INTRODUCTION

In an effort to make the transition to an employee at the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in Cincinnati, Ohio more enjoyable, the Network of Cincinnati EPA Trainees (NCET) has compiled the following packet. Inside the packet you will find a plethora of information, ranging from childcare to transportation resources, all compiled from individuals who also relocated and experienced the same hurdles associated with moving and beginning a new job. The information is divided into topics, with a summary and numerous links to connect you to web sites that provide more detailed descriptions.

NCET was founded in the spring of 2007. The purpose of NCET is to foster the professional advancement of students and pre- and post-doctoral

fellows at the Environmental Protection Agency in Cincinnati, Ohio. The goals of NCET are to organize and promote educational and training activities, identify and foster employment opportunities, assist in the orientation of new trainees, provide an atmosphere of communication among members and to facilitate communication with non-member peers within the scientific community, ensure continuity of and networking between past/present members and raise awareness of the student/post doc issues, expertise and collaborations.

The types of employees specific to NCET include federal post-docs, research fellows (grantees), ORISE fellows and student service contractors. This packet is applicable to all unless otherwise noted.

OFF-SITE FACILITIES

Although much of the research and activities of post-docs and student contractors occur at the Andrew W. Breidenbach Environmental Research Center (AWBERC), EPA-Cincinnati does have several other facilities at which research is conducted. Post-docs and student contractors may have the opportunity to be placed at these locations. Positions at these locations range on the order of positions as at AWBERC, but much of the research at off-site facilities is classified as field work. Both bench study and pilot scale projects are currently being conducted at all sites.

A brief description and location of the three major off-site facilities is presented below. Additional information and directions may be viewed at http://www.epa.gov/nrmrl/facilities.html.

Testing & Evaluation Facility (T&E Facility) 1600 Gest St.

Cincinnati, OH 45216

Research conducted at this facility focuses on water and hazardous waste treatment technologies. Research includes both bench and small scale studies of UV light remediation and bio-remediation. On-site chemistry labs are available as well as a large high-bay research area. Also available are water distribution systems that allow for the study of water contaminants and small water systems. The facility is located in the Municipal Sewer District (MSD) of Cincinnati. Employees may enter at the main MSD gate with your EPA identification and park at the second building on the right. Entrance to the building is electronic with your EPA identification, or the building can be accessed by pressing the buzzer by the loading door. Security is on-site.

Experimental Stream Facility (ESF) 1003 State Route 50 Milford, OH 45210

This facility focuses on the research of stream ecosystems. Using a system of pumps and a local river, the ESF is able to study a natural environment under controlled laboratory conditions. Studies are performed in which the stream structure and function is affected by known environmental stressors. With this type of laboratory setup, results

between experimentally contaminated streams and uncontaminated streams may be compared, which is not possible in field experimentation. This information can then be used with watershed management. The ESF is located in Milford, Ohio. Entrance to the facility is electronic with your EPA identification.

Center Hill Facility 5995 Center Hill Ave. Cincinnati, OH 45216

The research at this facility focuses on sediment/soil contaminant interaction and various studies regarding land contamination. This includes landfill leaching, landfill bioreactors and contaminant disposal. The facility features instrumentation capable of measuring both the chemical and microbial characteristics of waste, leachates, soils and sediments. The transport of contaminants through soil and sediment is also explored. The facility features a large high-bay research area and several research labs capable of sustaining bench and pilot scale research projects. Center Hill is located in northern Cincinnati. The gate entrance may be opened electronically or by speaking to onsite security.



AUTO REGISTRATION, TITLING AND LICENSING

Ohio Residents

If you are new to Ohio and have a car, you are going to need an Ohio driver's license and a title and registration for your car and license plates.

(1) How to obtain an Ohio State Driver's License—Driver's License web site: http://www.bmv.OH.gov/driver_license/dl_info.htm

Unfortunately, you have to pass a written test to get your Ohio license. To pass the test, you'll have to be aware of Ohio motor vehicle laws. The booklet is downloadable as a PDF off of the Ohio BMV web site.

The driving test is usually waived for new residents who have a valid out-of-state license. The examiner may require one for someone who may need a license restriction.

Additionally, non-U.S. citizens are required to provide **proof of legal presence** before an Ohio driver's license or identification card can be issued.

So read the booklet [or you can decide to "wing it" and see if you can pass the test with common sense alone].

- a. Head to your local license agency. Don't forget to bring your old driver's license, social security card, birth certificate, passport—actually, bring everything that you are comfortable with carrying! It never hurts to have more than you need-rather than less.
- b. Take a vision test and the written test and hopefully, pass both.
- c. When you pass, they will hand you an "examination passed" form. Take this form to the nearest license agency (if you are doing this the same day, you should already be there) where you will complete an application, pay the appropriate fees, have your picture taken and get your new license upon surrendering your old one.

