SUPPORTING STATEMENT NORTHEAST REGION SURVEY OF INTENT AND CAPACITY TO PROCESS FISH AND SHELLFISH OMB CONTROL NO. 0648-0235

A. JUSTIFICATION

1. Explain the circumstances that make the collection of information necessary.

The Fishery Management Plans for Surf Clams and Ocean Quahogs, and Atlantic Mackerel, Squid, and Butterfish include requirements that the National Marine Fisheries Service and/or the Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council annually survey domestic processors and joint venture operators to establish industry capacity to utilize Atlantic mackerel, Loligo and Illex squid, and butterfish.

If US industry is unable to utilize fully the allowed harvest of these species, this information is used in establishing suitable levels of catch for joint ventures and/or direct foreign harvest. This PRA submission requests OMB approval of the accompanying survey form. (It should be noted that this is not a sample survey -- it is a written survey of all known processors. The Council specifies the period as noted on the form.)

2. Explain how, by whom, how frequently, and for what purpose the information will be used.

This information is used by the Councils and the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) to establish annual specifications under Fishery Management Plan for Atlantic Mackerel, Squid, and Butterfish; and to set levels for domestic annual harvesting (DAH) capacity and total allowable level of foreign fishing (TALFF) for the squid, mackerel and butterfish fisheries.

The written survey of squid, mackerel and butterfish processors contains questions concerning industry ventures involving foreign nations. These questions concern sales to joint venture operations, the possible effect of joint ventures on processing projections (JVP), changes in foreign nations interested in US sales, knowledge of foreign nation interest in the species concerned, opinions concerning changes in allowed levels of foreign fishing. The Council asks these questions to obtain information needed to prepare adequate analyses to respond to the questions raised during the discussion of issuance of JVP or TALFF allocations to foreign interests.

The Council had also expanded the survey to include questions about product availability, freezer/cold storage capacity, mackerel inventory, quality control, and future market conditions. These questions are also linked to the analysis of allocation levels, since the decisions concerning allocations to foreign interests require consideration of US industry intentions and capacity.

In addition, these data are useful in evaluating the economic impacts of alternative fishery management measures. These impacts may include the effect of regulations on percentage plant capacity utilized, changes in revenue distribution by gear type and port area, and effect on export marketing objectives.

3. <u>Describe whether, and to what extent, the collection of information involves the use of automated, electronic, mechanical, or other technological techniques or other forms of information technology.</u>

No improved information technologies have been identified to reduce burden.

4. Describe efforts to identify duplication.

The NMFS and Councils have queried the members of industry advisory panels and the personnel of state fisheries agencies to verify that this survey does not duplicate other efforts.

5. <u>If the collection of information involves small businesses or other small entities, describe the methods used to minimize burden.</u>

The survey requests a minimal amount of information to accomplish intended goals.

6. <u>Describe the consequences to the Federal program or policy activities if the collection is</u> not conducted or is conducted less frequently.

Collection of these data less often than once per year would not allow the management system to adjust harvest allocations during a fishing season, or to plan for the upcoming fishing year. The consequences could lead to economic inefficiency and biological waste, results that are contrary to the National Standards of the Magnuson Fishery Conservation and Management Act.

7. Explain any special circumstances that require the collection to be conducted in a manner inconsistent with OMB guidelines.

This collection is consistent with OMB guidelines.

A survey, described in the squid, mackerel and butterfish regulations at 50 CFR 648.21(b), is used to establish the intent and capacity of the U.S.

industry to utilize allowable harvest in a given year. If the U.S. industry is unable to fully utilize the allowed harvest of Atlantic mackerel, the excess may be used in establishing levels of catch for joint ventures and/or direct foreign harvest.

A survey, required under the surf clam and ocean quahog regulations at 50 CFR 648.7(a)(3)(ii), is used to obtain data for use in monitoring present processing activities and estimating future production at the processing plant level.

Both annual surveys seek information concerning the annual capacity to process these species; the historical amount of product processed; and the quantity of product to be processed in the future.

II. Method of Collection

Telephone surveys are used for the surf clam/ocean quahog fishery, and paper forms are used for the Atlantic mackerel, squid, and butterfish fisheries.

I. Abstract

Persons holding Individual Transferable Quotas (ITQ) in the surf clam/ocean quahog fishery are annually issued an allowable quota for harvest.
