At the Berkely-Oakland border, you will find this corner storefront Japanese restaurant. There's a small sushi bar, the tables are nicely spaced, and the modern atmosphere is quiet. Service is friendly and families are welcome. The sushi is very fresh, the donburi generous and tasty, but the tempura tends to be a little greasy. The prices are slightly high end. There's a good choice of sake, too. A nice place for lunch also. Worth a try if you are in the area.

The atmosphere is bright and lively, the prices moderate, service quick and friendly. There are just a few outdoor tables, with heat lamps, for eating al fresco.

Service is warm and friendly, and children are welcome. The noise level is totally manageable, and there's a lovely outdoor patio for warm days and nights.

A branch of a popular chain (others are on Solano Ave., on Shattuck Ave. at Cedar, and on Piedmont Ave.). Good for huge hamburgers with all kinds of toppings, soups, large salads, milk shakes, wine and beer. The French fries are terrific, and a half-order is plenty! In my opinion this is the best Barney's because of the lovely shady patio in back, which is wonderful for eating on a warm day.

Oliveto

5655 College Ave. at Rockridge BART

547-5356

This two level place, within the Market Hall complex of shops, features expensive Mediterranean cuisine upstairs, which can be terrific or less so, depending on the choice. The presentation is simple, fresh, and seasonal. Wines are outrageously overpriced. Good service but noisy, reservations recommended. Downstairs is an all day cafe, with lower prices, decent food, and no need to reserve. It has light fare with a few more substantial dishes in the evening.

Citron

5484 College Ave.

653-5484

This lovely place features inventive bistro food with an elegant touch. It is very popular. The small, well chosen menu changes with the seasons, but everything is quite good. Prices are expensive, but worth it if you order carefully. Reservations are essential for dinner, but not at lunchtime. There is a lovely space out back which is perfect for a larger group. This should be on your list for "something special".

A Coté

5478 College Ave. next to Citron

655-6469

A popular place, this storefront space has been transformed into a plush, dimly lit, intimate cafe featuring French bistro inspired small plates, along with a large selection of wines and cocktails. Prices are high, especially for the wine, but this does not deter the crowds. The food can be great or merely good depending on what you order, but the bill will be expensive for what you get. Open late -- go at an off hour to snag a table.

An upscale Thai restaurant in Rockridge, located in a serene architecturally beautiful space. There is a full bar, with a large choice of cocktails. The service is solicitous, and the prices are high end. The food has all of the standards, along with some unique dishes. The tables are nicely spaced, perfect for intimate conversation. The owners gear this towards a glamorous crowd, so all of this comes with high end prices. Tastier Thai food can be found elsewhere, however.

Uzen

In a small storefront in the Rockridge area you will find this spare, high ceilinged, eclectically decorated Japanese restaurant. The small menu features distinctive sushi, along with noodle and rice dishes. The sushi is fresh and excellent, but the choice is often small. Lunchtime prices are moderate, but dinner can get pricey. There's a large selection of sakes along with the Japanese beers. This place can get quite crowded on weekend nights.

Garibaldi's

5356 College Ave.

A spacious beautifully designed restaurant, with elegant and sophisticated decor, and a Mediterranean menu. Open for lunch and dinner, the food is good, portions generous, service friendly, but the prices are high end. There is a full bar, as wel as a large wine list with high prices. This can get very noisy when crowded.

This is a wonderful intimate storefront in Rockridge with decor somewhat Art Moderne and lovely lighting. The small menu features exquisitely prepared delicious seafood, beautifully presented, along with a few other choices. There's a raw bar also, if you are an oyster fan, as well as cocktails and wine. This is a real gem, and definitely worth a try.

Pizzaiolo

5008 Telegraph Ave. south of 51st St.

Extremely popular, this is a great Italian restaurant offering unusual thin crusted pizzas, along with creative delicious pastas. The menu choices change often, but everything is wonderful. Reservations are taken so there's no need to wait. Wines are decently priced, and there's a good selection of beers. Waitpersons are individualistic, and service can be slow when crowded, but do not miss this fine place!

Take yourself to this out of the way location to discover a fabulous menu of Mexican food with a California flair. The restaurant consists of adjoining storefronts decorated with folk art, as well as a lovely heated patio out back. There is a large choice of cocktails to enhance your dining, as well as well priced wine. Highly recommended.

The heated deck is available at all times, and allows for quieter dining.