Congratulations! You have an Ohio driver's license!

(2) How to obtain an Ohio title and registration for your car and license plates:

Before you do these steps, don't forget to bring proof that you live in Ohio (i.e., copy of your lease, some notarized document proving your address, etc), all your forms of I.D., your old car title, etc. Anything that you are comfortable with carrying around and can anticipate the BMV wanting or asking for, just take it with you.

Also, please keep these things in mind:

- If your vehicle has two owners, both parties have to handle this unless you get a notarized power of attorney for the one who cannot handle this with you
- If you have a lien on your car, you will have to request that your original title be sent directly to the auto title office so the lien can be recorded on the Ohio title as well as supply an original or copy of the loan papers
- If you lease a car, contact your leasing agency to find out how they want you to handle the title transfer. It can vary with different companies.

[Helpful Hint: If you find a license agency that is right next to an auto title office, this will save you some time and gas.]

- a. Bring your car to your local license agency, and have it inspected. They will verify the make, model, body type and VIN. It takes about 5 minutes and will cost \$3.50. They will give you a completed inspection form.
- b. Take your form to the auto title office (please see the end of this section for a listing).
- c. Be prepared to pay a fee for the title transfer. Call the Clerk of Courts (see license agency or auto title office listings) to determine the charge for your title transfer.
- d. Head to a license agency to obtain your license plates and register your vehicle in Ohio. You'll have to show them your new Ohio car title. Also, depending on when you go, what taxing district you reside in and when your birthday is, your cost will range from \$35–\$105 for your new plates.

Congratulations! You have survived the bureaucracy of the BMV. Now you're ready for the EPA.

Kentucky Residents

This is done at the county clerk's office. The motor vehicle licensing system can be found at http://mvl.ky.gov.



There you can find where your county clerk is, what you need to bring, hours of operation, phone numbers, answers to FAQ, etc.

Getting a Driver's License

In Kentucky, this is usually done at the court house. Most people will not have to take a written test. For instructions and locations of the court house nearest you, visit the Division of Driver Licensing web site: http://www.kytc.ky.gov/drlic/.

After You Fill Out Your Registration Form
Return the form to the Hamilton County Board of
Elections or the Secretary of State's office in person
or by mail.

Mailed registration forms sent to the Board of Elections or the Secretary of State's office must be postmarked 30 days before an election to be valid for the election.

Registration forms not mailed in must be received by the Board of Elections, the Secretary of State's office, public high schools or vocational schools, public libraries, office of any Bureau of Motor Vehicles, county Treasurer's office or designated agencies 30 days before an election to be valid for that election.

After You Register

You will receive a registration card from the Board of Elections. The card will give the name of your precinct and the address of your polling place. It will also list your Congressional, State House, and State Senate districts. Remember to update your address with the Board of Elections if you move. Whenever you update your voter registration information you will receive a new card.

To Maintain Your Registration

Vote at least once every 4 years. Notify the Board of Elections in writing of any change of address/name. For information about the process call the Hamilton County Board of Elections at 513-632-7000.

HOUSING

Ohio

Choosing a place to live depends on many factors, but there are some things particular to Cincinnati that will be helpful when trying to find a place to live. The Greater Cincinnati Area includes parts of Ohio, Kentucky, and Indiana. Many EPA employees have chosen to live in Kentucky and often brag that their commute is shorter than others living within the Cincinnati city limits. The city of Cincinnati and immediate surrounding areas comprise multiple neighborhoods; many of which have a very distinctive character. Often there is a neighborhood square with small shops, restaurants and a community center. The housing branches off from the neighborhood square in all directions. Things to think about in choosing a neighborhood in which to live include the vicinity to the EPA and major highways, the character of the neighborhood including the diversity of people and shopping venues, types of housing offered and if you have children, the nearby schools and school district.

The locations discussed in this document are not intended to be inclusive. We hope the information and web-links provided in this section will assist you in finding your new home, but we stress that we are not advocating any particular location. Sally Miracle 513-351-9799 rents units on a short-term basis and has given permission to be listed here. As provided by an NCET member: "When I first got here I decided to rent short term, to give myself time to get acquainted with the city and figure out where I wanted to live. I rented in Norwood from a woman named Sally Miracle. She has a few units, and rents them on a short-term basis. I believe the minimum is one week and after that it can be as you need it—even day by day. I also believe she has furnished and unfurnished apartments depending on your needs and availability. It was very economical and included all utilities, laundry and cable. She often advertises on craigslist"

As provided by an EPA employee:

