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Report Highlights:

Beet sugar production in Ukraine is forecast to increase in 2006 due to the expected increase in the area planted with sugar beets. Increased sugar production will help to satisfy higher sugar consumption in MY 2006/2007 despite lower forecasted imports. Sugar refining and re-export, however, are expected to decrease as a result of higher world prices, tighter import procedures and possible sugar export limitations by the Government of Ukraine.

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Executive Summary


Ukrainian farmers will likely change their opinion about the unprofitability of sugar beet crops and increase the area planted with sugar beets this year. Sugar beet and beet sugar production in MY 2006/2007 are expected to increase compared with the current marketing year. Ukraine will continue to depend, however, on reduced sugar imports to meet domestic demand in MY 2006/2007. Government of Ukraine (GOU) interventions in MY 2006/2007 are not expected to have any significant impact on the market. In light of increased world and domestic sugar prices, the focus of Ukrainian sugar policy will be to ensure self-sufficiency by increasing production and, if necessary, restricting exports.


Sugar Beet Production

Sugar beet production in Ukraine in 2006 is forecast to increase as a result of the increased area planted with sugar beets. Ukrainian farmers significantly reduced the area planted with winter wheat – Ukraine's major crop (for more details please refer to: GAIN report UP 6001 entitled "Winter Wheat Area Drops 19%"). Therefore, farmers will have to increase plantings of spring crops in 2006 (including sugar beets) to compensate for the reduced winter wheat area. According to official Ukrainian statistics, profitability of sugar beet production to farmers increased in 2005 while the rate of return for grains and sunflower seed decreased (please refer to the table entitled "Areas Planted and Rate of Return on Investment in Grain, Sugar Beet and Sunflower Seed Production in Ukraine in 1990-2005" in the Statistical Tables Section). These factors should drive Ukrainian farmers to increase plantings of sugar beets in 2006 over 2005 levels. Increased domestic sugar prices also create additional incentives for the expansion of the sugar beet area this year.

While sugar beet yields in Ukraine are still largely determined by the weather, FAS-Kiev used a slightly higher yield than the five-year average to derive the 2006 production estimate. Sugar beet yields have been increasing in Ukraine since 1999 and were driven by the increased use of improved genetics, plant protection chemicals and equipment by former collective farms (see the graphs below). FAS-Kiev also assumed that the difference between the area planted and the area harvested would not exceed 5% in 2006.

Sugar Beet Trade

Ukraine began importing sugar beets in the current marketing year for the first time. As predicted last year, the Ukrainian sugar lobby did not permit the Ukrainian Parliament (Rada) to lower import duties on sugar (Gain Report <u>UP5007</u>), however, the farming lobbyists failed to notice the proposed reduction in import duty on sugar beets that went into effect in May 2005. Until May 2005, no sugar beets were imported into Ukraine because the high import duty (50% but not less than EUR 125 per 1 MT) effectively restricted trade. The Rada reduced this import duty to 20% *ad valorem* in May and the first ever imports of sugar beets (HS Code 121291) arrived for processing in September 2005.

According to official statistics, Ukraine imported a **total of 113,000 tons** of sugar beets from Belarus (71,000 tons), Poland (21,000 tons) and Lithuania (20,000 tons) in September 2005-January 2006. To account for sugar beet imports, FAS- Kiev added a separate line to the Sugar Beet PSD table.

The likelihood of increasing the import duty for sugar beets to the previous level is low because this move would complicate Ukraine's accession to the World Trade Organization. Therefore, FAS-Kiev expects that **continued sugar beet imports in MY 2006/2007** are probable (see the PSD table above).

Another reason sugar beet imports are expected to continue is the higher minimum sugar beet price (the floor price below which sugar refineries are not legally allowed to purchase beets from farmers) announced by the GOU for MY 2006/2007. On February 20, 2006, the GOU announced the increase in minimum price from UAH 170 (\$34) per 1 MT in 2005/2006 to UAH 195 (\$39/1MT) in MY 2006/2007.

Production of beet sugar in MY 2006/2007 is forecast to increase slightly from the revised estimate for the current marketing year due to the anticipated increase in sugar beet production. The GOU slightly increased the size of Quota "A" (sugar supply to the domestic market) **in MY 2006/2007 to** 1.84 million tons (refined basis) from 1.79 million tons for the current marketing year. The government also predicts that 185,000 tons of sugar produced within Quota "B" (exports under government-to-government agreements) in MY 2006/2007 likely will be diverted to the domestic market if necessary.

FAS-Kiev slightly increased the MY 2005/2006 production estimate to reflect processing of imported sugar beets.

Consumption

Sugar consumption will likely continue to increase at a slow rate in **MY 2006/2007** due to higher use by the food processing industry. Ukrainians continue to consume sugar primarily in a refined form and often use sugar in home canning. Historical information on sugar, sugar substitute consumption and consumption of sugar by households in Ukraine is provided in the Statistical Tables Section.

Trade

Imports

Imports of raw cane sugar will likely decrease in MY 2006/2007, compared with the current marketing year due to the expected increase in beet sugar production. The import estimate for MY 2005/2006 remains unchanged at this point. It is very unlikely that the new Ukrainian parliament will review and approve a sugar tariff-rate-quota (TRQs) for MY 2005/2006 before the end of May 2006.

The import estimate for **MY 2005/2006** remains unchanged. See the "statistical tables section" for more information on imports to-date.

Exports

The forecast for sugar exports **in MY 2006/2007** was slightly reduced from the revised MY 2005/2006 estimate. Ukrainian exporters have relied heavily on imported raw cane sugar for refining. Local sugar refining and re-export for the next marketing year are expected to decrease as a result of the recent increase in world prices, tighter domestic import and processing control procedures, and a move by GOU to limit sugar exports.

The sugar export estimate for **MY 2005/2006** was slightly reduced to reflect the lower than expected level of exports to date. A new sugar refinery built in Azerbaijan is capable of processing 300,000 tons of raw cane sugar per year and will increase the competition in Former Soviet Union countries. See the Statistical tables section for more information on imports to-date.

Stocks

Despite existing legislative provisions that are currently in place, the GOU has been unable to create an effective sugar intervention mechanism that affects the stocks. FAS-Kiev expects that sugar stocks will slightly decline by the end of MY 2006/2007 due to the expected increase in sugar consumption.

Policy

On February 20, 2006, the GOU announced an increase in the minimum price for refined sugar sold in the domestic market in MY 2006/2007 to UAH 2,850 per ton (\$569) – a 20% increase form the current marketing year's level. This increase correlates with the increase in sugar beet prices mentioned above. The minimum sugar price established by the government is not expected to have any significant impact on market prices in MY 2006/2007. Wholesale sugar prices have exceeded the minimum price level in the current marketing year. See October 2006 Sugar Update Report for price information.

As a consequence of the sharp increase in both refined and raw sugar prices that began in November 2005, the GOU introduced export licensing. The GOU can utilize the export licensing mechanism to restrict sugar exports in MY 2005/2006 and 2006/2007 to prevent possible sugar shortages in the domestic market.