In a long narrow storefront space, you will find this worthwhile restaurant choice, with an eclectic menu of both classic favorites and Turkish specialties, all moderately priced. Open for both lunch and dinner, this is not trendy food, but it is solid and satisfying. Tables are nicely spaced, service professional, noise level manageable, this is a good place for families, with something for all palates.

An Oakland branch of a Berkeley favorite, it offers a large and lively space and an expanded menu of both small and large plates, along with a retail space for specialty foods. Prices depend on what you order, the food is well spiced, the cocktails and wine great, the ambiance both friendly and sophisticated. This is a fine, if noisy, place for hanging out.

Prices are moderate for the quality of the food, service is friendly, and even the wines are moderately priced. Definitely recommended!

This cafe occupies two adjoining storefronts, with a few outside tables. The chef owner is an alumnus of Chez Panisse, and his cooking is terrific -- fresh and seasonal. The menu is limited -- small plates, creative pizzas, panini, salads, and pastas -- and everything is really delicious. Service friendly and personal. No reservations taken, so try to go at an off hour. Open for lunch on weekdays, too.

This taproom, restaurant, lounge, and hangout has a little bit of everything. The menu offers a wide range of Belgian bistro food, with shellfish platters, mussels, frites, and sandwiches as well as more substantial dishes. There's a huge list of beers as well as cocktails and wine. Prices are moderate, service casual. Mondays are noisy \$1 oyster nights. Later on there's music, dancing, and a pool table. Don't miss this experience!

An urban Oasis on a bustling street full of small shops, this restaurant has a no reservations policy, but it is definitely worth any wait. The decor is chic, hard edges, black and chrome, and it does get noisy, but you feast on a delicious menu of moderately priced Mediterranean food. The pizzas have a thin crackling crisp crust, the fish is perfectly cooked, and the service professional. Wines a bit high priced, though. Worth a visit for sure.

This is a new place located in a large storefront. Decor is Farmhouse rustic/Old English church. Seating is mostly at one of two very long refectory tables. The menu changes daily, and the food is minimalist, pure, organic and sustainable, with few choices of appetizers or main dishes, mostly cooked in the fireplace or wood burning oven. There's always a vegetarian choice. All this comes with high end prices, including the wine. If this is your style, go for it, if not, be warned.

Old Oakland

Washington between 8th and 10th Sts.

This is an area of Oakland that is an intriguing architectural mix of renovated Old Victorians, gentrified condominiums, and hard edge modern office buildings, centered around Washington Street, but extending a bit in other directions. It has a wonderful array of small cafes with outdoor tables and restaurants, as well as shops and galleries. There's a crowded and popular Farmers Market on Fridays also. Very lively during the day, and increasingly popular at night too.

Crown Wok

1019 Clay St. at 11th 625-1005

Near the convention center, this is a large and bustling Chinese restaurant with quick service, an inexpensive menu offering a huge choice of standard items, well cooked if not extraordinary. At lunchtime during the week you can partake of a variety of Dim Sum offered on rolling carts -- just point to what you want, and the Chinese waitpersons will mark your bill. The total will not be expensive. This place is lots quieter than some of the other Dim Sum places.

A large, crowded, and very popular Vietnamese restaurant with a huge menu and moderate prices. Lunch is a real bargain, and the service speedy. This place can get really noisy when full, so beware. The cuisine features lots of meat dishes, but there are a number of vegetarian choices too. There is also a busy take-out counter. Be prepared for long waits on weekend nights, when valet parking is available.

Breads of India

948 Clay St. at 10th 834-7684

A branch of a popular Berkeley restaurant, this beautifully decorated place offers solicitous service, well spaced tables perfect for quiet conversations, and a daily changing menu of classic and traditional items from all over India. The food is delicious, spicing subtle, if not very fiery, and the various breads uniformly wonderful. Prices are very moderate. Closed on Sundays.

Pacific Coast Brewing

Located in an historic building very close to the Convention center is this brewpub, offering a large menu of beers brewed on site, as well as "guest" draft beers, all inexpensive. The menu has moderately priced soups, salads, sandwiches, and pizza. The cooking is decent and hearty, but not as outstanding as the beer! Open for both lunch and dinner, there is a lovely patio in back open all year. A good place to hang out and drink, even on Sunday.

In a beautifully restored Old Oakland building you will find this restaurant, featuring excellent California eclectic cuisine, with many inventive appetizers and salads. The pizzas are terrific. The wine list, with many unusual choices, is expensive. It can get noisy when crowded, and the service erratic, but it's worth a try. Prices are moderately high but lower at lunch. Outdoor tables for good weather.

