Predeparture Passenger Baggage Inspection Notice For Travelers from Aruba to the United States

American agriculture is under constant threat of attack from countless enemies. These enemies are often microscopic and include plant pests and diseases. Every traveler entering the United States may unknowingly carry these hitchhikers that could seriously damage American agriculture across U.S. borders.

All traveler baggage flying from Aruba to the U.S. mainland is subject to predeparture inspection. These inspections take place prior to departure at the airport by inspectors from the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS). Please be prepared to open and close your own baggage.

If you have any agricultural items with you, please tell the inspector. Failure to do so can result in delays and fines of \$1,000 or more.

Agricultural Items from Aruba <u>Permitted</u> into the United States (after inspection)

Aloe vera Bamboo leaves, dried Banana leaves Beans (out of pod or shell) Cannonball fruit Citrus leaves, cured and dried Coconuts without the husk or "milk" Corn smut galls Cucumbers Cyperus corn Flowers, fresh-cut or dried Herbs, dried or cured (subject to inspection) Garden melons Garlic cloves (free of papery skin) Lily bulb, edible Macadamia kernels (no husk or shell) Maguey leaves Matsutake Mushrooms, fresh

Peanuts

- Pet birds—Entry requirements vary depending on the origin of the bird. Please consult USDA APHIS' Publication 1083 "Travelers' Tips" for details on the entry requirements for pet birds.
- Plant cuttings (except sugarcane, cotton, and sweet potato, subject to inspection)
- Plants without soil (subject to inspection)
- Seeds, dried
- Snail shells, if empty and thoroughly cleaned
- Singhara nut
- St. John's bread
- Tamarind bean pods
- Tomatoes
- Truffles
- Water chestnuts

Note: Commercially canned and thoroughly cooked foods are permitted. All permissible agricultural products are subject to inspection.

Agricultural Items from Aruba <u>Not Permitted</u> into the United States

Cotton and sweet potato cuttings Citrus leaves, fresh Herbs, fresh Fruits, fresh—All fruits are prohibited except those on the above list. Insects. live Meats Plants in soil or on endangered list-Please contact the U.S. Department of the Interior's Fish and Wildlife Service for a listing of endangered plants. Seed cotton and cottonseed Snails (land) Soil Sugarcane Sweet potatoes and other vegetables, fresh-All vegetables are prohibited except those on the above list. Lists are subject to change.
