Russia to Experience Delays in TRQ and Quota Distribution for Second Straight Year

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Report Highlights:

The Russian Government has experienced delays in issuing full implementing regulations for the 2005 poultry quota and beef and pork tariff rate quotas (TRQ). Even if the necessary resolutions are passed before the New Year holidays, most Russian imports of U.S. poultry and pork will not resume until at least February 2005.

Includes PSD Changes: No Includes Trade Matrix: No Unscheduled Report Moscow [RS1] **Executive Summary**: The Russian Government has hindered access for the largest agricultural commodity imports for the second straight year by delaying the issuance of implementing regulations for the 2005 poultry quota and beef and pork tariff rate quotas (TRQ). The Russian press states that government resolutions that re-authorize the frozen beef, chilled beef, and pork TRQs and poultry quota will soon be passed. However, trade can only begin following secondary resolutions that allocate import licenses to individual companies. Even if these eight resolutions are passed before the New Year holidays, normal levels of trade will not resume until February 2005.

Background

Currently, the Russian Federation restricts market access for meat products using separate tariff rate quotas for chilled beef, frozen beef, and pork and a quota for poultry meat. In order to begin imports of these products in 2005, the Russian Government must issue two legislative measures for each commodity: an implementing resolution and importer list. The implementing resolutions state the absolute volume of the quota and TRQs and the overquota tariff applied to beef and pork imported outside of the TRQ. Additionally, the resolutions state the volume of each commodity allocated to individual exporting countries. Lastly, the import list is a separate document that outlines precisely the volume each approved Russian importer is allocated and from which countries the products can be imported.

As of December 30, though press reports have repeatedly suggested that Prime Minister Fradkov is close to signing the implementing resolutions, none of these documents has been published. The press reports that the Ministry of Economic Development and Trade (MEDT) is continuing to face a difficult opposition from the Ministry of Agriculture (MinAg) regarding several parts of the resolution, including the concept of country allocations.

A similar situation took place during the authorization of the 2004 quota that sheds some light on the possible repercussions of the current situation. In anticipation of the 2004 TRQ and quota, the implementing resolutions were published November 29, 2003 after lengthy discussions of topics such as the country allocation and overall level of the pork and beef TRQs. However, actual implementation became a problem in early 2004 as MEDT published and then removed three importer lists that contained errors. Trade could not officially begin until the final list was published and made effective in the first week of February 2004.

However, the real trade impact is difficult to estimate. Despite the importer list problems in early 2004, some trade still took place. For example, 35,000 metric tons (\$22 million) of poultry was imported by Russia in January 2004, which is about one third of normal monthly trade. In total, exports ran from between at only one-third to one-half capacity for the first three months of 2004.

Nevertheless, this came as a surprise to many given that the final official document giving importers the right to import was not published until February. It is unclear exactly what happened, but trade contacts state that the Ministry of Economic Development and Trade (MEDT) issued "provisionary" import licenses to companies based the importer lists that were rescinded. Essentially, it was known roughly the volume importers were going to get, though not precisely how much. So in order to maintain trade flows, a proportion of a company's final import licenses were issued in January and February in order to maintain trade flow. These provisionary licenses were enough to allow imports badly needed by Russian consumers and meat processors. This process was likely used until early March, when the first ships could physically arrive from the more distant suppliers (U.S. and Brazil) following the publication of the final importer list.

Assuming that the Prime Minister will sign the implementing resolution before the Russian New Year holiday, it is very unlikely that MEDT will be able to compile the importer lists prior to the next full work week for the Russian Government (January 10). Thus, Russian importers will not be able to start contracting U.S. product until mid-January. As a result, it seems unlikely that full shipments of U.S. poultry and pork will be arriving in Russia until mid-February. However, if the implementing resolutions are not signed until after the holidays, the wait will be longer.
