## NOAA to Christen New Research Vessel R/V Manta at Galveston Ceremony; Vessel will serve NOAA's Flower Garden Banks Sanctuary

NOAA's Flower Garden Bank National Marine Sanctuary will host the christening and official dedication of the newest and largest state-of-the-art research vessel in the sanctuary fleet, the R/V *Manta*, a high-speed aluminum hull catamaran that will greatly enhance the NOAA's ability to study and protect the fragile marine ecosystem of the Flower Garden Banks and Gulf of Mexico waters from its Galveston, Texas, home base.

Built in Bellingham, Wash., by All American Marine, the 83-foot, twin-hulled *Manta* is a highly maneuverable vessel equipped with a laboratory, air compressors to allow divers to refill scuba tanks at sea, and a recompression chamber to enhance diver safety. The vessel can hold up to 14 people, deploy robot subs and other ocean exploration tools, and cruise at speeds up to 35 knots.
