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MARKET ANALYSIS - April 29, 2004

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The beginning of the week could only be described as lethargic but when news from the Brazilian Agricultural Ministry broke on Monday we saw some explosive upward moves in soybean futures, which also provided positive spillover pressure in the corn pits. The bulls were invigorated by reports of lower Brazilian production. With harvest now near 90% completed, the majority of estimates are in the 49.5 -51.5 million metric ton range, much lower than the latest USDA estimate of 56 mmt. The global fundamental situation remains focused on very tight supplies, which is only enhanced by these smaller production numbers. On Wednesday we saw some of the gain given back as reports came in that China might take some measures to cool their economy down. This sent metals tumbling and because there has always been a strong link between silver and soybeans – so soybeans took it on the chin. That combined with profit taking really sent things south, but many believe that prices will not stay down there for long. Broiler egg sales were up 3% this week, which might ripple through to some demand for feed. Corn had a good week. First it enjoyed spillover from the bean complex and there was additional buying attributed to concerns over freezing weather patterns moving into the Corn Belt for this weekend. The underlying fundamentals have not changed – and remain bullish and many view the recent sell off to be a purely technically driven event. In fact, some traders believe that the harvest price (December) has not built in a premium to reflect that even a record crop this year could not rebuild stocks to a comfortable price dampening level. It is also a long way off before corn is in the bin so this, in my opinion, could be an incorrectly priced (too low) market. For wheat, we continue to see the dollar's strengthening as a negative factor in prices and could further dent export sales, which are already almost non-existent at this point. The good news is that wheat prices actually held firm this week despite there being a plethora of bearish news. Spillover pressure took credit. There is, despite this rather fragile floor being place, a distinct bearish tone in the wheat pit and poor export news or good wheat conditions found by participants touring the central plains could send things south.

WEEKLY CROP WEATHER SUMMARY

MARYLAND AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS SERVICE

Dry weather was a welcome change from the previous week, allowing Maryland farmers an average of 6.3 days suitable for field work for the week ending April 25th. The warm, dry conditions were perfect for planting. **Corn** planting is underway at 17 percent complete. Barley is 15 percent headed and rated 14 percent in excellent condition, 59 percent good, 18 percent fair, 4 percent poor, and 5 percent very poor. Winter wheat was rated 13 percent excellent, 63 percent good, 20 percent fair, 3 percent poor, and 1 percent very poor. Pasture was rated 24 percent excellent, 57 percent good, 15 percent fair, 3 percent poor, and 1 percent very poor. Hay supplies were rated 1 percent surplus, 51 percent adequate, 22 percent short, and 26 percent very short.
