NEW VALLEY SPORTS COMPLEX GETS RURAL DEVELOPMENT GUARANTEE

USDA, through its Business and Industry Guaranteed Loan Program, has guaranteed a \$4.5 million loan made to the owners of the AT&T Sports Complex in Wasilla. The loan was made to the owners of the center by Alaska USA Federal Credit Union. Acting State Director Chad Padgett made the announcement following a tour of the new 60,000 foot facility and presented credit union and sports center representatives with a ceremonial check marking the issuance of the guarantee.

"Working with governments, non-profit organizations, businesses and financial institutions, USDA Rural Development improves the quality of life in rural communities, and there is no better example than this beautiful sports complex," said Padgett. He noted that construction of the complex marked the culmination of a five year effort and helps meet the need for indoor recreational facilities in the rapidly growing Matanuska-Susitna Borough.

The sports facility opened in April and holds five basketball courts, an indoor running track, spectator seating, office space for local sports organizations and a health club. Since the beginning of the Bush Administration, USDA Rural Development has invested over \$6.8 billion nationwide in business funding and support. In fiscal year 2007, Rural Development invested almost \$176 million in Alaska, including over \$24 million in business loan guarantees.



New Thrift Store: Acting State Director Chad Padgett and Merlaine Kruse, Director, Community Programs, attended a recent ribbon cutting ceremony for the Treasure Loft thrift store in Wasilla. Using a combination of a direct CF loan and a loan guarantee through First National Bank-Alaska, the store's operator, Mat Valley Community Charities, financed construction of the new building. Mat-Valley Community Charities is a faith-based organization, representing 10 valley churches.



OPEN NEW CREAMERY: Over \$600,000 in USDA Rural Development grant funds provided through the efforts of the Alaska Congressional Delegation set the stage for the opening of the new Matanuska Creamery near Palmer. The creamery is processing Alaska milk and also making cheese. Ice cream production is expected to start soon. Gallon jugs of milk produced by the creamery are on the table. Beus announced new marketing agreements with local stores during the ribbon cutting event. Among those in attendance at the ribbon cutting was Farm Service Agency Administrator Teresa Lasseter. FSA provided \$1 million in loan assistance to Mat-Su farmers.
