Meet the Artists



Christina Major, soprano, will sing the role of Violetta in Rimrock Opera's production of *La traviata*. Dubbed a "fascinating and hugely talented singer" by the San Francisco Chronicle, this young American soprano is becoming known for her versatile lyric voice whose repertoire includes Mozart, Rossini, Handel, Gounod, Stravinski, Bizet, Verdi, and Puccini. The 2005-06 season will see Ms. Major in her debut with Phoenix Symphony in *Carmina Burana*. She was a featured soloist with the Midsummer Mozart Festival in San Francisco in Mozart's *C minor Mass* and she will sing the role of Rosina in *Il barbiere di Siviglia* in Idaho. In 2006 she debuts with the Fort Worth Opera in the role of Mimi in *La bohème*.



Joseph Muir, tenor, will sing the role of Alfredo in Rimrock Opera's production of *La traviata*. Described as possessing a "lyric lilt of indescribable tenderness," Mr. Muir is rapidly making his presence known on the American opera stage. In the 2005 season Mr. Muir is the tenor soloist in Mozart's *Great Mass in C minor* with the Midsummer Mozart Festival in San Francisco and sings Count Almaviva in *Il barbiere di Siviglia* with Opera Plus in Northern Idaho. In 2004 he appeared with Fort Worth Opera in *Salome*. He has served two seasons at Santa Fe Opera as an apprentice artist. He was Principle Artist in Residence for the 2003-2004 season at Opera San José where he sang the roles of Ernesto in *Don Pasquale*, Nadir in *The Pearl Fishers*, Beppe in *Pagliacci* and Alfred in *Die Fledermaus*.



Douglas Nagel, baritone and native Montanan, made his directing debut at 21. After receiving his MM from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, Mr. Nagel joined the faculty at California State University, Hayward, and held a similar position at Southern Oregon University, Ashland, OR. He produced, directed and often conducted *Die Fledermaus, The Tales of Hoffmann, Gigi, Pajama Game, The Pirates of Penzance, Il Tabarro, Gianni Schicchi, The Hand of Bridge, L'Egisto, Riders to the Sea, The Magic Flute, The Scarf, The Telephone, The Impresario and L'Ormindo.* He has produced and directed *The Merry Widow, Madama Butterfly, Tosca, Don Pasquale, The Magic Flute, Carmen, The Merry Widow,* and *Hansel and Gretel.* Currently he serves Rimrock Opera as Artistic Director and Opera San José as Education Consultant.



Heidi Rae Kalina, mezzo-soprano, is one of Montana's newest and most promising vocalists. Praised by the San Francisco Chronicle for her performance of "Cherubino" in Mozart's *Le Nozze di Figaro* with the San Jose Opera as "irrespressible," Ms. Kalina has appeared with the Helena Symphony Orchestra in Beethoven's Ninth Symphony, the first Annual Evening at the Opera, the "Beggar Woman" in Sondheim's *Sweeney Todd*, and in Mahler's Resurrection Symphony. Elsewhere, she has sung "Mercedes" in Bizet's *Carmen*, the "Duchess" in Gilbert & Sullivan's *The Gondeliers*, "Hansel" in *Hansel and Gretel*, "Dame Quickly" in Verdi's *Falstaff*, "La Cenerentola" in *La Cenerentola*, "Anita" in Bernstein's *West Side Story*, and "Charlotte" in Sondheim's operetta *A Little Night Music*. In 2005-06 she is appearing with San Jose Opera Company.

Sandi Rabas, Rehearsal Pianist, began serious study of piano at age three. Sandi has been church organist and coordinator of music ministries at Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd in Billings since 1979. As staff pianist for Rimrock Opera, she has played for *The Barber of Seville, Madama Butterfly, The Merry Widow, Carmen and Tosca*. She has played Rimrock Opera school outreach operas on tour, including *Madama Butterfly and The Telephone*. She will play the entire 2005-2006 season of the Rimrock Opera with *The Met to Broadway* shows, school tour of *The Night Harry Stopped Smoking, La Traviata*, and *Die Fledermaus*. Ms. Rabas is accompanist for Rimrock Opera Chorus for Kids (ROCK) and in July 2005, she was the accompanist for Rimrock Opera's One Act Festival.


