A Word About NASS Reports...

The Agricultural Statistics Board (ASB) publishes reports of production, stocks, inventories, disposition, utilization, and prices of agricultural inputs and commodities, and other items such as labor, farm numbers, and agricultural chemical usage.

National reports are issued from the Washington, D.C., headquarters. Individual State reports are issued from the Field Offices (FO's) following release of the national reports. Printed copies of both ASB and FO reports are available for a fee.

An abundance of agricultural information is available to data users through our programs. In addition to the information above, estimates on more specialized commodities, including hop stocks, mink, cherries, cranberries, lentils, and peppermint oil are also available. The information is geared toward producers and can help them plan planting, feeding, breeding, and marketing programs. The data are also used by agricultural organizations, services, businesses, trade groups, and financial institutions to determine demand for inputs, resources, transportation, and storage-related crop and livestock products. Data are used to make and carry out agricultural policy concerning farm program legislation, commodity programs, agricultural research, and rural development.

Data Security Is Our Top Priority. Names, addresses, and personal identifiers are never revealed. NASS survey and census data never leave NASS control.

Only authorized persons working for NASS as employees or sworn partners, who are subject to fines and imprisonment for unauthorized disclosure, can access NASS data and only for approved statistical purposes. NASS does not conduct surveys or provide data for private, proprietary purposes.

When NASS collects data for others in a NASS-approved statistical study, farmers and ranchers will always be informed about the cooperating sponsor and participation will always be voluntary.

Summary data from all NASS surveys and censuses are available to everyone, but will never disclose individual reported information.

Please note that delivery time may take longer depending on factors, such as network speed and report size.

NASS Revision Policy

Most estimates are subject to revision, if necessary, when the next estimate is prepared. Revisions are made to provide data users with the best possible data for evaluating the current estimates. Revisions are based on additional information, such as new surveys, late reports, corrected data, or more complete administrative data. Revisions may also be based on a re-evaluation of previous survey data when making current estimates to improve survey to survey relationships.

Understanding USDA Crop Forecasts

The publication describes the statistical methodology used by the National Agricultural Statistics Service to prepare the crop forecasts to give users of the data a better understanding. This is followed by a similar description of the world agriculture supply and demand estimates prepared by the WAOB. This publication is also available in Spanish, Russian and Chinese. Quick Stats - Agricultural Statistics Data Base

U.S. and State information, published in NASS national reports, is available in an online database via the Internet FREE OF CHARGE. The database allows custom extracts based on commodity, year, State, and other selection criteria and produces an output file compatible for updating databases and spreadsheets for selected commodities. The database can be accessed from the NASS Homepage at: www.nass.usda.gov under the heading "Data and Statistics".

County level data are also available via Quick Stats. The data include the total crops for each county and breakouts for irrigated and non-irrigated practices for many crops, for selected States. The database allows custom extracts based on commodity, year, selected counties within a State, or all counties in one or more States. The county data includes totals for the Agricultural Statistics Districts (county groupings) and the State. The download data files contain planted and harvested area, yield per acre, and production.

Another method for customers to access crops county data is via pre-extracted files. The pre-extracted data files, in Comma-Separated Value (CSV) format, are available for the current year, as well as historical years. These files were extracted from the Quick Stats and contain total crop and cropping practices for each county. These files are located from the NASS Homepage by clicking on Data and Statistics.

District forecasts are also available for selected States during the current year. To access these forecasts from the NASS Homepage, click on Data and Statistics. The forecasts can be found under the State and County heading on the Quick Stats page.





Agricultural Statistics is published each year to meet the diverse need for a reliable reference book on agricultural production, supplies, consumption, facilities, costs and returns, land resources, farm programs, crop insurance, crop loans, etc. The publication contains 10 years of U.S. data and 3 years of State data covering a wide variety of agricultural facts through the 2008 production year. A comprehensive statistical report (approximately 500 pages) containing current and historical agricultural data, updated annually. Statistics cover grain and feed; cotton, tobacco, sugar crops, and honey; oilseeds, fats, and oils, vegetables and melons; fruits, tree nuts, and horticultural specialties; hay, seeds and minor field crops; cattle, hogs, and sheep; dairy and poultry statistics; farm resources, income, and expenses; taxes, insurance, credit and cooperatives; stabilization and price-support programs; consumption; fertilizers and pesticides; and more.

