Chautauqua County, New York

The County of Chautauqua will be awarded \$1,747,143. The County created the "Lead Safe County Program II: Continuing Efforts in Rural Primary Prevention" to comprehensively address childhood lead poisoning in the county. Building on the success of the past program, which boasts completion of 110% of the unit goal, the County aims to complete lead hazard control work in an additional 200 units. The County will also provide lead-based paint training to 328 individuals, and provide lead poisoning prevention outreach about lead to approximately 975 citizens. Lead Safe County II will be administered by the Chautauqua County Health Department, with assistance from the community based organizations Chautauqua Home Rehabilitation and Improvement Corporation (CHRIC), Joint Neighborhood Project, and Success by Six. Additional partners include the Cornell Cooperative Association, Jamestown Community Learning Council, City of Jamestown Department of Development, Jamestown Housing Authority, City of Dunkirk, and others.

The City of Chautauqua will provide \$755,074 in local matching funds, which includes money from the County, the State of New York, in kind contributions, and funds from property owners.

Monroe County, New York

Monroe County will be awarded \$2,082,240 to continue with their collaborative efforts in the City of Rochester, NY to combat lead paint hazards in low-income family homes. This partnership of city and county organizations includes The City of Rochester, the Rochester Housing Development Fund Corporation, the Greater Rochester Housing Partnership, The Housing Council in the Monroe County Area, Inc., Neighborhood Housing Services of Rochester, Inc., and other governmental and community agencies. This partnership intends to provide lead hazard control intervention services in approximately 420 units primarily within targeted census tracts where extreme risks of lead poisoning have been determined and the majority of the older deteriorating housing exists. Employment and economic opportunities will be provided to local contractors and workers through the lead hazard control projects, training, and outreach activities. The partnership will engage in a citywide educational campaign to raise awareness of the dangers of lead-based paint hazards and encourage families to have their young children tested for lead poisoning.

Altogether, the County and its partners will provide \$16,563,620 in leveraged and local matching funds.
