Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

Advocacy Advises FWS to Address Small Business Impacts in its Designation of Critical Habitat for the Wintering Population of the Piping Plover

On August 10, 2006, the Office of Advocacy (Advocacy) sent a letter to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS), in response to a notice of proposed rule that the agency recently published, *Endangered and Threatened Wildlife and Plants; Amended Designation of Critical Habitat for the Wintering Population of the Piping Plover* (71 Fed. Reg. 33,703 (June 12, 2006)). Advocacy recommended that FWS provide an Initial Regulatory Flexibility Analysis (IRFA) or certification that the proposed rule will not have a significant impact on a substantial number of small entities at the same time as the publication of the notice of proposed rule. - The Regulatory Flexibility Act requires agencies to publish an IRFA or a certification that the proposed rule will not have a significant impact on a substantial number of small entities at the same time as the publication of a proposed rule in the *Federal Register*, unless the agency makes a written declaration that an emergency exists.
- The agency has made no finding of an emergency; therefore, failure to prepare an IRFA or provide a factual basis to certify the rule was improper.
- Advocacy recognized FWS's commitment to publishing a notice of availability of the draft
 economic impact analysis of the proposed designation in the future and reopening the comment
 period. However, Advocacy cautioned that by postponing this analysis there is less opportunity for
 FWS to collect information from public comments that arise from the publication of the regulatory
 flexibility analysis and to consider flexibilities for small business carefully.
- Advocacy expressed concern with FWS's continued practice of delaying the release of RFA analyses for public comment and believes that small business is negatively affected by the FWS's failure to abide by this RFA requirement.
