6). The following night, on July 3 at 7 p.m., spend some time with President Thomas Jefferson as he shares his personal thoughts on creating this great country. Then, bring the family for the unforgettable experience of POPS on Independence! This free, outdoor concert is the perfect setting for a

patriotic picnic under the stars in front of Independence Hall, where you'll hear Peter Nero and the Philly POPS perform all your American favorites! Speaking of the Hall it's open until 8 p.m., along with the Liberty Bell, through July 4. Take advantage of this unique opportunity so see the sites after hours. To top off your Fourth of July festivities with a BANG, check out the Sunoco Welcome America! fireworks show on July 4 at the Philadelphia Museum of Art (details on pg. 4).

But once July Fourth is over, there are still tons of ways to celebrate America right here in Historic Philadelphia. On July 8, 231 years to the day after the Declaration of Independence was read to the public for the very first time, Independence National Historical Park recreates this momentous occasion at Noon in Independence Square. A Bold Declaration

In July 8, 1776, a crowd of ordinary citizens gathered in the square behind the Pennsylvania State House (now **Independence Hall**) to hear Colonel John Nixon read the Declaration of Independence. For most people this was the first time they learned of the vote for independence from Great Britain.



Independence National Historical Park's re-enactment of the first public reading of the Declaration takes place at Noon on July 8. Just like the original reading, this is an interactive event! Printed copies of the Declaration are

distributed to the public, and participants will hear from both "patriots" and "loyalists" in the vocal crowd that gathers on Independence Square. I also encourage visitors throughout the summer to view the original printed edition from which Colonel Nixon read, on display in the West Wing Great Essentials exhibit next to Independence Hall.


Our July 8 reading reminds us that, from the beginning, our nation was a democracy, and ordinary citizens had a role to play. I hope you use your time here at INHP to find your place in our nation's history.

N hen John Adams arrived in Philadelphia in August of 1774, to attend the First Continental Congress, he was greeted by leading citizens and taken immediately to the tavern he would later call "the most genteel tavern in America." The tavern Adams referred to, City Tavern, was not yet a year old and was already caught in momentous events. A few months earlier, Paul Revere had ridden up to the Tavern with the news of the closing of the port of Boston by the British Government. From that time until the close of the century, City Tavern knew the patronage of the great and near-great of the American Revolution. It became the practice of the members of the Second Continental Congress to dine together each Saturday at the Tavern.

The war years brought change and turmoil to City Tavern. There was grand entertainment, such as

the Continental Congress's first Fourth of July celebration in 1777. After the war, the Tavern served as the unofficial White House. Once again, these leaders enjoyed the hospitality of the City Tavern. It was fitting that after the adjournment of the convention in September, delegates gathered for one final dinner at the City Tavern.

Today Chef Walter Staib has taken over operation of City Tavern, returning to its 18th-century splendor. Enjoy a taste of history today. Serving lunch, dinner and cocktails daily from 11:30 a.m.


