


This month we feature the Striped Burrfish



Striped Burrfish

Chilomycterus schoepfi

Striped burrfish have large heads and somewhat bulging eyes that are spaced widely apart. They are yellow-brown to olive-brown with large dark splotches along their bodies. Their eyes are golden yellow with iridescent blue-green specks in the pupil.

Size: Burrfish usually grow to 10 inches (25 cm) long, although there are occasional reports of specimens reaching 12 inches (32 cm).

Range: Maine to Florida - although they are less common in the northern part of the range.

Habitat: Burrfish live in seagrass beds in bays and coastal lagoons and over shallow coastal reefs.

Feeding Habits: In the wild they use their powerful beak-like jaws to eat small fish, barnacles, snails, crabs, and clams.

FUN FACTS:

They have often been observed to swallow hermit crabs whole-shell and all.

Burrfish are covered with short, heavy spines that are always erect-unlike their cousins the porcupinefish,

Which have movable spines.
