# BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK BIRD RECORDS DECEMBER - FEBRUARY 1995-96

March 06, 1996

Attached is a list of observations reported by visitors and staff for the period December 1 - February 29. I've compiled only those observations for species which are listed as Rare, Accidental, Hypothetical or Not included (?) on the park's checklist. A "?-win" indicates a species on the checklist but not for the winter season.

It has been a rather strange winter season, not so much from a weather standpoint, but rather from unprecedented government shutdowns that caused us to close the park to visitors. Not only were visitors prohibited from entering, but also staff was not allowed to go out into the park. As a consequence, we have very few observations to report for the months of December and January. Where this was critical was with the reports of the **Elegant trogon** on the Window trail. These observations were never confirmed with photographs or even a detailed report. (One of the reporting parties didn't know what they had seen. They asked if we had parrots in the park and then described a trogon...). All three reports remain unconfirmed.

The shutdown also had an impact on the annual Christmas count. We were allowed to organize a small count but were limited to paved roads and developed areas. Because of this, counters missed some species that were present during the period. Of the species observed, numbers were down from previous years. Again, this was due in part to the limited access but climatic conditions probably also played a role. (See attached Christmas Count results).

Continued drought conditions had a major impact on bird populations in the area. Precipitation totals for the three month period were dismal: Panther Junction: 0.17 ". Chisos Basin: 0.23". Rio Grande Village: 0.12". Castolon: 0.05". Persimmon Gap: 0.09". With the exception of the Rio Grande, there is little surface water available for wildlife populations. The river itself is at very low levels. Traditionally the Big Bend has high concentrations of winter sparrows. This winter, sparrows were almost non-existent. Waterfowl also were in low numbers, although a river patrol by Park Ranger Marcos Paredes in early February revealed that ducks had concentrated in isolated areas of the river with deeper water channels.

On that same trip Paredes reported sighting a Fulvous Whistling-Duck at river mile 875 (between Santa Elena, Mexico and Talley campsite). According to Wauer (1996), there have been only two reports of this species in the park; one in April, 1967 at Rio Grande Village, and a second in May, 1988 along the river from Reed camp to San Vicente. Currently this species is listed as "hypothetical" in the spring for the park.

Another hypothetical species reported was a **Northern Beardless- Tyrannulet** on January 8 at Rio Grande Village by Park Ranger Bill Bourbon. Bourbon observed the bird several times during the morning of the 8th, but when he returned to photograph it in the afternoon he was unable to relocate the bird. Again, Wauer lists only two sightings of this species; one in April, 1975 in Green Gulch, and a second in May, 1991 in Blue Creek Canyon.

#### BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK BIRD RECORDS MARCH - MAY, 1996

June 5, 1996

Attached is a list of observations reported by visitors and staff for the period March 1 - May 31. I've compiled only those observations for species which are listed as Rare, Accidental, Hypothetical or Not included (?) on the park's checklist. A "?spr" indicates a species which is documented for the park but not in the spring season.

Where to begin with this spring season? It has certainly been one full of surprises, especially in light of continued drought conditions and a very quiet winter preceding. There were several significant weather events during the period; March registered no measurable precipitation at any of the park's rain gauges. April brought an Easter storm that included snow, hail and high winds. May finally saw several heavy rainfalls, including a 1.6 inch downpour at Rio Grande Village that also involved damaging winds (tornado?) which snapped trees like matchsticks. Year to date precipitation as compared to ytd totals for May 1995 (+ or -) is as follows: Panther Junction; 2.07 " (- 0.5") Chisos Basin; 2.25" (- 1.21"), Rio Grande Village; 2.50" (+0.01"), Castolon; 0.57" (- 0.67"), and Persimmon Gap; 1.73" (+0.04"). Obviously the Big Bend area continues to be very dry.

Given the drought conditions and the very quiet winter season, I had no great hopes for the spring.... What ended up happening was an incredible showing of vagrant species, several of which were either new to the park (one new to Texas!) or species which had previously been listed as hypotheticals, lacking documentation for inclusion on the main list.

