SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT

Substance abuse treatment for low-income DC residents is available through a variety of sources. The treatment styles between programs are generally categorized as; Faith Based, Therapeutic Community, Work Based or Hospital. Treatment styles are generally defined as follows:

Outpatient treatment – the patient returns to his own home daily while matriculating through a treatment plan. The intensity of outpatient type treatment ranges from intensive hour to hour treatment to monthly group meetings. An intensive outpatient program can require the patient to be under the supervision of the treatment provider for as much as 12 hours per day, or as little as one hour per week, with frequent spot check urinalysis.

Detox – Supervised detoxification to remove the effect of a toxic substance from the body.

Inpatient (Hospital) treatment offers acute care medical supervision and diagnostic evaluations.

Residential treatment – the patient is under the supervision of the treatment provider 24 hours a day, throughout the treatment period.

Aftercare treatment plans, i.e., transitional housing with case management, required NA/AA meetings generally are incorporated into the discharge plan when residents are discharged from residential and/or hospital treatment.

If the person is court involved, a process is in place to help that person receive treatment. The DC Pretrial Services Agency (PSA) and the Court Services and Offender Supervision Agency (CSOSA) have contractual arrangements with a vast number of outpatient, detox and residential treatment programs that are accessible "upon demand." To receive this treatment the person must be referred by a representative of PSA or CSOSA. The process from referral to treatment could take as few as 2 days or as many as 21 days.

The Addiction Prevention Recovery Administration (APRA) is the District's health agency charged with the responsibility of providing substance abuse treatment and prevention to low-income DC residents (see: APRA). APRA also has a vast number of substance abuse treatment programs that are accessible through an APRA managed admission process.

In general, PSA, CSOSA and APRA programs follow the therapeutic community or self-regulating behavior treatment models. Methadone maintenance is available. Treatment programs offered by for-profit organizations require the patient pay for services through insurance and/or fees, or that the participant work for one of the corporation's businesses.

Persons receiving treatment under STAR/HIDTA program are subjected to judicial sanctions. Graduated supervising system beginning with "intensive" and may require daily reporting. STAR/HIDTA contracts several local independent substance abuse treatment providers that provide a broad range of treatment services. Clients are court ordered or referred by a CSOSA agent (PSI writer or supervising officer). Referrees are interviewed by CSOSA's Central Intervention Team (CIT). CIT screens, assesses and recommends the treatment placements for persons deemed in need of treatment. CIT will do jail visits. The SAINT program supervises parolees only. Persons supervised under the

SAINT program are afforded in-house sanctions before adverse proceedings are requested to the US Parole Commission.