"I stayed in a beautifully furnished studio apartment that included wireless internet, all other utilities. and cleaning service once a week. There are free laundry facilities in the basement and plenty of parking. They ask for a minimum of one month stay. After that, it's month-to-month, and they will prorate, so if you leave mid-month, they don't make you pay for the whole month. They were very welcoming of my two cats, so I know they accept at least some pets, although I don't know what their limit might be. They have one-bedroom apartments as well as studios, and they also have another property with furnished apartments in Newport. It's called the Vendome, and it's also a big old restored house. I would highly recommend where I stayed and the owners (Donna and Roger Weddle) are incredibly nice." www.whillmansion.com/

SCHOOLS

Deciding on a School District

For new employees with families, deciding on where to live is often based on where your child will attend school. However, living near the EPA building is also desirable. Therefore, here we provide some brief information about different school districts surrounding the Cincinnati area, but have a separate, more in depth section for the Cincinnati Public school district. School districts and individual schools within Ohio are ranked by the Ohio Department of Education on the Ohio Report Card according to student performance on state proficiency tests, attendance and graduation rate. Each school district's report

card is available at the address below, but we have also summarized some of the data for you in the following tables. These results were compiled for the 2006–2007 school year.

Keep in mind that these report cards only offer ratings and statistics based on test scores which may be affected by many factors. In addition, these report cards are for the school district as a whole and individual schools may differ, so be sure to do additional research about the specific school your children would attend.

Magnet Elementary Schools

There are also magnet elementary schools, which parents can apply to between January and April preceding the Fall when the child would start school.

Many of the magnet schools offer an alternative teaching style such as Montessori. Other magnet schools specialize in the arts or languages. The following web site provides a brief description of all the magnet schools:

Parents must apply in person at the magnet school they would like to attend. Because spaces are limited at the magnet schools, parents are encouraged to apply early. Many parents wait outside the school they are interested in for several hours on the first day of the application period. Contact the magnet school of interest for more information about the applying to that school.

High School (grades 9–12)

Students choose between several high schools in the city. Unlike the elementary schools, there is not a neighborhood high school. Instead, students select from a variety of high-school programs with special focuses leading students into careers and higher education. Walnut Hills is a 6–year college preparatory school well known for its exceptional performance. An entrance exam is required for enrollment.

Individual schools are also ranked by the Ohio Department of Education on the Ohio Report Card according to student performance on state proficiency tests, attendance and graduation rate. Each school's report card is also available at the above address.

Many of the Cincinnati public schools, especially the elementary schools are performing poorly according to the school report card. However, these report cards only offer statistics based on test scores which may be affected by many factors. Parents are encouraged to visit the neighborhood schools and learn more about them through the school web sites and the PTA. 

CHILD CARE

If your children are not of school age, you may be considering child care. There are two options for child care in very close proximity to the EPA, Future Environments and the University of Cincinnati Childcare Center.

Future Environments, Inc. Child Development Center (FEI)

FEI, located at the northwest corner of the EPA campus, is managed by Memorial, Inc. and overseen by a Board of Directors (fei.ci@epa.gov) comprised of EPA parent and employee volunteers. FEI serves EPA employees and other community working parents, with EPA employees receiving priority consideration.



Future Environments offers an infant program for 9 children, ages 3 months to 18 months; a toddler program with two classrooms of 10 children each, ages 18 months to 3 years; and a preschool program with a team teaching environment of 20 children, ages 3 to 5 years. The hours are 6:30 am–6:00 pm, Monday through Friday. Rates vary by classroom, but are generally competitive for the area. University of Cincinnati

College Hill, Clifton/University Heights, Fairview, Northside, Clifton, Mt. Airy, Winton Hills, Spring Grove Village and Camp Washington

The locations having the highest violent crime rate (based on 2007 statistics) within each District are Over-the-Rhine, Fay Apartments, East Price Hill, West Price Hill, Westwood and Avondale. Walnut Hills had a very high robbery rate and District 4, as a whole, accounted for 44% of the city total for murder in 2007.

Many other suburbs exist that are not included in the Police Districts, due to their being considered cities and/or townships of their own. Some of these are Amberly, Ludlow, Norwood, Deer Park, Blue Ash, Finneytown, Loveland, Wyoming, Cheviot, Sharonville, Anderson, Madeira and Indian Hill. SWON is a "cooperative of area libraries organized to promote library services among and through member institutions. SWON Libraries consists of academic, public, school and special libraries in Southwest Ohio and Northern Kentucky. All libraries of any type (academic, public, school, special) within the 17 county service area in Ohio (Adams, Brown, Butler, Champaign, Clark, Clermont, Clinton, Darke, Fayette, Greene, Hamilton, Highland, Madison, Miami, Montgomery, Preble and Warren) are considered basic members of SWON Libraries."

You can borrow materials from any of them. For example, if you are a member of the Kenton County library system, then you can be a member of Cincinnati libraries too, but you must obtain a library card for each.
