Protests Against Price Increases

Senegal has witnessed and will likely continue to witness protests against price increases. An authorized protest organized by opposition parties was scheduled for Saturday, April 25 to take place between Boulevard General De Gaulle from RTS to the Obelisk near the Gendarmerie Colobane. An authorized demonstration organized by two consumer unions on March 30 resulted in police using tear gas and batons to disperse the protesters.

The Embassy continues to remind everyone that public demonstrations, political gatherings, and student protests are relatively common in Senegal, both in Dakar and in outlying regions. Due to the potential for violence during such protests, U.S. citizens should avoid political gatherings and street demonstrations, and maintain security awareness at all times.
