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### **ECONOMIC SUMMIT SET FOR NOVEMBER 17**

I am pleased to report that Secretary of Commerce Donald Evans (<a href="www.commerce.gov">www.commerce.gov</a>) has accepted my invitation to visit Mobile on November 17, 2003, to participate in a Southwest Alabama economic summit. The purpose of the summit is to bring the Southwest Alabama community together to address ways to focus the community's resources on spurring economic development and creating jobs. Baldwin, Clarke, Escambia, Mobile, Monroe, and Washington counties will be the focus of the event.

#### LEGISLATIVE HIGHLIGHTS FOR OCTOBER 2003

- A prominent issue before Congress was clarification of the Do-Not-Call law. Courts have ruled against the right of individuals to choose not to receive telemarketing calls, so the House and Senate have worked to reinstate this law.
- The first appropriations bill signed this year by President Bush was the Homeland Security Appropriations Act. This bill was itself a first in that it was only developed this year to compartmentalize our response to potential terrorist acts on our soil.
- Another well-publicized appropriations measure is the president's \$87 billion supplemental appropriations request for Iraq and Afghanistan now in the legislative process.
- ➤ In the wake of the Northeast blackout, a renewed effort is being made to adopt a national energy policy. Major differences

between House and Senate energy bills have almost stymied the conference committee, but the conferees have rolled up their sleeves to try to reach consensus in numerous areas.

- The Medicare Prescription Drug and Modernization Act is also being deliberated by a House-Senate conference committee. This major initiative passed the two bodies in different forms and compromises have been hard to achieve.
- ➤ The House Budget Committee on which I serve released its Waste, Fraud and Abuse report identifying some \$85-\$100 billion that the federal government wastes. This report follows a series of Budget Committee hearings and is a compilation of submissions by the various congressional committees and the General Accounting Office. The challenge now is to implement measures to eliminate wasteful spending.