The surprises began March 30 when a crew of National Biological Survey bird researchers (NBS - Michelle Davis, Brian Gibbons, Alex Lindsay, and Hira Walker) reported a **Violet-crowned hummingbird** at the Barker House. The bird was subsequently seen by many other observers and photo-documented by Bernard Heyman during the two days it was present. Reports and photographs were submitted to the Texas Bird Records Committee. This species has been reported in the park before and is currently listed as "hypothetical". None of those previous records were confirmed.

On April 14 Dale and Carolyn Ohl observed an unusual tanager in Pine Canyon. Their report reached the park two days later with a tentative identification of a male Flame-colored tanger. Alex Lindsay of the NBS crew relocated the bird on the 18th and was able to get some excellent photographs. Later other members of the crew, as well as some park visitors, also observed the tanager. The last reported observation was on April 19th. On April 20th the same NBS crew reported a second tanager, this one possibly a first spring male, in the Chisos Basin near the oxidation ponds. The bird was photodocumented by Alex Lindsay and Brian Gibbons. The last reported observation was on April 22nd. Reports and slides of both birds were also submitted to the TBRC. If accepted, these observation will constitute the first records for Texas.

NBS researcher Brian Gibbons reported and photographed a **Dusky-capped Flycatcher** in Pine canyon on April 23. On May 8 a group involved in a Colima warbler census (Ribble/Parmeter/Flippo) heard two dusky-capped flycatchers calling and one member of the party saw the birds. This species is listed as accidental in the park and is a review species in Texas. Reports and slides were submitted to the TBRC.

Anne Belamy reported a **Greater Pewee** at Rio Grande Village on April 26th. Another Texas review species and listed as accidental in the park, this bird too was reported to the TBRC. Unfortunately no photographs were obtained.

The wave of unusual species continued into May, beginning with a May 1 report from Bill Murphy of a Baird's Sparrow on the main park road (Rte 13) 2.6 miles from the Panther Junction headquarters. A large group of birders nearly disrupted traffic as they observed a very cooperative Baird's as close as five feet along the road and road shoulder. The bird had no fear of oncoming traffic, in fact it was almost turned into a specimen by a visitor who was rushing to see the bird. The last reported observation was May 2nd at the same site. A second Baird's turned up at Rio Grande Village on May 4 and was observed until the 6th. (Anne Bellamy and Brian Gibbons). Reports on both birds were submitted to TBRC. Apparently photographs were taken of the first sparrow but none were submitted to the park.

Beyond the above review species, the spring migration also provided other surprises. On May 4 a group of British birders (twitchers?) observed a **Swainson's warbler** in the Boot Springs area of the Chisos Mountains. Several other birding groups also observed the bird for a period of several hours, including Ro Wauer and his tour group. Swainson's warbler is another species which has been reported but never confirmed for the park.

Ro Wauer coordinated a Colima warbler census in th park May 7 - 9. The survey counted 68 pair, down from previous census years. Populations in traditional nesting areas (East Rim, Laguna Meadow, Upper Boot Canyon) were reduced, but up in other areas where nesting in the past has been low, particularly in lower Boot Canyon. Wauer theorizes that the Easter snow storm drove warblers out of traditional nesting areas into lower, more protected zones. The resulting freeze apparently killed buds on early leafing trees in the higher zones, thus reducing cover and insects. In the lower protected areas the birds found suitable habitat and forage and remained, instead of returning to the traditional sites. Wauer also documented a previously unrecorded nesting area in the Upper Green Gulch.

The annual Black-capped vireo survey was also conducted in May. This year only 19 vireos were located and only four nests. As in the previous two years, there was no evidence of brown-headed cowbird parisitism, although one nest had apparently been predated. At this point there has been no supposition on the reason for the decline, although drought conditons may have played a role.

Peregrine falcons were monitored through the season, and will continued to be watched until fledging is completed. To date there are 14 known active pair in and near the park, about the same as last year. Tentatively it appears that at least six of those nests have failed. Nesting success for Peregrines has been low the past several years in the Big Bend, and with the probable down- or delisting of the species, there is special cause for concern.

