233rd Marine Corps Birthday Text provided by GySgt Marlon Villacres Photos by Michelle Marshall

On November 1, 1921, General John A. Lejeune, 13th Commandant of the Marine Corps, directed that a reminder to the Corps be published by every command to all Marines around the globe on the birthday of the Corps.

In compliance with the will of our 13th Commandant, article 38, of the Marine Corps manual, edition of 1921, is republished as follows:

"On November 10, 1775, a Corps of Marines was created by a resolution of the Continental Congress. Since that day many thousand men have borne the name Marine. In memory of them it is fitting that we who are Marines should commemorate the birthday of our Corps by calling to mind the glories of its long and illustrious history."

The record of our Corps is one which will bear comparison with that of most famous military organizations in the world's history.

Of the Marine Corps 146 years of existence, 90 of those have been in action against the nations foes. From the battle of Trenton to the Argonne, Marines have won foremost honors in war, and in long eras of tranquility at home.

Credit Cards and You: Know Your Foreign Transaction Fee

What credit card do you use for overseas purchases? If you use a credit card for local currency purchases overseas, you need to know what a **Foreign Transaction Fee** (FTF) is and what your credit card company charges for this service.

A Foreign Transaction Fee is charged by credit card issuers to the consumer for conducting transactions outside the US in a non-US\$ transaction. Fees are based on a percentage of your purchase, and most credit cards charge an average FTF of 3%. Verify the FTF of your card by logging on to your credit card web address or by calling the toll free customer service number. State Department Credit Union's Visa and MasterCard products charge a 1% FTF.

Capital One offers a wide variety of credit card products. A common feature of all their credit cards is a 0% FTF. If you pay off your credit card bill each month (and thus do not accrue any interest charges), a Capital One credit card that has no annual fee, a basic 1% cash rebate feature and a 0% FTF may be a great choice. Pouch & the Holidays

I'm sorry to be the guy who hangs out the Christmas decorations before Halloween, but 'tis the season to order your presents before it's too late. So here, under the heading of "Don't say we didn't warn you", is the latest pouch news for the holiday season.

Getting it here on time:

Did you know that the Diplomatic Pouch and Mail service (DPM) does not provide delivery guarantees? It's true. Once your letter or parcel is in the DPM system, it could get to post in a few days, or in a month or more. While we here in the Information Management section at post will do our level best to help you find a parcel, we have absolutely no control over the delivery schedule. We would like to provide you with dates by which you must order Christmas gifts but we are simply unable to do that. We suggest that anything intended to arrive before the 25th of December be sent before the middle of November, but even doing that is no

guarantee. Use your best judgment, but don't be surprised if it gets here late.

Getting it there on time:

Any personal parcel larger than the size of a VHS cassette may only be shipped from post via pouch using the Homeward Bound Mail (HBM) program sponsored by the American Mission Community Association (AMCA). These parcels transit the same DPM process going out as incoming pouch parcels and are subject to the same uncertainty when dealing with delivery dates. As above, buy and send as early in the year as you can manage.

Please refer to Management Policy 002/2008 for details and costs associated with the HBM service provided by AMCA.

Getting it on the 25th of December:

The date of deliveries depends on when the cargo carrier decides to put our bags on a plane. While they are bound to do it within a reasonable time frame, they are not required to meet specific delivery dates. This means that we may or may not get a pouch shipment on the 24th or

25th of December. This year, the 25th of December falls on a regular pouch day. If we actually receive any bags beyond what will have been available on the 24th, some kind volunteers have arranged to help spread a little holiday cheer by holding limited pouch hours on Christmas Day so employees who are expecting packages can come pick up their goodies. More details on this will be forthcoming as the date draws nearer.

My wife really wants new tires for Christmas:

There have been no changes to the pouch restrictions since the beginning of this year, so Management Policy 002/2008 still has all the current details on size, weight and other pouch limitations.