In the developing Old Oakland restaurant scene, this is a beautiful space with a sleek and modern look. It also has a large bar/lounge, and is extremely noisy including the music pumped up to top volume. The pricey food, featuring small plates and a selection of larger dishes is quite delicious, but car be uneven. The mini lamb burgers are terrific. Wines are expensive, and there are many inventive cocktails too. Outdoor tables for lunch.

Ratto's

821 Washington St. below 9th

A classic that's been around forever, complete with dim lighting, wood floors, and bins of beans and pasta, this old fashioned Continental Italian deli offers an eclectic array of things to buy, along with large inexpensive sandwiches, panini, and salads made to order. Grab a sandwich order sheet, wait your turn, and enjoy a delicious lunch at one of the outdoor tables. Popular and crowded at lunchtime.

A lovely art filled place, close to the Convention Center, open only for breakfast and lunch. The menu choices are small, but everything is fresh and truly delicious. The Italian sandwiches are wonderful, as is the polenta. The peaceful atmosphere is a plus when you want to get away from the crowds, read you paper and enjoy a delicious coffee. Outdoor tables for warm days, too.

Cock-A-Doodle Cafe

719 Washington St.

465-5400

Open for breakfast and lunch, offering a standard array of decently priced choices with a slightly South American touch, this small cafe is now open also for dinner some nights, when the menu changes to moderately priced nicely cooked Cuban food. Decently priced wines are a bonus, as is the lovely back patio. Service informal and friendly, and it's not too crowded most days.

Tamarindo

468 8th St. north of B'way

Upscale modern South American and Mexican cuisine in an elegant atmosphere, this small storefront has some outdoor tables also. Menu choices are mainly small plates at lunch, though at night they also offer a few larger plates. Cooking is really delicious, although the portions can be somewhat small, and the prices a little high for what you get. But, the guacamole is superb and generous. Very popular.

Chinatown

Oakland Chinatown

7th to 12th Sts. btw. Franklin and Harrison

This is an area that is having a huge surge in growth, and is full of wonderful inexpensive restaurants and cafes: Chinese, Burmese, Vietnamese, Korean, etc. Go for a dim sum lunch some day, or just tour the neighborhood, exploring some of the side streets too, and try whatever place smells good and is crowded! You can also get something "to go", and munch as you walk. Some of the places are extremely simple, but do not let that deter you.

Peony

388 9th St., 10th btw. Webster and Franklin

286-8866

Located on the second floor of the Pacific Renaissance Plaza, is this extremely large and popular Chinese restaurant, featuring excellent dim sum at lunch, and specializing in banquets at night. Everyone seems to order the special Peking Duck. There is always a crowd waiting, the place is noisy and bustling, and the prices are high end for the cuisine. But the food is very good, and it is a fine choice for a large group.

Joy Luck

327 8th St. btw. Webster and Harrison

832-4270

Follow the local crowds waiting at this Chinese restaurant, and you will find good food at incredibly low prices. No atmosphere, tables crowded together, noisy, everyone feasts on a large choice of fresh seafood dishes, along with more typical menu items. This is an especially good place for dim sum at lunchtime, when you can eat generously for very little money. Service is quick, if impersonal.

Gourmet Delight

701 Webster St. at 7th

832-7661

Always crowded and nosy, filled with Chinese families, which is always a good sign, this small restaurant makes no concessions to Westerners, but it does offer delicious fresh inexpensive dishes featuring seafood and really good Dim Sum at lunchtime. Since the Dim Sum ladies and their rolling carts do not speak much English, look carefully at what's offered, and point and choose. They'll tote up the bill, and you'll have a fine experience.

Legendary Palace

708 Franklin St.

This place is more upscale than most others in the area, both in decoration and prices. It features Hong Kong style dim sum and seafood. The shrimp are supposed to be especially good. This translates into higher prices, more solicitous service, and very fresh fish. The other choices are less distinctive. Only you can decide whether the decoration and food warrant the cost.

An old florist shop reconfigured into a sleek sophisticated Art Deco bar/restaurant, in a part of town that is still in transition, this is an oasis of California eclectic food, good wines, a gorgeous bar, and more. Despite the out of the way location, it is popular, especially at lunch. Dinner prices are moderately high, with a few decently priced wines. The noise level is usually manageable, and tables are nicely spaced. Service is variable. Easy parking at night.