Pondering this past spring and and the incredible variety of species seen I can't help but feel that drought conditions had something to do with altering migration patterns, causing eastern vagrants to show up in large numbers. Many of the migrants that move through the park in the spring are traveling up along the western slope of the eastern Sierra Madre and are funneled to the park. With drought conditions existing over much of northern Mexico it may be that the lack of available surface water at critical resting areas drove more eastern species our way. This could explain the presence of the flame-colored tanagers. According to Howell and Webb, there are two races

of the flame-colored tanager, one occuring in the west, the other in the east. If the tanagers observed here were from the eastern race, they could have been driven north along with the migrant wave. Unfortunately we don't know at this point which race we had here. The violet-crowned hummingbird most likely came from areas west of here and it could be that drought conditions also had something to do with its presence here. The question that bothers me more is where did these birds go after they left here? Back to Mexico? Quien sabe???

On the other hand, I'm not sure that the large number of birders and bird watching tours in the park this spring didn't have something to do with the variety of reports turned in. The presence of the NBS crew certainly had something to do with the large number of reports this spring. They were censusing in areas not normally looked at by visitors and turned up many rare and accidental species. Another bird researcher, Fred Wong, was also in the park during the season, doing surveys at isolated springs and he too, contributed a number of good observations. So was this just a "normal" spring for Big Bend with more people out looking and reporting, or an unusual season with higher numbers of oddities? I suspect a little of both.

Obviously it is simplifying matters to pin everything on drought conditions. There are probably other factors involved that could also influence movement patterns in migration, i.e. degradation of key habitat areas along the route, unusual severe weather, etc.. Whatever happened to cause the high incidence of vagrants, in general the migration arrived on time here, the biggest push occuring from about the last week of April through the first week of May. There was nothing that was significantly absent during the period, although shorebirds and waterfowl numbers were down, due most likely to extremely low river levels.

Hello John,

Attached is a list of observations reported by visitors and staff for the period March 1 - May 31. I've compiled only those observations for species which are listed as Rare, Accidental, Hypothetical or Not included (?) on the park's checklist. A "?spr" indicates a species which is documented for the park but not in the spring season.

Where to begin with this spring season? It has certainly been one full of surprises, especially in light of continued drought conditions and a very quiet winter preceding. There were several significant weather events during the period; March registered no measurable precipitation at any of the park's rain gauges. April brought an Easter storm that included snow, hail and high winds. May finally saw several heavy rainfalls, including a 1.6 inch downpour at Rio Grande Village that also involved damaging winds (tornado?) which snapped trees like matchsticks. Year to date precipitation as compared to ytd totals for May 1995 (+ or -) is as follows: Panther Junction; 2.07 " (- 0.5") Chisos Basin; 2.25" (- 1.21"), Rio Grande Village; 2.50" (+0.01"), Castolon; 0.57" (- 0.67"), and Persimmon Gap; 1.73" (+0.04"). Obviously the Big Bend area continues to be very dry.

Given the drought conditions and the very quiet winter season, I had no great hopes for the spring.... What ended up happening was an incredible showing of vagrant species, several of which were either new to the park (one new to Texas!) or species which had previously been listed as hypotheticals, lacking documentation for inclusion on the main list.

The surprises began March 30 when a crew of National Biological Survey bird researchers (NBS - Michelle Davis, Brian Gibbons, Alex Lindsay, and Hira Walker) reported a **Violet-crowned hummingbird** at the Barker House. The bird was subsequently seen by many other observers and photo-documented by Bernard Heyman during the two days it was present. Reports and photographs were submitted to the Texas Bird Records Committee. This species has been reported in the park before and is currently listed as "hypothetical". None of those previous records were confirmed.

