February 2006 Career Events: Smashing Successes!

he Office of Domestic Programs Returned Volunteer Services (RVS) division sponsored three career events on Thursday, February 23 and Friday, February 24, 2006. A career panel on Disaster Relief, a series of individual résumé review and feedback sessions, and a career fair provided RPCVs from across the country an opportunity to reconnect, readjust, and renew excitement in their career development activities.

On Thursday morning, a disaster relief panel gave frank insight about the qualifications, responsibilities, and benefits of work dealing with emergencies and crises around the world. More than 70 RPCVs welcomed representatives from: Fluor Corporation, the Federal Emergency Management

Agency (FEMA), the Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (USAID/ OFDA), Peace Corps' Crisis Corps, and Planning and Development Collaborative International's (PADCO) Humanitarian Response and Reconstruction Group to better understand this maturing field. The audience responses were consistent:

"The panelists were very helpful and reassured my focus in where I want to be career wise . . .'

"Thanks for a very helpful session on disaster relief jobs.'

Shortly thereafter, over 45 pre-registered RPCVs received individualized feedback on their résumés. Ten experienced recruiters, staffers, and HR professionals -80 percent of whom are RPCVs

themselves-each volunteered their time to work one-on-one with, on average, five registered RPCVs. Each participant spent 20-25 minutes with a designated "Résumé Coach." In most cases, the résumé coaches had an opportunity to review each of their client's résumé, description of service (DOS), and pressing résumé concerns/ questions days in advance of their session. Participating RPCVs raved about the feedback and guidance they received from their "Résumé Coaches."

Here's what participants had to say: "Thank you so much for the opportunity to have a professional eye review my résumé ... It helped a lot and has given me the encouragement I need to continue job hunting."


