rusalka by Antonín Dvořák

In *Rusalka*, the fairy tale of *The Little Mermaid* is brought to the operatic stage by the symphonic master, Antonin Dvořák. Rusalka, a water nymph, has fallen in love with a handsome young prince and longs to become human in order to be with him. Rusalka confesses to the moon the secret of her longing and asks the moon to tell the prince of her love in an aria famous as one of the most romantic yet most chaste of all operatic love songs. The lamenting melodic lines evoke beauty, longing and serenity. Tonight, this aria is our love song for the artistry of Leontyne Price.

BIOGRAPHIES

Plácido Domingo has sung 126 roles, more than any other leading tenor in history. He has performed at every important opera house, recorded 102 operas, won 11 Grammy Awards and appeared in more than 50 videos and three major opera films. He has also conducted many of the world's great opera ensembles and orchestras, and he is General Director of Washington National Opera and Los Angeles Opera. He is a Commander of France's Legion of Honor and an Honorary Knight of the British Empire; he has been a Kennedy Center Honoree and has received the U.S. Medal of Freedom and the World Award for Humanitarian Causes. In 2008, Domingo sang at the Papal mass during Pope Benedict XVI's visit to Washington, performed at the closing ceremonies of the Beijing Olympics and celebrated his fortieth anniversary at the Metropolitan Opera. In 2009, the Madrid-born artist will mark his fiftieth anniversary in opera.

Metropolitan Opera star **Susan Graham** launched the 2008-9 season hosting *The Met: Live in HD* on opening night, interviewing Martha Stewart, New York's Mayor Bloomberg and a host of other celebrities. The Grammy Award-winner from Midland, Texas captivates audiences with her voice, graceful stature and acting. She sang at President Bush's January 2005 Inauguration, at every major opera house in the world and calls the Metropolitan Opera her home. Graham was even honored by her home town with an annual "Susan Graham Day," September 5. This year, Graham — a "Commandeur dans l'ordre des Arts et des Lettres," France's highest artistic honor — hosts the *Opera News* Awards in New York and sings at the Metropolitan Opera and Carnegie Hall, as well as in Berlin, Brussels, Buenos Aires, Copenhagen, London, Paris, Prague and Vienna. Graham's newest CD is *Un frisson français*, a survey of French songs.

Soprano **Sondra Radvanovsky**'s dramatic stage presence and stunning vocal qualities have firmly established her as one of the rising stars on the international stage today. She has been hailed as one of the great Verdi singers of the new generation and critically acclaimed for her performances as Roxanne in *Cyrano de Bergerac*, Leonora in *Il trovatore*, Violetta in *La traviata*, Hélène in *Les vêpres Siciliennes* and Elisabetta in *Don Carlo*. Sondra has appeared at the Metropolitan Opera, the Royal Opera House Covent Garden, the Cologne Opera, l'Opéra de Paris, Vienna Staatsoper, Teatro alla Scala, and in Toronto, Moscow, Chicago and Japan. In addition to her appearance in Washington, D.C., this season features a return to LA Opera for her debut in the title role of *Suor Angelica* and to the Metropolitan Opera in one of her signature roles, Leonora in Verdi's *Il trovatore*. She will reprise this role at the Royal Opera House Covent Garden in the spring.
