### A. Program Level Narrative

## **Program Performance Summary:**

Background: Viet Nam is a low-income country in transition, from a centrally planned to market-oriented economy. After a decade of renovation Vietnam has achieved remarkable progress in social and economic spheres. Life expectancy has increased to nearly 68 years and adult literacy has been maintained at over 90%. Viet Nam ranks 101 out of 162 countries in terms of the Human Development Index (0.68), which is fairly high with its current level of GDP per capita of less than US\$400. Reforms continue in trade policy, private sector development, banking, state enterprises and public expenditure management as well as public administration and legal system. The Socio-Economic Development Strategy to 2010 sets forth the targets of highest priority for maintaining rapid and stable economic growth, poverty reduction and social equity, improving social security network, and providing opportunities for vulnerable social groups to integrate into community. Vietnam's development goals are closely linked to the Comprehensive Poverty Reduction and Growth Strategy (CPRGS), which is driven by a genuine concern for poverty reduction and improved quality of life for all citizens. The emerging private sector has made a robust growth for the last two years and the Fifth Party Plenum has recognized its role and contribution to sustainable employment creation and poverty reduction. The Legal System Development Strategy to 2010 has been approved that enables Vietnam to be better adapted to undertake the required renovation.

Challenges: Unfortunately, as these "internal drivers" of development have been strengthening, the global context has worsening dramatically, which threatens Vietnam's goal of faster growth and poverty reduction and other development targets. Despite some fairly notable improvements to the Foreign Direct Investment (FDI) legal regime, FDI flows to the country have experienced up and down but on the decline tendency since the Asian Financial Crisis. Poverty reduction is put on the high agenda of the GVN development strategy. The number of poor households in Viet Nam in early 2001 was 2.8 million, accounting for over 17% of the population. Nearly 90% of the poor live in rural areas, who are often farmers with low levels of education, and limited access to land, capital, technology, information and basic social services. The poor are also particularly vulnerable to natural disasters, which frequently occur in Viet Nam. Even though the reforms have led to sharp reductions (33%) in poverty over the last ten years, the possibility of them falling back to poverty is still very high, leading to less sustainability of poverty reduction achievements.

The road to global economic integration, including the accession to the World Trade Organization (WTO) poses numerous challenges for Viet Nam, one of which is the lack of access to U.S market. This constraint was eliminated with the coming into force of the Vietnam-U.S Trade Agreement (BTA). The BTA required both countries to commit to a broad range of trade-related policy, regulatory and judicial obligations (largely in conformance with WTO standards) that will improve the business environment in Viet Nam and further promote trade and investment. The business environment for private sector has been considerably improved, however the sector is still encountering impediments, including access to capital and business information services. High population growth rate, poverty and underemployment and natural disasters are the main barriers to sustainable development. Malnutrition and micro-nutrition deficiencies are serious problems and significant causes of maternal, under-five children and infant mortality, particularly in rural areas in the Central and Northern Highlands. The disparity of living standards between regions and social groups has been on the rise. HIV/AIDS has appeared in all 61 provinces and cities of Vietnam, most seriously in border provinces. More than 50,000 people have been detected to be infected with HIV in the country up to mid 2002.

#### Kev achievements:

Enhanced Environment for Trade and Investment: FY 2002 was the first year of the BTA coming into force. USAID has supported and engaged actively with the STAR and the U.S Vietnam Trade Forum programs and established close working relations with many key Government of Viet Nam (GVN) agencies to implement these programs to advance the implementation of the BTA. Significant achievements were made this year in (i) setting an active agenda for law and policy changes for various GVN agencies to comply with the BTA terms, (ii) raising broad government and public understandings of

the BTA terms and obligations to support for the trade and investment reforms related to the BTA, and (iii) improving of institutional capacities and skills of the GVN agencies to implement and enforce the laws and regulations that support BTA implementation. Remarkable progress was made in expanding the number of GVN counterparts involving in the BTA legal and economic analyses and training, enhancing their understanding of the BTA and capacities to accommodate changes in laws and policies to comply with the BTA obligations. USAID has actively responded in a timely manner to requests from the GVN agencies for technical assistance across the numerous policy issues affected the BTA. These fundamentally contributed to enhancement of business environment in Viet Nam and further promotion of trade and investment between the U.S and Viet Nam in the first ten months of this year. The initial findings from economic assessment of BTA impacts indicated that the first year of the implementation of the U.S - Viet Nam bilateral trade agreement has been very positive, resulting in considerable trade and investment growth between the two countries.

Improved Access to Services for Selected Vulnerable Groups: USAID-funded programs in disabilities and inclusive education have seen substantial success over the last year. Catholic Relief Services has implemented its Expansion of Community Support for Children with Disabilities project in three Northern provinces since 1998. At the national level, in August 2001 the Ministry of Education and Training (MoET) finalized its strategy for making Inclusive Education part of the national education program, and presented the CRS-NIES project as the model for expansion. VVAF-trained orthotic and prosthetic workshops in the two biggest hospitals in Hanoi have provided approximately 1828 assistive devices (as of 30th November 2002) and 100 wheelchairs to people with disabilities in Hanoi and many other provinces with VVAF support. VVAF has also begun the establishment of self-help groups managed by people with disabilities so that they can share their rehabilitation experiences and opportunities (education, employment, heath care) to improve their quality of life and assist with integration into society. VNAH has made considerable progress with its Disability Policy and Program Project. One highlight includes the issuance of the Barrier-Free Access Code and Standards by the Ministry of Construction mandating accessibility in all new construction and major renovations. USAID's Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA) provided \$100,000 for flood, draught and fire relief assistance to Vietnam in 2002.

FHI-supported peer education projects have effectively reached over 3,000 injecting drug users, about 1,000 sex workers, and more than 148,000 men in the general population with messages about safe behaviors and harm reduction for HIV/AIDS prevention through innovative one-to-one peer education outreach activities using peer educators in the workplace, IDUs and sex workers trained as peer educators, and barbers, shoeshine boys and motorbike taxi drivers trained as volunteer HIV/AIDS educators. Millions of people were reached with HIV/AIDS prevention, care and support messages through FHI-supported TV, radio and newspaper mass media BCC campaigns in FHI/IMPACT's four focal provinces. FHI's support of DKT International's condom promotion work for HIV/AIDS prevention has resulted in the opening of over 1,000 non-traditional outlets for condom distribution in six target provinces and a record number of condoms being sold and distributed throughout Viet Nam (43 million).
