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NATIONAL FLIGHT ACADEMY Provided by: J. Don Foster Mission PAO, OKWG

National Flight Academy (NFA-OK-04) 6-14 August, 2004 at Muskogee was a success by any measure. The 22 cadets attending each received 10 hours of flight instruction, completed Ground School, met new friends, and consumed a large quantity of food during the nine day event. There was little time for socializing, though, because each day's schedule was crammed with flight-oriented activities from early morning until bedtime. A typical day began with breakfast, grabbing a sack lunch, a van trip to the airport, a full day of flight training, dinner, and ended with evening ground school at Bacone College in Muskogee.

"The goal of the academy was to provide each student with ground school and ten hours of flight instruction," said Lt. Col. Don Van Alstine, academy director. "We can't guarantee that every academy student will be able to solo in just 10 hours but we were very pleased that 12 of the 18 eligible to solo did so," Van Alstine added. Four of the 22 were ineligible to solo because they did not bring the flight medical certificate that is required to fly solo.

Van Alstine praised the instructors and staff for volunteering and making the academy a success. The 10 Certified Flight Instructors included Bruce Bailey of Bull Shoals, Arkansas, Bob Castle of Midwest City, Oklahoma, Dan Crum of Spring, Texas, R. P. Dexter of Pensacola, Florida, and Roy Hill of Arlington, Texas. Also George Noren of Stony Brook, New York, Jason O'Brien of Pope AFB, North Carolina, Chris Painter of Yukon, Oklahoma, John Pauly of Little Rock, Arkansas, and Jon Phelps of Tulsa, Oklahoma. Jim Harig, Muskogee Squadron Commander and Certified Ground School Instructor, conducted nightly ground school.

The 22 students attending represented eight states. Oklahoma cadets at the academy included Ben Barton of Dell City, Casey Cole of Oklahoma City, Chris Gutierrez of Norman, Justin Rodriguez of Pawnee, Daniel LaBounty of Warner, Robby Shepard of Ardmore, and Kyle Teter of Oklahoma City. Oklahoma Wing cadets were nearly outnumbered by those from Colorado, including Andrew Edtl of Colorado Springs, Patty Morkert of Cotopaxi, Kurt Barth of Snowmass Village, Ryan Marx of Durango, Joseph Poch of Colorado Springs, and Rebecca Roseman of Boulder. C/Maj. Daniel LaBounty, Muskogee Nighthawks Composite Squadron, was the ranking cadet attending. He was named Cadet Commander for the academy. In addition, LaBounty became the first cadet of the academy to make a solo flight.

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2005 TEAM AMERICA ROCKETRY CHALLENGE OPEN TO CAP

Individual CAP units can form teams and enter the Team America Rocketry Challenge this year!

The Challenge is the world's largest model rocket contest and provides student teams with a realistic experience in designing a flying aerospace vehicle that meets a specified set of mission and performance requirements.

This year's Challenge involves building and flying a model rocket carrying one or two raw eggs that achieves a precise flight duration (TBD) and returns the egg(s) to the ground safely. Bonuses are awarded if the rocket has two stages, and carries two eggs rather than one.

Teams will consist of three to fifteen students who are in 7th through 12th grades in any U.S. school or home-school program, supervised by one or more adults who are certified as teachers (including home-school) or who are officially-appointed group leaders in U.S. chapters of national non-profit youth organizations, including but not limited to the Scouts, 4-H, Civil Air Patrol, Skills USA and Young Astronauts. There is no limit on the number of teams per school or organization. All teams must be affiliated with and must draw all their members from either a single school or local home-school organization, or a single chapter of a national youth organization.

Only the first 1250 teams that submit a completed application package postmarked on or before November 15, 2004, will be allowed to compete in this year's event.

As of 1 September NHQ will automatically run a routine check to find those members that are due to renew. If there is an email address in the national database, the computer will generate a renewal notice complete with the dues they are owed based on the wing. This is the first month that this email will go to members of all the wings. The email will also include a link to click on, that takes the person to e-services for immediate online renewal using a credit card.

All commanders should encourage members to use this method as it has the potential to save significant corporate dollars in manpower, paper, and mailing costs if this method becomes the norm. Also encourage members to get their email address into the national database and keep it current.