In Frank Ogawa Plaza (City Hall Plaza), 15th St. west of B'way is this simple place with excellent Vietnamese food. Popular at lunchtime, when you can sit outside in the sunny plaza, the menu features huge bowls of pho, or refreshing cold vermicelli noodle salads called bun, with a variety of toppings. Prices are low, service friendly. At night it is quieter, and there are more menu choices. The Vietnamese crepe, offered only at night, is great!

Verbena

Hidden away in the back lobby of a high rise office building close to Oakland's City Center is this delightful sophisticated place, which is well worth seeking out. Warm atmosphere, tables nicely spaced, a lovely bar. The food is California eclectic, nicely done, prices moderately high but worth it. Popular at lunch, it is very quiet at dinner. Not open on weekends, but give it a try, and you won't regret it!

City Center Mall

13th St. btw. Broadway and Clay

This small pleasant mall has a wealth of informal cafes offering quick breakfasts and decent lunches. The foods range from bagels and espresso to pasta and burritos. Nothing is very expensive, and on sunny days you can take advantage of a large number of outdoor tables and benches. At lunchtime, it becomes crowded with workers from the nearby office buildings. There are also a few shops, a bookstore, and easy access to BART.

This is a small informal restaurant that features pretty good if not superb Cambodian cuisine, with many unusual menu items, all moderate in price. The atmosphere is quiet, service is friendly, and tables nicely spaced so that you can have a quiet conversation. It is worth a try for something different, and is usually not crowded.

La Furia Chalaca

A small restaurant that features Peruvian cooking at moderate prices. The atmosphere is pleasantly quiet and comfortable, the tables nicely decorated with white cloths and flowers. The service is informal but friendly. The food has some unusual dishes featuring potatoes in numerous guises, as well as more typical meat and seafood choices. The sangria is much too expensive, but there is wine and beer.

300 Broadway on 3rd St.

251-8100

A wonderful restaurant not far from Jack London Square, featuring fresh Californian-Asian cuisine at moderately high prices. This is definitely the best restaurant in the area. The cooking here is of high caliber, flavorful, with lovely presentation. Wines are somewhat high priced, atmosphere simple and quiet. This is a popular place, both at lunch and dinner, so reservations are recommended. There is a private room for groups.

Oakland Grill

301 Franklin St.

An extremely informal and funky place, good for generous breakfasts and lunches. Open for dinner too. Don't expect high-end gourmet cooking, but the food is good and the prices moderate. Popular for weekend brunch, when there's often a wait. Located in the middle of the wholesale produce district, it's worth a try for something different.

Very popular, always crowded, generally noisy, this place features Barbecue in all its combinations. The service is friendly, the atmosphere extremely informal, and everyone seems to be having a great time. Open late on weekends, the portions are generous, the prices moderate.

At the bottom of Broadway, (watch out for the trains as you cross Embarcadero), facing the inner harbor, you will find Jack London Square, stretching a few blocks in either direction. There is a lovely walkway along the water. At one end is the First and Last Chance Saloon, which is a must-see, and at the other end a ferry to San Francisco. There's a Barnes and Noble Bookstore, many shops, cafes and restaurants. On Sundays there's a very good Farmers Market too.

Architecturally stunning, this restaurant facing Jack London Sq. features Japanese cuisine in a large quiet dining area with a sushi bar, and an acoustically superb performance space. The food is improving, but the real draw is the music late into the night, at what is one of the top Jazz Clubs in the Bay Area. Prices are moderate to slightly expensive. This is not my favorite Japanese restaurant, but the music makes it special.

A large and busy upscale seafood restaurant on the waterfront, featuring decent cooking, professional friendly service, and well spaced tables. Popular with large groups and families, get a table overlooking the water if you can. Prices are upscale, there's a huge menu, and the food is good if you stick to the simpler presentations. Reservations recommended, especially on weekends.

Kincaid's

One Franklin St. in Jack London Square

835-2032

This place is somewhat formal and dark, with wood interiors. It overlooks the water, so ask for a table with a view, it possible. The large moderately expensive menu features steaks and chops as well as seafood. This is a popular place for business lunches but is quieter at night and on weekends. Service efficient and professional.

Pescatore

An Italian restaurant that specializes in garlic infused pastas, as well as a choice of seafood. It is located on the water, so the tables with a view are preferred. The atmosphere is friendly and informal, the prices moderate.

Hahn's Hibachi

Embarcadero and Franklin

This is a simple informal place featuring low priced Korean style barbecue, chicken, ribs and chops. There are also some Japanese dishes, such as udon and tempura. This is not the place for a fancy gourmet dinner, but it is tasty and quick.
