Each morning before the Business Session, Darlene Hickman CPS and I attended the Delegate's and Alternate's Briefings. They were held by popular Parliamentarian Jeff Neurauter who began our day with humor. They proved to be very beneficial. The opening session on Sunday began with June Flyers singing "The Wind Beneath My Wings" followed by the introduction of the International Board of Directors and Executive Director. Ms. Flyers then bolted out the National Anthem in coordination with the Presentation of Colors.

The Registration/Credentials Committee Report stated that there were 1,943 registered attendees, which included 600 first timers. Eleven Oak Ridge Chapter members attended. Donald Bretthauer, Executive Director, gave his annual report on the achievements during the year while International President, Shelia Brownfield CPS/CAP, proudly reported the Boards accomplishments over the past year. Both speeches will be posted on the IAAP Headquarters web site by the end of August.

Marian Madonia was the keynote speaker for the August 2 Business Meeting. Her topic was "The Eyes Have It...Life Is How You View It and Pursue It." She delivered an outstanding presentation and injected just enough humor to hold our interest. Her message helped us to understand that we should eliminate those bad things running around in our head rent free and that we should design our own attitude. She stressed that we have too much garbage in our lives and that many of us train ourselves to think a certain way, which creates a trap. We were asked to evaluate our thought process because our thinking effects how we behave. Throughout her presentation, she referenced her grandmother's statement "Tell Me Something Good!" and distributed postcards depicting the statement to all attendees. She ended her presentation by challenging each of us to develop an attitude reflecting "I can stay nicer longer than she can stay mean." Sandra Chandler CPS gave the Treasurer's report which will also be available under Member's Place on the IAAP web site by October 31. She reported that we had lost 63 members during the year. Myrna Jessell CAP announced the Retirement Trust Foundation Awards. The Memphis Chapter, Memphis, TN, with more than 100 members donated the largest per member contribution to the Retirement Trust while the Atlanta Chapter, Atlanta, GA, with fewer than 100 members gave the largest monetary contribution. The Texas-Louisiana Division made the largest monetary contribution. The Retirement Trust Foundation can be viewed on the internet at www.iaap-rtf.org. Barbara Abrahamesen CPS gave the Bylaws and Standing Rules Committee Report. She reported that for the first time in the history of IAAP, there were no bylaw amendments. She

went on to say that historically the procedures governing the committee had been handed down by word of mouth; however, now they are in writing.

Rex Havens was the keynote speaker at the Certification Luncheon. His topic was "Sorry, fellas, it's over, we lost!" He poked fun at men and the way they relate to women. He also administered a few good jabs at women, and we loved him. The voting polls opened for the first ballot immediately after the luncheon. By 3:15 p.m., a long line had already formed for the second ballot scheduled for 4 p.m. Because the first ballots had to be recounted, the vote was delayed nearly an hour requiring us to stand in line for more that one and one-half hours. A winner in all categories was determined with the second ballot canceling the need for a third ballot.

Dr. Isaiah McKinnon was the keynote speaker for the August 3 Business Session. His topic was "Stand Tall or You Will Fall Short." He shared real-life experiences as the former Chief of Police in Detroit, Michigan. His presentation embraced how a positive attitude and confident outlook can change the degree of hopeless situations. He used humor to motivate and influence a sense of self-importance in his audience. I was fortunate to hear him speak on Oprah prior to hearing him in person at the Convention. In addition to his motivational speaking engagements, he is a professor of Education at the University of Detroit Mercy. The Avery Dennison Awards were presented. The Grand Prize winner was St. Louis Chapter, St. Louis, MO; First Prize winners were Galveston County Chapter, Galveston, TX and Clear Lake/NASA Area Chapter, Houston, TX; Pioneer Award winners were Lake Washington East Chapter, Bellevue, WA, and Charleston Chapter, Charleston, SC. Contact assignments were made for approximately 165 members whose membership renewal will be coming up in October-November. A majority of these joined during last year's organized membership drive. (The Chamber is concentrating on membership retention this year instead of an organized campaign.) Patricia Haroski, a secretary from Deerfield IL, originated *National Boss Day* in 1958. "I had worked for a large company and noticed that they never had a regular date set to pay tribute to our bosses," Haroski wrote in 1970. "I made inquiries, and through my network of secretaries, decided to establish a day in their honor. Reflecting on how my father had helped his white-collar daughters and sons many times with their problems concerning their work, I decided to register his birthday, October 16, as 'The Day.' In 1958, I gave it some authority by registering October 16 as National Boss Day with the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. In 1962, Illinois Governor Otto Kerner proclaimed the day. This observance is fun for our bosses, and they do a lot of smiling that day."

Since October 16 falls on a Saturday in 2004, most businesses will most likely celebrate the day on Friday, October 15.

Common observes of National Boss Day (aka "Bosses Day") include giving a greeting card, gift, or some other token of appreciation to the "boss" (managers, supervisors or executives). Some organizations hold group activities such as executive appreciation events or boss-of-the-year presentations.

Although the International Association of Administrative Professionals (IAAP) has never been officially involved as a sponsor of National Boss Day, many <u>IAAP chapters</u> hold executive appreciation events at this time. Administrative professionals participating in IAAP online discussion forums cited the following examples of National Boss Day observances:

• "At my company, we usually have a luncheon featuring an educational or motivational speaker and give our bosses gifts."

• "I usually give my boss a book relating to leadership or a framed motivational message."

• "I give a greeting card or note of appreciation to my executive. We work well together as a team, and he deserves the recognition."

• "I surprised our branch manager with a card signed by our office staff. We also pitched in for donuts for the entire staff of 60. This is one way we celebrate little successes throughout the year -- and it helps to keep morale up. I also bought a card for my immediate supervisor."