2007 Census of Agriculture CD-ROM Census CD-ROM Order #AC2009-CD-VOL1, \$50.00. The 2007 Census of Agriculture State and county data are provided in this CD-ROM. The CD includes software and manipulable data files. It also includes Adobe Acrobat Portable Document Format (PDF) files of the printed reports for each State and the U. S. Summary. Generalized, digital cartographic boundary files of state- and county-level geographic areas for which 2007 Census of Agriculture data are reported. The cartographic boundary files can be used with Geographic Information System (GIS) software as a base for medium to small-scale thematic mapping. Metadata files for the cartographic boundary files are included.

Cropland Data Layer CD-ROM. NASS is pleased to offer this GIS product in the public domain and more specifically for those involved in the agricultural sector of the nation's economy. The Cropland Data Layer (CDL) products are the final categorized output from NASS' Remote Sensing Program. A crop specific categorization using the ResourceSat-1 AWiFS sensor is available for each state on CD-ROM/DVD. Each CDL data set includes software for image browsing, a digital categorized, mosaicked georeferenced image of the state and associated accuracy statistics. The images are available in GeoTIFF and ERDAS Imagine .img format for importing into most commercial GIS and image processing applications. The data are available annually, beginning in the years indicated on the map, for the darker shaded states of Arkansas, Kansas, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Louisiana, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin. For the medium shaded states, the CDL is considered to be a one time product for the year shown on the map. 2007 Field Crops Summary. Chemical application rates and acres treated, 2007 crop by State and U.S. for cotton, apples and organic apples. Data will also be published on pest management practices utilized.

2007 Restricted Use Summary. Chemical application rates and acres treated for restricted use pesticides for selected field and fruit crops in major producing States. This report is a summary of the restricted use pesticide ingredients reported in the previous issue of "Agricultural Chemical Usage" for field crops.

Census of Agriculture

The Census is conducted every 5 years to obtain agricultural statistics for each county, State, and the Nation.

The Census is the leading source of statistics about the Nation's agricultural production and the only source of consistent, comparable data at the county, State, and national levels. The Census is authorized by law under Title 7, U.S. code, and is conducted in close cooperation with the Nation's agricultural user groups and farmer organizations.

The Census includes all places from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products, including government payments, were

produced and sold, or normally would have been sold, during the census year.

Special Studies and Censuses are conducted as follow-on programs to the Census. They include a Farm and Ranch Irrigation Survey, an Agricultural Economics and Land Ownership Survey, a Census of Horticultural Specialties, and a Census of Aquaculture. As a follow-on to the 2007 Census of Agriculture, for the first time, NASS will conduct an Organic Production Survey.

Volume 1, Geographic Area Series

CD-ROM. Census CD-ROM, Order #AC2009-CD-VOL1, \$50. The CD-ROM consists of several products from the 2007 Census of Agriculture. The Census of Agriculture State and County Data are provided, along with software and manipulable data files. It also includes PDF files of the Volume 1, Geographic Area Series reports for each State, the U.S. Summary, and Puerto Rico. In addition, digital cartographic boundary files of State- and county-level geographic areas, for which the 2007 Census were reported, are included. The cartographic boundary files can be used with Geographic Information System (GIS) software as a base for medium- to small-scale mapping. Metadata files for the cartographic boundary files are included.

Several additional products are provided, including congressional district profiles and rankings, State and County Profiles, tabulations by Zip Code and watershed regions, and the Agricultural Atlas. The data are provided as either PDF files, HTML files, or GIF files.

State and County Data. Separate State reports display statistics for the entire State and every county or equivalent. The United States Summary provides national data and selected data for each State. Data include number of farms; farm characteristics; livestock, poultry, and their products; crops; land use; irrigation; operator characteristics; ownership; income; production expenses; direct marketing; farm labor and migrant workers; agricultural activity on American Indian reservations; chemical use; computer use, and more. Reports cover 2007, with comparative data for previous census years.

Additional reports are provided for Puerto Rico, including Municipio Profiles, the U.S. Virgin Islands, the Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands, and American Samoa. The 2007 Census products will also include an American Indian Reservation summary.

All reports are available in print and on the Internet. Individual report order numbers and prices are listed on page 7. The U.S. Summary, States, and Puerto Rico are also available on the Census CD-ROM.
