High winds in Hartford County downed several large trees and tree limbs in Burlington, some of which were oak trees measuring 2 to 3 feet in diameter. One tree fell on a school bus transporting students, smashing the windshield. There were no injuries. Wind gusts were estimated to be near 60 mph. Strong winds in Tolland and Windham Counties resulted in scattered reports of downed branches and power lines. High winds in Hampden County downed two large trees in Southwick, which blocked portions of Routes 57 and 168. Several large tree limbs were also downed. In Attleboro, in Bristol County, high winds downed large trees and branches. Wind gusts were estimated near 60 mph in these areas. Elsewhere, strong winds brought scattered reports of downed branches and power lines. Winds gusted to 49 mph at Logan International Airport in Boston, 48 mph in Edgartown and Sharon, and 47 mph in Pocasset. The Buzzard's Bay entrance tower, which is an elevated platform, recorded a peak wind gust to 55 mph. The Blue Hill Observatory in Milton reported a peak wind gust of 76 mph. MAZ017>024 Northern Bristol - Western Plymouth - Eastern Plymouth - Southern Bristol - Southern Plymouth - Barnstable - Dukes -Nantucket **Snow Squalls** Early morning ocean effect snow squalls brought 1 to 3 inches of snow to much of southeastern Massachusetts. This first snowfall of the season coincided with the morning rush hour, and caused dozens of accidents, from single-car crashes to six-vehicle pileups. No injuries were reported. The worst area was at Interstate 495 and Route 24 around Bridgewater and Taunton, and that portion of I-495 had to be closed for a brief time due to several accidents. Route 3 also saw many accidents, as did many other roadways south of Boston. The Sagamore Bridge was shut down briefly as well.

Strong winds buffeted Rhode Island, as deepening low pressure moved across southern Canada. High winds in Providence and western Kent Counties resulted in several large trees, limbs, and power lines down in Coventry, Scituate, and Burrillville. In Foster, about 30 to 35 trees were downed by high winds, and some electric customers lost power for about four hours. Wind gusts were estimated to be near 60 mph, and primarily affected the higher elevations. Elsewhere in the Ocean State, strong winds resulted in scattered downed tree limbs and power lines. Winds gusted as high as 51 mph at T.F. Green State Airport in Warwick and also on Block Island.