On April 14 Dale and Carolyn Ohl observed an unusual tanager in Pine Canyon. Their report reached the park two days later with a tentative identification of a male **Flame-colored tanger**. Alex Lindsay of the NBS crew relocated the bird on the 18th and was able to get some excellent photographs. Later other members of the crew, as well as some park visitors, also observed the tanager. The last reported observation was on April 19th. On April 20th the same NBS crew reported a second tanager, this one possibly a first spring male, in the Chisos Basin near the oxidation ponds. The bird was photodocumented by Alex Lindsay and Brian Gibbons. The last reported observation was on April 22nd. Reports and slides of both birds were also submitted to the TBRC. If accepted, these observation will constitute the first records for Texas.

NBS researcher Brian Gibbons reported and photographed a **Dusky-capped Flycatcher** in Pine canyon on April 23. On May 8 a group involved in a Colima warbler census (Ribble/Parmeter/Flippo) heard two dusky-capped flycatchers calling and one member of the party saw the birds. This species is listed as accidental in the park and is a review species in Texas. Reports and slides were submitted to the TBRC.

Anne Belamy reported a **Greater Pewee** at Rio Grande Village on April 26th. Another Texas review species and listed as accidental in the park, this bird too was reported to the TBRC. Unfortunately no photographs were obtained.

The wave of unusual species continued into May, beginning with a May 1 report from Bill Murphy of a Baird's Sparrow on the main park road (Rte 13) 2.6 miles from the Panther Junction headquarters. A large group of birders nearly disrupted traffic as they observed a very cooperative Baird's as close as five feet along the road and road shoulder. The bird had no fear of oncoming traffic, in fact it was almost turned into a specimen by a visitor who was rushing to see the bird. The last reported observation was May 2nd at the same site. A second Baird's turned up at Rio Grande Village on May 4 and was observed until the 6th. (Anne Bellamy and Brian Gibbons). Reports on both birds were submitted to TBRC. Apparently photographs were taken of the first sparrow but none were submitted to the park.

Beyond the above review species, the spring migration also provided other surprises. On May 4 a group of British birders (twitchers?) observed a **Swainson's warbler** in the Boot Springs area of the Chisos Mountains. Several other birding groups also observed the bird for a period of several hours,

including Ro Wauer and his tour group. Swainson's warbler is another species which has been reported but never confirmed for the park.

Ro Wauer coordinated a Colima warbler census in th park May 7 - 9. The survey counted 68 pair, down from previous census years. Populations in traditional nesting areas (East Rim, Laguna Meadow, Upper Boot Canyon) were reduced, but up in other areas where nesting in the past has been low, particularly in lower Boot Canyon. Wauer theorizes that the Easter snow storm drove warblers out of traditional nesting areas into lower, more protected zones. The resulting freeze apparently killed buds on early leafing trees in the higher zones, thus reducing cover and insects. In the lower protected areas the birds found suitable habitat and forage and remained, instead of returning to the traditional sites. Wauer also documented a previously unrecorded nesting area in the Upper Green Gulch.

The annual Black-capped vireo survey was also conducted in May. This year only 19 vireos were located and only four nests. As in the previous two years, there was no evidence of brown-headed cowbird parisitism, although one nest had apparently been predated. At this point there has been no supposition on the reason for the decline, although drought conditions may have played a role.

Peregrine falcons were monitored through the season, and will continued to be watched until fledging is completed. To date there are 14 known active pair in and near the park, about the same as last year. Tentatively it appears that at least six of those nests have failed. Nesting success for Peregrines has been low the past several years in the Big Bend, and with the probable down- or delisting of the species, there is special cause for concern.

Pondering this past spring and and the incredible variety of species seen I can't help but feel that drought conditions had something to do with altering migration patterns, causing eastern vagrants to show up in large numbers. Many of the migrants that move through the park in the spring are traveling up along the western slope of the eastern Sierra Madre and are funneled to the park. With drought conditions existing over much of northern Mexico it may be that the lack of available surface water at critical resting areas drove more eastern species our way. This could explain the presence of the flame-colored tanagers. According to Howell and Webb, there are two races of the flame-colored tanager, one occuring in the west, the other in the east. If the tanagers observed here were from the eastern race, they could have been

driven north along with the migrant wave. Unfortunately we don't know at this point which race we had here. The violet-crowned hummingbird most likely came from areas west of here and it could be that drought conditions also had something to do with its presence here. The question that bothers me more is where did these birds go after they left here? Back to Mexico? Quien sabe???

