

KALIMBA Reptile Park by Mika & Rachel Cleverley

If you are find yourself twiddling your thumbs on a Saturday, wondering what to do with the kids that does not involve jumping castles, I recommend Kalimba Reptile Park. As the Bradt Travel Guide says, "It is gradually becoming worth the journey."

The park has several displays of various African snakes. There are also several pits chock-full of crocodiles from baby-size to mammoth. The whole tour of the park may go quickly, but there are other amenities to add to your entertainment.

With a small swimming pool (with slide), a relatively large playset and swings, barbecue grills, bomas, and outdoor tables, it is an ideal setting for a picnic. Prices are: K20,000 per adult and K10,000 per child.

Directions: Take the Great East Road toward the airport. Midway to the airport turnoff, turn left at the Caltex station. Follow this road, known both as District Road and the D564, for 10.5 km until it ends in a T-junction. Then turn right. The park is about one-half km away, on your right.

The road there is a bit bumpy, so bear in mind that just because it is 11 km away does not mean you can get there in ten minutes. Unless you are Tim McVey, or Tim McVey's paramedic.

Habitat: Lightly wooded and open grasslands near water.

Habits: Prefers to run in herds of its own kind, living in groups of up to 40. The male (stallion) gathers his own group of females around him and fiercely guards them from rivals. Fights between stallions can be heard a long way off; they make fierce noises, barks, and high-pitched whines as they near each other. Zebras are one of the lion's favorite prey animals. Their defense is to kick out viciously with their hind hooves.

Diet: Zebras are grazers, but in hard times when grass is scarce, the will dig up roots with their front hooves and eat them.

b&w camouflage

You might think that its bold black-and-white stripes are the reverse of camouflage – as they are close up. But at a distance, on the open plains when the heat shimmers up from the ground, the zebra's stripes seem to fade and blur until even a whole herd is almost invisible from a few miles away. The stripes can also be a means of confusing a predator as it moves in close to a running herd. Imagine trying to pick out any one particular zebra from a jumble mass of moving black-and-white lines.