On the other hand, I'm not sure that the large number of birders and bird watching tours in the park this spring didn't have something to do with the variety of reports turned in. The presence of the NBS crew certainly had something to do with the large number of reports this spring. They were censusing in areas not normally looked at by visitors and turned up many rare and accidental species. Another bird researcher, Fred Wong, was also in the park during the season, doing surveys at isolated springs and he too, contributed a number of good observations. So was this just a "normal" spring for Big Bend with more people out looking and reporting, or an unusual season with higher numbers of oddities? I suspect a little of both.

Obviously it is simplifying matters to pin everything on drought conditions. There are probably other factors involved that could also influence movement patterns in migration, i.e. degradation of key habitat areas along the route, unusual severe weather, etc.. Whatever happened to cause the high incidence of vagrants, in general the migration arrived on time here, the biggest push occuring from about the last week of April through the first week of May. There was nothing that was significantly absent during the period, although shorebirds and waterfowl numbers were down, due most likely to extremely low river levels.

#### BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK RARE BIRD RECORDS JUNE-AUGUST, 1996

September 06, 1996

Attached is a list of observations reported by visitors and staff for the period June 1 - August 31. I've compiled only those observations for species which are listed as Rare, Accidental, Hypothetical or Not included (?) on the park's checklist. A "?sum" indicates a species which is documented for the park but not in the summer season.

Weather for June and July was "normal"; hot and dry punctuated by periodic rainfalls. There were heavy, isolated downpours throughout June, and one very wet week during the second week of July. August brought tremendous rainfall on the heels of Hurricane Dolly. Year to date precipitation as compared to ytd totals for August 1995 (+ or -) is as follows: Panther Junction; 11.00" (+ 5.07"), Chisos Basin; 14.10" ( + 5.91"), Rio Grande Village; 4.95" (- 0.11"), Castolon; 7.29" (+ 4.28"), and Persimmon Gap; 6.06" (+ 0.41"). As you can see, the higher elevations benefited most from the clouds. The resulting bloom and green-up in that area of the park has been very gratifying to watch. Even though rainfall has been less in the lower elevations, we expect to eventually see some good recharge in the lower springs and seeps. This bodes well for the coming fall migration.

It has been relatively quiet in the park with regard to unusual birds but there have been a couple of highlights. First was an intriguing report of elegant trogon in the Boot Canyon area in mid-June by Linda and David Hedges and Mark Adams. Unfortunately we were not able to confirm this report with a follow-up sighting or photograph. We had better luck documenting tropical kingbirds at Cottonwood Campground. Barry Lyon and Rob Day observed one bird on June 24 and were able to get photographs. Victor Emanuel and Barry Zimmer saw three kingbirds on July 19 and were able to get recordings of the calls. I found two kingbirds at the same site on July 22 and observed one of them on a nest. A visit on August 3 revealed that the nest had apparently blown down in a storm, but the birds were still present in the area. Jan and Will Risser reported a broad-billed hummingbird along the Laguna Meadow trail, about 200 yards below the point where the trail tops out. Mountain sage is in full bloom throughout the high Chisos and is attracting quite a show of hummingbirds; Lucifer, rufous, broad-tailed, black-chinned and calliope.

To reiterate other breeding bird information from the spring report; Ro Wauer coordinated a Colima warbler census in the park May 7 - 9. The survey counted 68 pair, down from previous census years. Wauer also documented a previously unrecorded nesting area in the Upper Green Gulch. The annual black-capped vireo survey was conducted in May. This year only 19 vireos were located and only four nests. As in the previous two years, there was no evidence of brown-headed cowbird parasitism, although one nest had apparently been predated. At this point there has been no supposition on the reason for the decline, although drought conditions may have played a role. Peregrine falcons had another poor year; of 14 known eyries in and near the park, only three were successful, producing a total of six fledglings. Nesting success for Peregrines has been low the past several years in the Big Bend, and with the probable down or delisting of the species, there is special cause for concern.

#### BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK RARE BIRD RECORDS AUGUST - NOVEMBER, 1996

December 05, 1996

Attached is a list of observations reported by visitors and staff for the period August 01 - November 30. I've compiled only those observations for species which are listed as Rare, Accidental, Hypothetical or Not included (?) on the park's checklist.

Weather for the period included tremendous August rainfalls on the heels of Hurricane Dolly. Panther Junction received 6.35" in August alone - more than 40% of the ytd total. Year to date precipitation as compared to ytd totals for November 1995 (+ or -) is as follows: Panther Junction; 14.44" (+ 6.00"), Chisos Basin; 16.34" ( + 0.95"), Rio Grande Village; 6.78" (+ 0.05"), Castolon; 9.91" (+ 5.68"), and Persimmon Gap; 8.24" (+ 1.05"). As you can see, not all areas of the park benefitted from the drought-breaking rains but, even though rainfall was less in the lower elevations, we did see some good recharge in the lower springs and seeps. Rainfall gradually diminished, as expected, through the remainder of the fall season. Several cold fronts entered the area beginning in late October, bringing some minor movements of birds, but it wasn't until late November that things really began to move through the park.

The fall season began rather quietly with a thin trickle of post-breeding hummingbirds and migrant warblers. The most notable observations for the early fall were those of a broad-billed hummingbird on the Laguna Meadow trail on 8/23 by Jan and Will Risser and a red-faced warbler in Pine Canyon on 8/12 by John Gee and Carol Edwards. Unfortunately we were not able to confirm these reports with a follow-up sighting or photograph. In late September an influx of red-breasted nuthatches reached Big Bend. For a period of a month individuals could be found at all elevations, including three down along the river in the Lower Canyons in October. A cold front that moved through in the latter days of October brought two Lewis's woodpeckers to Rio Grande Village on 10/29 (Jim Hines). About this time we began to witness a steady and increasing movement of mountain bluebirds, american robins, and sage thrashers, all moving on the heels of extreme cold fronts to the north. They arrived to find excellent supplies of fruits and berries that had gone relatively untouched. (Robins cleaned my pyracantha bush in a week!) Another indicator of cold weather to the north was a roughlegged hawk observed on 11/22 along the south end of the Maverick road on the west side I received one verbal report of a probable rough-leg outside the park in of the park. the Study Butte area at about the same time (fide Jim Hines). According to Wauer, rough-legs haven't been reported in the park since 1988.

November cold fronts also blew in a tremendous variety of sparrows and finches. Michelle Davis and the NBS bird survey crew reported 5-6 LeConte's sparrows on 11/23 in the grassy areas along Tornillo Flat. Subsequent visits by other birders have, so far, failed to turn up any more LeContes, but chipping, Brewer's, clay-colored, vesper, sage, grasshopper, savannah, Lincoln's, song, and white-crowned sparrows are thick. In late October Jim Hines reported Lawrence's goldfinches at Lake Ament in the Terlingua Ranch. (Report to be submitted to TBRC:Lasley). Davis and others reported Cassin's finches and red crossbills in the Boot Canyon and Chisos Basin between 11/18 and 11/22. Evening grosbeaks, another unusual visitor, were reported twice in November - the 3rd at Panther Junction (Betty Baker), and the 9th in the Basin (Brian Zimmerman). Conspicuously absent or reduced this fall were shorebirds and ducks. After the late summer/early fall rains the river came up dramatically, but has since gone down, though not quite as low as it was in the spring and early summer. I think that all the rain in August and early September, falling over a wide-spread area, encouraged migrating shorebirds to keep on moving. The ducks seem to have retreated to the deeper and more inaccessible Lower Canyons area of the Wild and Scenic River.
